But They Had Learned the Art of Living.

Now there is in our town a certain family who once had much money and lived for many years abroad. Then they lost it and came back to us. And not to their beautiful home but to an upstairs apartment in a rather unattractive two apartment house. And yet so thoroughly had they learned the art of living that. they would not let their change of circumstances make life ugly. They immediately built a screened-in porch on the best side of their house long before the day when screenedin porches were commonplace (in fact, I think theirs was the first in town). They curtained 'this porch where necessary, furnished it attractively, (in those days porches used to be furnished with three rockers and a rustic table) had the electricity connected, put in the first Glocester hammock seen in town, and proceeded to live on the porch. That does not sound so much nowadays when these things are com monplace but then it was a revela tion of "savoir vivre."
