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



The attention that is being given to the agricultural question in the press and through other channels is gratifying, but mere talking and writing will not grow potatoes or any other vegetables. When, however, the talking contains the practical directions and information that are needed it should fall on as many ears as possible; and for that reason it is to be regretted that the course of lectures being given weekly by Mr. Davies, the Government analyst and an authority on such mat ters, are not better attended. We think the Government is partly to blame for this in not seeing that fuller notice was given and a more convenient lecture hall obtained. The im pression seems to be general amons local farmers, who would most benefit by the addresses, that they are not intended for them but rather for smaller and amateur gardeners. 

It is in Germany that this news will be most unwelcome. It faces another loan, and the comparison will be equivalent to the loss of a battle or many battleships. Germany has issued 47,000,000,000 marks of loans, or, say, something less than \$12,000,-000,000. The population of Germany is larger than England's, but the popular participation has been about half of the present British standard, and on a constantly decreasing scale. England has put its neck into the collar and has laid enough taxes on interest account to stagger patriotism and capacity for financial endurance. For example, the British income tax maximum is above 40 per cent., and the war profits tax is 60 per cent. Germany has shrunk from this test of solidity and endurance. Borrowings have paid for borrowings, and currency has paid for Government issues, and mortgage has been piled on mortgage, until doubt is created whether the ability exists to pay taxes necessary for solvency. Already German taxes have been increased without providing for the interest on its borrowings. Already the debt service is 3,566,000,000 marks, and yet it is still proposed to meet it from the proceeds of the forthcoming loan. Germany is accustomed to balance budgets by loans, but borrowing to pay interest is a sort of finance to which there can be only one sure end .- N. Y. Times.

The Church of Ireland.

London Daily News: How Gladstone would have appreciated, if he were living to-day, the announcement that the Church of Ireland has contributed the tidy sum of £1,400,000 to the War Loan! When Gladstone disestablished that Church in 1869 he was the great "robber," and the most gloomy prohpecies of the future of the Anglican Church in Ireland were made. Archbishop Trench, of Dublin (who lies in Westminster Abbey, of which he was Dean), was in such despair when the Act was passed that thought he was paralyzed. As a fact, Gladstone saved the Irish Church from ruin. At the time there were churches without congregations, and many absentee incumbents with extravagant bishoprics sometimes filled from this country. Swift once said as Bishops, but were waylaid on Hounslow Heath by highwaymen, who appropriated their garb and went to Ireland. Independent of the State and very-largely under lay control the Disestablished Church has prospered beyond all expectation. There are no very rich clergy, but every clergyman has a living wage, and the Protestant laity have rallied to the Church in a manner unknown in Establishment days.

Food Pickets Give McGrath Hot Time.

New York, Feb. 2.-John W. Mcfrath, who survived twenty Newfoundland winters before he came to New York as one of the best hockey players ever seen on the ice here, and who topped all this with four years as private secretary to Col. Roosevelt, met his match yesterday.

McGrath works now for George W. Perkins, Chairman of the Mayor's Food Supply Committee. When the committee's Pacific Coast smelts eached the city yesterday morning McGrath was put in charge of truck laden with 179 fifty-pound boxes of the fish and told to find places on the east side where they could be sold.

Monroe Street was McGrath's first stopping place. He had been there about a minute when he was surrounded by pickets of the Mothers' Anti-High Price League. Their claims forced him to flee.

At the fish market under the Williamsburg Bridge McGrath sold fifty boxes, then had to depart in a hurry. Rivington Street proved to be as oad as Monroe, but McGrath stood his ground against the women. He did some "body checking" that, in a hockey game, would have barred him for the rest of his life, but he sold 30 boxes as a result. More than half his supply remained, but he found his sympathy for the suffering waning rapidly and made haste to get away.




