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## Lockout in Ruhr Throws 300,000 Men Out of Work

### Employment of Chinese Labor in Besco Ships Protested--Russia Severs Com- mercial Relations with Germany--French Election Campaign in Full Swing.

**LOCKOUTS IN RUHR.**  
BERLIN, May 7. A lockout, declared against miners in the Ruhr Valley yesterday, which is estimated to have thrown 300,000 men out of work, was extended to-day to Saxony, where owners were moved to declare the lockout because of the refusal of workers in the Chemnitz and Zwickau Districts to work more than eight hours. Refusal of the Ruhr Valley miners to accept a work-  
ing day of more than seven hours

underground and eight hours on the surface was the cause of the lockout in that area. It is predicted that 200,000 metal workers in the Ruhr region will be involved in the labour troubles by to-morrow. Occupation authorities have promised strict neutrality.

**BESCO AND CHINESE LABOUR.**  
OTTAWA, May 7. Premier King has received an emphatic protest from Tom Moors, Pres-

dent of the Trades and Labor Congress, as to displacement of Canadian seamen by Chinese on boats of the British Empire Steel Corporation in the coastal trade. Attention was called to the admission of Hon. Mr. Robb, in replying to a question in the House of Commons on April 28th, that on April 3 Besco had wired that it had difficulty in getting a Canadian crew to stay on after steaming, and that it had been arranged for a number of Chinese to sail from Liverpool on April 5, only two days after the complaint is made by President Moore that apparently no efforts were made to verify the statements of the Company as to its inability to secure satisfactory labor in Canada. Protest is made that apparently employment in the service of Canada is to be ignored.

**RUSSIA SEVERES RELATIONS WITH GERMANY.**

BERLIN, May 7. Satisfaction not having yet been given by the German Government for the police raid on the quarters of the

Russian embassy has announced that it is temporarily putting an end to all commercial relations with Germany in addition to closing commercial office in Berlin. Five of those arrested by police in Saturday's raid are still in jail.

**EXECUTIONER COMMITS SUICIDE.**  
BRESLAU, Germany, May 7. Executioner Schweske, who had cut off the heads of 123 criminals, killed himself here yesterday with a revolver, making the second public executioner to commit suicide in Breslau within three months. Schweske was 78 years of age and was retired on a small pension, having executed his last victim in Cologne late in 1923.

**THE IRISH BOUNDARY QUESTION.**

LONDON, May 7. In view of the Ulster Government's refusal to appoint a boundary commissioner, the British Government, according to political writers, is considering whether the difficulty may be met by asking the Duke of Abercorn, Governor of Northern Ireland, to nominate a representative. Whether this can be done, they say, turns upon the interpretation of the Anglo-Irish Treaty. The parliamentary correspondent of the Daily Express says it is pointed out that Ulster is neither a Dominion nor a Free State, but an integral part of the United Kingdom.

**N.J. DIOCESE FIRMS IN THE FAITH.**

RAHWAY, N.J., May 7. A resolution asserting, "without reservation or equivocation, its belief in the virgin birth and bodily Resurrection of Our Lord," was unanimously adopted by the 153rd annual convention of the New Jersey Diocese of the Episcopal Church to-day.

**MINE FIELDS IN BAL TIC.**

LUBECK, Germany, May 7. Mine fields, covering 230 square miles, have been discovered in the eastern Baltic off Finland. The mines are said to be of Russian origin dating from the World War. This is taken here as confirming the findings of the Sietin Marine Office that the recent sinking of a German ship in the Baltic was due to mine explosion.

**ONTARIO'S SCANDALS.**

TORONTO, May 7. Hon. Peter Smith, former Provincial Treasurer, who faces charges involving conspiracy to defraud the Ontario Government, of certain motives, appeared in the police court this afternoon and was remanded for one week on application of the Crown Attorney. The Telegram states that many surprises will be brought at the trial, and that evidence, documentary and otherwise, of a startling nature, will be introduced.

**THE FRENCH ELECTIONS.**

PARIS, May 7. The campaign for the election of a new Chamber of Deputies, will close on Saturday night, has practically emptied the Governmental Departmental Departments of Ministers and leading functionaries. Premier Poincaré is practically alone in remaining to attend to the affairs in the country, while his colleagues with the exception of those who are members of the Senate, are making a final appeal to their constituents.

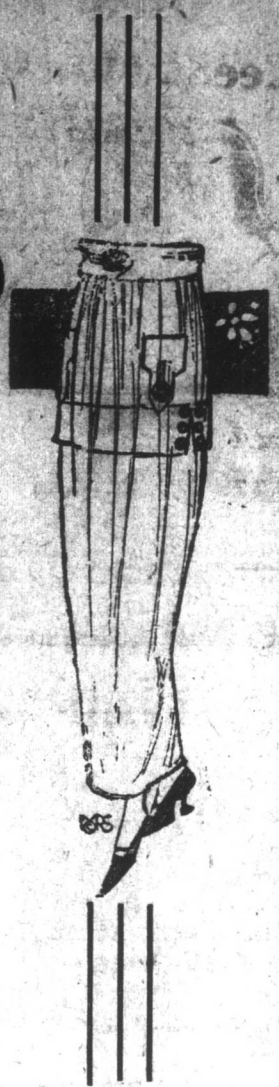

## War Veterans' Colonization Scheme Proves Success

SEATTLE, May 1.—(A.P.)—The state of Washington, having successfully developed and colonized an original unit of 50 twenty-acre tracts of land in the White Bluffs-Hanford soldier settlement project in the Priest Rapids Valley, is seeking 50 additional settlers. This project is being settled entirely by war veterans, those from other states being accepted. The valley, 175 miles southeast of here, is in a horse-shoe bend of the Columbia River, with nearly 60,000 acres of irrigable land. Wells have been dug for irrigation, machinery installed, and buildings erected. The soil, a decomposed volcanic ash ranging in depth from 2 to 10 feet, produces alfalfa, clover, fruits and vegetables when water is applied. The tracts are sold on terms and for every dollar invested by the veteran the state lends him \$3 on long time.

**THE SITUATION.**

**Net New York Reserve Bank Re-Discount Rate Significant—Foundation Being Laid For Better Business.**

(Boston News Bureau, May 1st.)

Whatever the immediate course of business, evidences are gathering that foundations are being laid for substantial improvement later on. Constructive developments are in the making both in domestic and foreign fields which should have an important effect.

Temporarily production has outstripped consumption, causing some curtailment in the former. Consumptive requirements are being held in check by a widespread feeling of caution.

Outstanding importance is the reduction in the rediscount rate of

the New York Federal Reserve Bank from 4 1/2% to 4%, marking the first change by any of the reserve banks in a long time. Such a development had been somewhat anticipated because of the extremely easy position of the Reserve System as a whole and the plethora of funds. It is entirely in keeping with the general softening of money rates.

The recent \$5,000,000 German credit, forerunner of other credits and loans to that country, and the \$40,000,000 loan to Holland made by America, with its enormous gold reserve, is destined to play a foreign financing. Re-establishment of Europe on a stabilized economic basis is going to mean revival of trade and commercial intercourse sooner or later it will mean recovery by United States of export business in important lines.

Judge Gary of the Steel Corporation after the directors' meeting Tuesday, at which an extra dividend of 50 cents per share was declared on the common stock, expressed opinion that the steel business would improve immediately after election and probably a month or so before. This is significant, and coincides with the views of some other leaders of business.

It is also significant that while report of the Studebaker Corporation for the first quarter of 1924 did not measure up well in comparison with that of the first quarter of 1923, it did not bear out all the pessimism on the motor industry had predicted. President Brinkne says that business in the second quarter is proceeding in big volume and all plants are working at capacity.

**"Tay Pay" Tells Real Name**

**Earns Big Money at 75—Is Chief Movie Censor for Great Britain Besides a much-sought Writer at Substantial Rates.**

T. P. O'Connor, the veteran Irish leader in the British House of Commons is enjoying a prosperous old age, according to Barron's.

Mr. O'Connor, who is now about 75, is the father of the House of Commons. He gets around \$2,000 salary as a member of Parliament.

Then he is chief movie censor for Great Britain, and that post pays him \$5,000 a year.

He writes a column for the London Daily Telegraph, for which he receives \$12,500 a year.

As editor of T. P.'s and Cassell's Weekly, he gets \$10,000 a year and a portion of the profits.

Besides this he does considerable special writing for American newspapers at high prices.

All in all, at 75 he is a big money earner.

Sir Henry Lucy, another famous English journalist who died recently worth more than a million dollars, made the statement that it was he who gave the familiar nickname of "T.P." to T. P. O'Connor. This Mr. O'Connor, however, says is entirely inaccurate.

"As a matter of fact," he says, "I was never called 'T.P.' until I entered the House of Commons. I don't know that I am entitled to the name even now. I was christened by the name of Thomas—the name of my father, and with none other. I was rather disappointed with this single and not particularly romantic name, and longed for a better one. My opportunity came with confirmation, for when you are confirmed in the Catholic church you have the right of adding another Christian name or two to those which you were given at baptism. I don't know why it is that I always had a particular affection for two Christian names. They seemed to me essentially romantic. One was the name Charles, the other Edmond; and I resolved that I would add these names to the homely Thomas. But my mother had a special reverence for the name of Bernard—a notable saint in the Catholic calendar—and insisted that I should add Bernard to my list. What happened was that the bishop was in a bit of a hurry. He heard only the name 'Charles,' which I duly got, by the time my gasping tongue had got to Edmond and Bernard, the bishop had passed on to the next boy; and so I remained with Charles, tout court."

"I was profoundly dissatisfied, and I found a device which relieved the situation. My mother's name was Power. It is not uncommon among Irishmen to take the name of their mother, as is the universal custom in Spain. So one day I put Power into my name, gradually dropping the Charles. But up to the time I entered the House of Commons—I had just turned thirty-two then—I had never been called 'T.P.' If I had been I would not have recognized it immediately as referring to me. My friends and intimates and my family always called me 'Tom!'"

"The first time I heard myself called 'T.P.' was when a parliamentary colleague—Lysaght Finnigan, who had a few blazing hours of political glory and then disappeared into early and tragic night—shouted up to my top room in Bernard's Inn—where I lived—calling me 'T.P.' I recalled the name with something like a shock. It was so new and strange to me. But, apparently, it caught the taste of the House."

"But the 'Tag Pay' version of my initials came in a different way, and was the creation, curiously enough, not of a friend, but an enemy. When I first entered the House there were still many members left to the old Irish party; but the rise of Parnell, the tremendous verdict of the constituencies in his favor, had discredited this older generation; they were a pretty rotten lot—all or nearly all looking for jobs. Among them was a gentleman named Philip Calan. He was extremely unpopular with the little body of Parnellites. He returned their hate, as well he might, for they destroyed his prospects of a big government office—the governorship of Queensland—on which he had set his heart and for which he had pawned all his future. He capitalized his revenue and staked everything on his chances of this lucrative office."

"In the debates on the Bradlaugh case I took strongly the side that Bradlaugh had the right to take any form of oath his conscience dictated. Callan thinking this an opportunity for creating some religious bigotry against me, attacked me and in private spoke of me as 'Tay Pay,' and the name stuck. As a matter of fact, it is incorrect; for many Irish people still say 'Tay' for tea; but never 'Pay' for P. But there it is."

The meeting was called to order by Mr. John Caldwell, who announced that he had received a communication from Sir Michael Cashin, explaining his reasons for retiring from politics. The chairman also stated that it was understood that Mr. Charles Hunt was also retiring, owing to stress of business. The letter from Sir Michael, as follows, was then read:—

St. John's, Nfld., May 6th, 1923. John Caldwell, Esq., Chairman Committee, Liberal Labor Progressive Party, St. John's, West.

My Dear Mr. Caldwell:—When, twelve months ago, the District of St. John's West honored me with a seat in the House of Assembly, I little thought that within the short space of a year, the country would be again faced with another General Election; but the political crisis which has developed during the past few weeks has precipitated a dissolution of the Assembly which otherwise might have continued for another 2 years.

As, perhaps, you are aware, it was my intention, in any case, to retire from public life when the term for which I was elected, would expire, and my decision to that effect has been confirmed by the fact that my health has become so impaired that it is altogether impossible for me to undertake the strain of another campaign. My physician advises me that it is imperative that I should have a complete rest, and in particular should be relieved of the cares and responsibilities, and refrain from the activities of political life.

If I am to conserve and safeguard my health, then I have no other alternative except to follow his advice. In formally acquainting you of my retirement, I wish to assure you, and through you, the members of the Committee and my friends throughout the District generally, of my deep and abiding gratitude for the unflinching confidence reposed in me and the loyalty and support accorded me, and my heartfelt appreciation of the devoted and selfless rendered in my behalf. Signal success crowned our efforts last year; but I must gratefully acknowledge that it was due in the main, to the untiring work, co-operation and zeal of you and your Committee, without which victory would have been impossible.

In asking you to accept and to convey to the members of the Committee this expression of appreciation, allow me also to thank you all for your innumerable acts of kindness, consideration and courtesy, since I was privileged to represent you. Believe me, Yours very sincerely,

The business of the meeting being concluded, the chairman asked if any one had any matters to bring before the gathering. No person responding, he invited Mr. Linegar to speak. The latter spoke at some length, reviewing the position of the Labor Party up to the time of its amalgamation with the Liberal Progressive Party. At present he said that Labor was allied to no Party. It was then proposed by Mr. Hodden, seconded by Mr. Vintcombe, that Mr. W. F. Linegar be empowered to interview leaders of the Government and Opposition parties, with a view to ascertaining which Party will give the best terms to Labor, and report back to a meeting, the result. This proposition was carried unanimously. The meeting then adjourned.

Hypocrisy and Instability

For inconsistency and insincerity, beat this: (Evening Advocate, April 30th.) The Warren Government, as the Prime Minister declared yesterday, has been following the only course, consistent with public morality and justice. Last spring the very gravest allegations had been made, which Mr. Warren as Minister of Justice could not possibly overlook. Messrs. Galpin, Shumoda, Jones and Cramm, with the rest of the Government party, pledged themselves to the Prime Minister in his expressed policy to have the fullest enquiry and to accord justice to those concerned. As a result, not one arrest but a half-dozen arrests have been ordered and further enquiries have been instituted, and the country has the Prime Minister's assurance that those who may be subsequently involved will be also prosecuted.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

A UNIQUE QUESTION TO DECIDE. NEW YORK, May 8. Attorneys were working on one of the most unique cases on record to-day, a case in which the disposition of a \$400,000 estate depends on which of two men, who met death on opposite sides of the globe, at almost the same hour, was first to die. The estate is that of the late Captain Coleman of the San Francisco Vigilantes of Argonaut days. His heirs were the son of Robert Louis Coleman of San Francisco, a financier, and a Grandson, William T. Coleman, Monrovia, California. The son with George B. DeLong, a New York Broker, was slain by highwaymen in Alberta, last April, while on a world tour. On the same date the Grandson died at home in California. How the \$400,000 estate shall be divided and whether the descendants of the son or grandson shall receive the major share depends on which of twin died first.

SUGAR PRICES FURTHER REDUCED. MONTREAL, May 8. Sugar refiners made a further reduction in prices here to-day by ten cents per 100 pounds and prices are now \$2.10 per one hundred pounds below the figures a year ago. Extra granulated is now selling \$3.90 per hundred; yellow at \$3.80; extra ground \$3.20; and powdered \$3.10.

CHURCH UNION BILL AN INVASION OF PROVINCIAL RIGHTS. OTTAWA, May 7. "The Dominion Parliament has no authority to pass a Church Union Bill," declared Eugene LaFleur, K.C., Counsel for the Presbyterian Church Association, in a hearing on the Church Union Bill before the Commons' private committee this afternoon. He maintained the Bill invaded the Provincial rights in regard to education, property and civil rights.

Committed to Supreme Court. The preliminary hearing of the charge preferred against Mr. J. W. McNelly concluded yesterday evening. The accused made no statement. He was committed to the Supreme Court for trial.

Fined \$20.00. Capt. George Bragg was arraigned before the Magistrate's court yesterday afternoon, charged with two breaches of the Customs Act. Name-ly, leaving the port of St. John's in charge of the steamer Senat without having obtained a Customs clearance, and departing with a number of passengers without having the ship properly surveyed. Upon being convicted on both counts he was fined \$20.00 with the option of 30 days imprisonment.

Business Block is Healed by Exhaust Steam

A whole row of business buildings in Pittsfield, Mass., now is heated by the exhaust steam from a 750-horsepower turbo-generator used by a local power company. The steam is conducted to the generator through what is believed to be the longest high-pressure steam pipe in the world. It is 3600 feet long, carries the steam at a pressure of 150 pounds, and is built partly under and partly above the ground.

Water Gives Clue to Oil

An analysis of the gases dissolved in underground water may give a clue whether the soil through which it has seeped contains oil. If it contains and contains oil or natural gas, it will dissolve a proportion of the hydrocarbons of which the oil or gas is composed. When the water then is exposed to the air at the surface, the vapors will be driven off and their places taken by air. The vapors can then be analyzed. The United States Bureau of Mines has devised a portable apparatus which may be used for this purpose.

Powerful Headlight Casts Beams of Two Colours

A headlight beam of two colors—intense white at the bottom and at the top a soft yellow filtered free of dazzling rays—is shown by the new automobile lamp shown above. Both the lights are said to be unusually brilliant because of the four-inch lens opening, made possible by an almost completely elliptical reflector, housed in an attractive egg-shaped casing. Illumination of the road for a distance of 500 feet is possible, the inventor claims. Yet approaching motorists see only a strong but soft and harmless glow. The white portion is deformed by the lens to an inverted fanlike section.

"Ivory" Grows on Trees

In Columbia, Peru, Ecuador and Brazil, Ivory grows on trees. Chestnuts, ornaments, buttons, drawers, knobs, and other articles are made from this vegetable ivory which, when dried and cut, looks like the real ivory obtained from elephant tusks. It is gathered in the form of hard, white, fine-grained, oval nuts about the size of a small potato, which drop from the wild tania or ivory-nut palm.

**What is Their Policy?**

We invite the spokesmen of the Coaker-Saxe factions, masquerading as the "Liberal" Party and nominally led by Mr. Hickman, to state publicly their policy in regard to the really serious questions before the country at the present time. The importance of these questions is self-evident. The future of the province is at stake. It is in the progress here for some time which the Coaker members have pledged themselves, equally with Mr. Hickman, to force to the fore. The action in the Assembly by the Saxe, clearly want to see Mr. Hickman and those following him to abandon these legal proceedings and to carry them on and where do the people stand on the same question? Large sums have been spent on these proceedings to date. The exposure of a most deplorable condition of things has been made. Further inquiries are being promised. Criminal prosecutions have been made on foot. Can the country trust the Hickman party to cast the light on all the dark places, as Mr. Hollis has so aptly said, and to redress the wrongs which shall be found to exist? Everything points to the fact that Sir Richard has with his little band of supporters is likely to control the Opposition and what confidence can the public have that this aggregation, if led and at his mercy will pursue the honest policy any more than Sir Richard did the four years he was in office before his downfall last year?

Of great importance among the issues before the country is that of reform and economy. It is likely to be practised by a party composed of supporters of Coaker. Follow again the light on this matter by Mr. Hollis. Take the story of the contracts for cutting pit props in Northern Bays and for peeling and sawing there after that had been cut. Evidence before the Hollis-Walker Enquiry showed that in many cases contracts for cutting pit props were given to people connected with the F.P.U., also that contracts were given on the representation of men prominent in the service of the F.P.U.; also that in other cases contracts were assigned to the F.P.U.; and that some of the scalars to estimate the quantity of wood cut were nominated by supporters of the F.P.U. and still again, that the contracts for peeling and sawing the wood were given to men who were practically members of the F.P.U. It is for the good of the people of the country, therefore, that they want a continuance of this sort of thing during the next year or two, and to ask the further question—How could a reduction of this sort of thing be avoided if the Coaker party were to gain the once more.

Another matter of importance is the question of the much-agitated West coast steamship service, which Mr. Coaker has been urging the past two years. According to rumor, Mr. Hickman, the leader of Coaker's party, is to be the agent for that service and the service is to be expanded to the amount of \$100,000 per year. It is for the people of the country as a whole, to ask themselves if they are prepared to put into a party to establish such a service, at such a cost, at a time when agitation for a reduction in taxes and tariff is widespread and when the service will add at least \$100,000 per year to the burdens the people have to bear? This is to be a service which Mr. Coaker who has studied the subject, knows is not necessary and that will only be the means of increasing difficulties that beset the country at the present time.

Another issue of equal importance to the country, especially to those interested in its main industry, is that of the future policy in regard to the fishing and marketing of our codfish. This is a subject that has been in the forefront of political discussions for the past three or four years. Those who look for consistency among our public men will not fail to note the various circumstances that Mr. Coaker, who has just assumed the mantle of "Liberal" leadership, has been which Mr. Coaker is, of course, maintaining himself very conveniently, the same Mr. Hickman, who three years ago instituted the court procedure which brought Mr. Coaker's whole policy of "Fish Regulations" down with a crash. Whether the Fish Regulation Policy was wise or unwise is a matter that needs to be discussed now, but it is vitally important in considering the relations between Mr. Hickman and Mr. Coaker. Now, according to Mr. Coaker's paper, Mr. Hickman is one of the "fishermen" and a man in whom the country can have absolute reliance. It is a short three years ago, Mr. Hickman was, according to Mr. Coaker, the enemy of the fishermen, the enemy of the Union, and a man whose

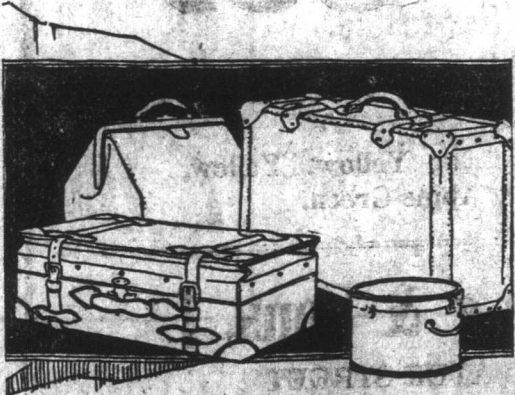

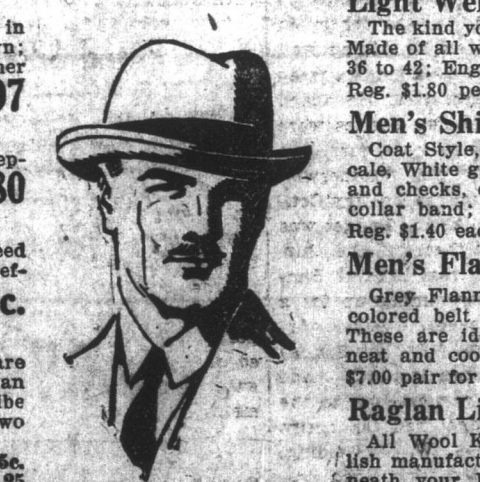

You can never be sure just what you would do in any given situation until you have been placed there. And if you haven't actually been through the experience you can often gain a most illuminating light on the subject just by using your imagination a bit.

### A Friendly (?) Suggestion.

A friend of mine who is a club woman gave a fine exposition of this the other day in the conversation of a group of friends about certain honorary positions which had been filled in a club by appointments made by the president.

"If I were you, Madge," said one of the women, "I should feel really hurt at being overlooked. You have done splendid work this year, and have been so friendly with the president, too. We all thought you would be appointed delegate to the national convention and you surely deserved it just as much as the woman who is going."

### Putting Herself In The President's Place.

"Well," said Madge slowly, "I admit that I did feel that way just a little at first, and then I began to look at the thing through the president's eyes, and after I had put myself in her place I felt differently. The woman she appointed has worked hard this year, and you'll have to admit that

there isn't much choice between us on that score.

"Then she is rather a sensitive type, and comes from the other section of the city which really has never been represented officially in the club, and you know we have been accused of being cliquey, so I suppose the president figured out that it would be good policy to show that she wasn't using her position to show favoritism to her personal friends."

Now wasn't that a fine, fair way of looking at the case. And what a lot of trouble it saved everyone.

Again I was reminded of the wisdom of this putting yourself in the other fellow's place before passing judgment when I called last week on a friend who has a little new baby.

### She Found Out Why.

"Do you know," he said, in speaking of all the extra work the little newcomer makes, "I have been thinking a lot of Fannie Driscoll lately. You know her baby was born about two years ago, and she found it so hard to keep things up about the house the way she used to. And one day I told her very kindly, (very patronizingly, as I realize now,) that it was because she hadn't any system about her work. I said that I had a schedule and stuck to it and so never let things get ahead of me. I can just imagine what she said after I left, and I don't blame her. I think I shall look her up some day and beg her pardon. I've found out since, baby came that my system has gone all to pieces and I'm thankful to get things done at all, never mind when."

So you see, this putting yourself in the other fellow's place not only saves a wrong judgment of your friend, but saves you from the humiliating necessity of admitting you were wrong.

### Hole That Sank the Titanic

NEVER MORE THAN INCH WIDE.

To a landsman a modern mammoth ocean liner appears to be the last word in solidity of construction. But seamen know better.

It is certainly probable that no storm that ever blew could by itself cause the foundering in mid-ocean of an Olympic or a Mauretania. But on the other hand, vessels of this type, being built for speed, are really quite fragile in comparison with their vast bulk and so are very susceptible to serious damage in case of a collision, whether with another ship, floating wreckage, or worse still, with ice.

Take, for example, the case of the Titanic, the greatest ice tragedy in maritime history. Mathematical calculations have satisfied naval architects that the rent in her side made in striking the iceberg was never more than an inch or two wide, and in many cases it can have been little more than an opening of the plates owing to the rivets having their heads torn off as the berg scraped along her side.

But instead of the damage being confined to the filling of a single compartment it was spread over them all, with the result that the biggest ship in the world foundered in mid-Atlantic in a few hours, with the most appalling death-roll of fifteen hundred and twelve, writes Mr. F. C. Bowen, in "Ships for All."

There is good reason to believe, by the way, that the Titanic was not the first White Star liner to fall a victim to the ice, for when the Naronic disappeared in the Atlantic in 1893 the only trace of her ever found was a boat whose falls had been cut away with every sign of frantic haste.

Yet, if she had sprung a leak there would certainly have been time to get the boats into the water without cutting the falls, while if the disaster had been due to a collision there would be the other ship to tell the tale.

Similarly, when the Inman liner, City of Boston, disappeared when on a voyage from Halifax across the Atlantic, the only evidence of her fate was a bottle, washed up many months later, which contained a written message, almost gibberish, but containing

the name of the ship and a reference to ice and sinking.

Quite frequently it has happened that a big passenger steamer had rolled over and gone down in a few minutes after a collision with a vessel only a fraction of her own size.

Such a case was that of the French liner La Bourgoise, which collided with the British sailing ship Cromartyshire in 1898 and sank.

### Highest Mountain Sinking Each Year

MOUNT MCKINLEY SINKS ABOUT TWO FEET A YEAR BECAUSE OF QUAKES.

MCKINLEY PARK, Alaska, April 20.—Tradition has it that Mount McKinley, the loftiest peak on the American continent, sinks about two feet a year from its official altitude of 29,300 feet.

Residents of the region are convinced that this happens. They point out that there is an average of four earthquake shocks a year, and contend that the mountain settles about six inches with each tremor.

By way of attempted confirmation, they refer to the Aleutian Islands. According to recent reports from scientific sources, no one can state the location or altitude of many of the small islands in the Aleutian archipelago. One day an island may appear well above water and the next day it may have vanished.

Numerous small islands, including Bogoslov, are reported to have disappeared without a trace. Bogoslov is recalled as the island which suddenly appeared while the crew of the coast guard cutter Bear looked on, in 1906.

For these topographical freaks the blame is placed on Mount Katmai and Pavlovsk volcanoes, which intermittently send out dense clouds of smoke and flame.

It is said that Epinard, last season's "wonder horse," showed so little promise as a colt that his owner decided to dispose of him at the yearly sales, and was only restrained by the pleadings of his wife; while Master Robert, the winner of this year's

Grand National, was once a plough horse.

When Teddington was foaled, he had apparently just as good a prospect of flying to the moon as of winning the "Blue Riband" and putting thousands of pounds in his owner's pocket. "Old Coke" so little realized the prize he had secured that he gave him to Mr. R. Williams, who in turn presented him to the Earl of Godolphin. It is impossible to calculate how much The Godolphin's progeny has won, but the sum must run into millions of pounds.

The celebrated Highland Laddie, was bought from the estate of a pig for £21 14s. and Flying Childers spent his early years carrying the post-bags of his native village.

Throstle, who defeated Ladas so sensationally in the St. Leger, was born with a thick film over her eyes, and her owner, Lord Alington, so despaired of her ever being of use to him that he offered her as a gift to a friend. When the offer was refused, his lordship gave orders that she should be shot. Luckily, this alternative method of getting rid of her also miscarried, and Throstle lived to become one of the greatest mares of her day.

It is said that Queen of the Roses, before coming into the hands of the Duke of Beaufort, twice changed owners—once in exchange for a bag of corn, and the second time for a rick of hay. In later years, the Queen's daughter, Reve d'Or, won the Oaks, the City and Suburban, and other great races.

A half-share in Florence was once sold for the ridiculous sum of 2s. though a little later Mr. Hamond was glad to get her for £1,000. And even at that figure she was an excellent bargain; for she won the Manchester Cup, Ascot Plate, and the Cambridgeshire. Peep o' Day, another great bargain, was bought for seventy-five guineas, and after winning several big races was sold to the Duke of Hamilton for nearly fifteen times that sum.

The Widow was so little thought of by her owner that he made a present of her to his bailiff, who patted himself on the back when he succeeded in exchanging her for a £10 note.

After running wild for a time with a herd of cattle, she was put into training, and gave such an excellent account of herself that she not only ran away with the Cambridgeshire, but won £40,000 in bets for her owner.

Salamander was hawked about to one country fair after another, until at last a purchaser was found willing to risk £35 on him. And seldom has £35 been so well invested; for the horse developed into a steeple-chaser of the first rank, won the Grand National, and by his victory increased the bank-balance of Mr. Studd, his owner, by £30,000.

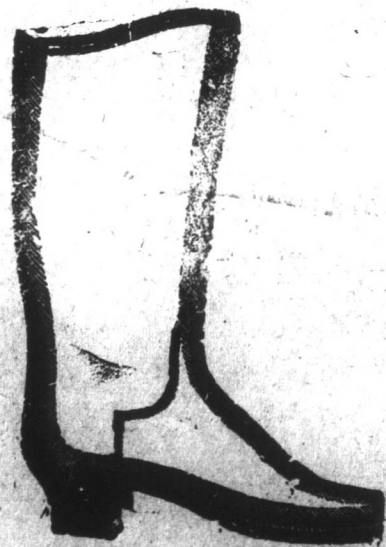

### Hints for Your Home

Linoleum will wear longer if it is washed with equal parts of warm soapuds and boiled starch.

Brass door-knockers and handles may be kept brighter by rubbing with paraffin after cleaning, and finally polishing with a cloth.

If a strip of carpet is tacked to the knife-board and sprinkled with bath brack, a good polish may be given to the knives without scratching them.

To freshen straw matting sponge it with strong salt water, Coconut matting should be well beaten, scrubbed with warm water and salt, rinsed, and hung in the open air to dry.

When cleaning material with benzine, a "water" mark is often left. This can be prevented if the material is ironed under a damp cloth immediately the stain has been removed.

The best way to clean upholstered furniture is to brush the article thoroughly and rub kitchen salt over every part. After the salt has been left on for a while, remove with a clean brush.

An excellent polish for mirrors can be made by pouring boiling water over used tea leaves and straining off the liquid. This should be bottled and applied to the mirrors with a soft piece of flannel.

After frying or any other greasy cooking has been done rub the top of the stove with old newspapers or brown paper. It will prevent the smell of the cooking hanging about for hours, and make the stove easier to polish with blacklead.

When irons are first put over the gas or before the fire a certain amount of moisture collects on them. If this is allowed to dry on them they get rusty and need cleaning, but if the irons are taken off a few times during the heating process, and wiped, they will be smooth and clean when they are hot enough for use.

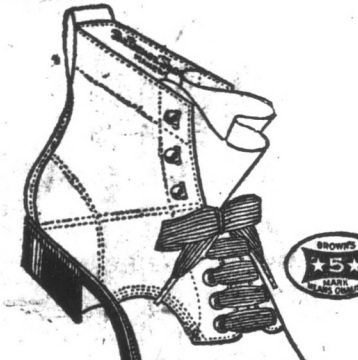

### Production of Opium and Narcotics

EXPERTS ARE WORKING PLANS TO CURTAIL PRODUCTION OF OPIUM AND NARCOTICS.

April 29.—A programme to limit effectively the production of opium and other narcotics will result in the complete cessation of the drug traffic, has been announced by Edwin Neville, the member on the Committee of the League of Nations, who is the committee to be set up at the Opium Conference to meet in Geneva next November. The Neville plan will be the support of the English delegates to the convention, particularly those which affect countries in India whose commerce is carried through Indian ports. The Neville plan will restrict the production of the opium poppy in countries not known at the present time.

Since the cultivation of the plants is now a large source of revenue to certain governments, it has been found impossible to effect the complete eradication of the plant at present. The Neville programme, however, suggests that no state in the future be allowed to obtain greater revenue from this source than is necessary to cover the expenses involved in controlling the narcotic traffic.

This is admittedly a difficult problem, since, for instance, the Persian government is reported to obtain one-third of its revenue from the production of opium. The conference will have to consider the introduction of alternative crops such as silk and cotton.

Furthermore, special clauses will have to be made for the states which by treaty are not allowed to raise the customs duties, and thus compensate themselves for any reduction in opium tax revenue.

As regards transportation of the drug, Mr. Neville has accepted in principle the system of import and export licenses recently introduced by the league which provides that the drug be exported for medicinal purposes only on a license from the importing country. He suggests there should be a reciprocal right of search on the high seas in regions agreed upon, and that there should be no re-export of opium.

A permanent central organization to receive annual reports from all powers who are parties to the convention would be established. These reports should show the amount of opium produced, imported, exported, and consumed, and heavy penalties provided for offenses against the regulations.

### Egg as Birth Certificate!

The egg with the greatest claim to distinction is one which was used as a birth certificate! This unique "document" was submitted to a meeting of the School Attendance Committee held at Norwich in February, 1893. Mrs. Bell, a widow, had been called upon to prove that her daughter had reached the school exemption age.

She produced an egg, colored in tints of purple, yellow, and cream, with the name of her daughter and the date of her birth picked out in white in almost cursive lettering. In addition, two texts had been written on the egg: "The Lord shall guide thee continually" and "Teach me to do Thy will." This was the only record Mrs. Bell had of her daughter's birth, and after the "certificate" had been passed round and admired, the Committee accepted it as evidence.

### Detroit Ford Hospital Called Human Garage

DOCTORS COMPLAIN THAT AUTOMOBILE MAGNATE IS EFFICIENT, MAD—PATIENTS PAY IN ADVANCE.

The doctors of Detroit are boycotting the big Henry Ford Hospital, stating emphatically that "when efficiency run rampant may be the worst inhumanity to man."

They claim that the Ford hospital is nothing but a human garage, handling patients like Ford cars in need of repairs.

The hospital is run on the famous Ford efficiency lines. Patients "pay as they enter." There is no credit extended to anyone. Charges are based on work to be done, as in a garage, so much for cutting a leg off, so much for removing an appendix, and so on.

All patients, regardless of financial circumstances, pay alike. John R. Rockefeller would be treated at exactly the same price as a day laborer.

No charity work whatever is done. Mr. Ford believes no one is entitled to expect to get something for nothing in a hospital any more than he would expect to get it in a garage.

Patients are not allowed to consult outside doctors. All work in the hospital must be done by the Ford surgeons.

Doctors and nurses work on a strict schedule of hours and punch the time clock just as in the Ford factory.

The hospital has no connection with the Ford factory. It is open to all citizens of Detroit. Mr. Ford's object in starting it was to show that a hospital could be made to pay as well as an automobile factory. The hospital does pay.

Detroit doctors claim that a hospital should never refuse to treat patients because they have no money and that rich patients should be charged more to make up for the cost of treating people who cannot pay.

Mr. Ford says charity is "bunk" and people should pay for what they get and pay alike.

### Sand Desert in Alaska

REVEALED BY SUMMER SUN.

CANTWELL, Alaska—(A. P.)—Shifting sands, having all the characteristics of the great American desert and providing a menace to inexperienced travellers, have been discovered in interior Alaska, according to prospectors arriving from Valdez Creek placer diggings.

This desert of Alaska is located between Valdez Creek and Myers' roadhouse, on the Richardson Highway. L. S. Wickham, a placer miner of the Valdez Creek region, has described the barren area. He said access was gained in years past by "mushing" 100 miles or more over the snow. As these trips were made in winter, the heavy snow concealed the nature of the country. Last summer, however, prospectors went further afield in their excursions from Valdez Creek, and they encountered conditions that made them apprehensive and wary. When the old trail had appeared in winter as leading plainly across a level plateau, they found immense sand dunes and the entire landscape changed.

In summer the winds start the sands to moving in the same manner as on the American desert. Changing of landmarks makes it difficult to travel.

The sand is of a pure silicious material, indicating an origin in alluvious rock. For that reason prospectors maintain that the region was the last resting place of glaciers containing vast stores of ice.

### Suicide Towers Closed to Public

MUNICH, April 14 (A.P.)—The towers of St. Mary's church, which rise to a height of 337 feet, are to be closed to the public because of their continued popularity with persons determined upon suicide.

The towers were built in the fifteenth century. Six persons have used them with suicidal intent, and

**Babylonian Books May Tell History of Oldest Kingdom**

LONDON, April 16 (A.P.)—An ancient Sumerian library of cuneiform tablets has been found by the simple expedient of throwing a brick on a spot on the side of a hill under which the library has lain hidden for centuries. The discovery was made by Professor Langdon, the American-born Oxford Assyriologist, who is directing the well-Brundell expedition excavations at the ruins of the Babylonian city of Kish near Bagdad.

The discovery of the library occurred just in time to stop the preparations for the suspension of the excavating work, for it was the opinion of the leaders of the expedition that the library had been destroyed with other missing sections of the city.

"I was convinced," said Professor Langdon in writing of the discovery, "that if still existing a certain library lay on the western side of a certain mound and I dug there vainly for weeks. The idea that the library was there disturbed my mind and even haunted my sleep. In despair and grasping a chance of divination, I went alone to the top of the mound and chose a brick of the age of Nebuchadnezzar which lay at my feet, and marked on it an arrow. Then, after blindfolding myself and turning round many times to lose my bearings, I threw the brick backward over my head.

"The next morning digging was recommenced at the place indicated by the arrow, and within two hours a large nest of valuable literary tablets was found."

The library is by far the most important find the expedition has made during its three years' work. It is expected to yield literary treasures which even the libraries of the Pharaohs have not contained. Already 20 rooms of the library have been uncovered, all of which are filled with tablets, and there are 20 more rooms yet to be explored.

Kish is the oldest capital of ancient Babylon, and was founded immediately after the Flood. The excavated ruins show the city to have been five miles long and four miles wide and it is here that the oldest known kings of history lived. Much is known of the history of the city from other sources, but the story of its birth and prosperity still have to be found in the ancient records.

**Tashi Lama of Thibet**

**SEEKS REFUGE IN PERKIN MONASTERY.**

CALCUTTA, April 1 (A.P.)—The Tashi Lama, head of the Buddhist religion in Thibet, who was recently forced to flee from his monastery at Tashilumpo, has reached Calcutta in cognito and immediately embarked for China. His holiness is now on his way to Pekin, where he hopes to find refuge in a large Buddhist monastery which sheltered the Dalai Lama who fled from Lhasa ten years ago.

The Lama's flight was the result of his having been subjected to unbearable indignities, supposedly through jealousy of his exalted position as the ecclesiastical head of Thibet. His property and lands are said to have been confiscated by order of the supreme council at Lhasa, which reduced him to the level of a small landholder.

### Icebergs

(By ERNEST FAITH, F. A. M. S. of South Africa.)

Our present-day voyages in the polar regions witness sights on the sea which are more beautiful, more accurate, and more astounding than any work that man can produce.

Masses, vast dignified, towering aloft in its picturesque beauty of outline down to the view as though it were fairly vision, an Aladdin's palace, with its crystal minarets, pinnacles, spires, and domes of ethereal delicacy and massive solidity. Strange as it may seem, these frigid leviathans have their origin in the Sun. True the snow feeds the glaciers, but when comes the snow? The feathery snowflakes fall from the clouds, but the clouds can all be traced back to appear raised by the Sun. Without solar fire there could be no atmosphere, vapour no clouds, and without clouds no snow and glaciers. Curious as the conclusion may appear, the cold bytes of the polar regions have their origin in the heat of the Sun. Professor Tyndall has reminded us again and again of the wonderful manner in which phenomena, apparently most remote, are connected together in this magnificent system of things we call nature. We should never have heard of the good Bishop Heber's Greenland's icy mountains if the energy of the Sun had not raised the vapour from the sea.

Above a certain height on a lofty mountain the snow never melts. The snow-line, as it is called, is highest in the equatorial regions, falling at last to the sea-level as the poles are approached. Above the snow-line there is a continual accumulation which forms the glaciers. The snow above weighs heavily on the snow beneath, and eventually changes its character into ice. There is a French term, neve, applied to the glacial region above the snow-line; but the word glacier is restricted to the ice below this line. The light snow or neve is mostly swept and piled by winds into domes and ravines, and gradually flows down the valleys as the hard, brittle, and translucent ice. Like treacle, tar, or lava, ice is a viscous substance, and is urged downwards by gravity. By the increasing pressure of the masses in the rear, caused by the continuous accumulation of ice and snow, it reaches the coast. This viscous movement is very slow, ordinary glaciers creep along at the rate of a few feet a year.

**Calving of the Ice.**  
As the snout of the glacier plunges along the sea floor, into the deepening water, it reaches a point where the depth of water is so great that its buoyancy, aided by the tides, breaks off the ice, which is lighter than water. This snapping of the snout of a Greenland glacier is called the calving of the ice, and it often raises great volumes of water so that ships in the neighbourhood are endangered unless they keep at a prudent distance. This snapping of the snout causes a terrific noise, like the rumbling of thunder. The late Sir Ernest Shackleton mentions that they heard a berg break off the Great Barrier which fully fifty miles from its edge.

The ship of ice does not start on its voyage without some cargo, mud and stones are frozen to its base and embedded in its mass, and rest on its surface. The irregularities of the shape of an iceberg are partly due to the stones and earthy debris which it derived when it was a portion of a glacier. The earthy debris protects the ice beneath from melting, and therefore it stands out as pedestals, like the unprotected ice about them is melted away. The berg however, does not journey far before much of the debris frozen to its base sinks to the bottom of the sea, and a tilting of the berg, causes many of the rocks and stones on its surface to slip away.

**Frigid Monsters.**  
Few people realize the tremendous size of many of these ice masses, which have proved such a terrible menace to all shipping. When it is said that an iceberg is two hundred or three hundred feet above the sea, it should be remembered that below water it is about eight times that which can be seen above the water. Comparatively small icebergs of two hundred feet above the sea must be half as high as Table Mountain, which forms the magnificent background of Cape Town in South Africa. A few years ago a captain observed four large bergs together, two of them rising five hundred feet and seven hundred feet respectively. Another was observed having a height of nine hundred and sixty feet, and another measured fifty miles in length. The most lofty berg ever witnessed is said to have been one thousand five hundred feet above the sea.

Long ledges often run out below the water, as all bergs are more or less eaten away at sea-level by the perpetual action of the waves. It is this projecting ice-foot concealed beneath the waves which rips the ribs of the ocean liner. The world will never forget the tragedy on April 14, 1912, when, on her maiden voyage, the great White Star liner, the Titanic, sank in a few hours with a loss of 1,355 lives. These tremendous ice masses cannot be artificially destroyed; they can only be watched and

reported upon by wireless from day to day. Far out in the silence of the sea these frigid monsters make their way, and are often rendered invisible by being enveloped in fog.

**Ice-Bearing Currents**

All icebergs have not a glacial origin; a large percentage originally formed part of ice-barriers. The flat-topped icebergs of the Southern seas are broken portions of the Great Ice Barrier which lies between Victoria Land and King Edward Land. The bergs observed in these regions are much larger than any that have been seen in the Greenland seas. Great ice islands, from five to twenty miles long, have been sighted, and the largest of a few has been estimated at sixty miles and upwards. An ice-bearing current from the Antarctic regions occasionally carries bergs northwards into the South Atlantic, and the brave west winds cause them to drift until they almost reach the South African coast. As recently as October 18, 1921, a warning message was posted up at Durban for the information of ship masters concerning icebergs which had been sighted about one hundred and fifty miles south of Port Elizabeth.

Icebergs frequently move across the ocean in the opposite direction to that of the surface current. In the face of a tremendous gale they will drift across the seas. The explanation is that the storm of a sea is comparatively on the surface, but deep down the under-currents move these frigid masses. Let it be remembered that the surface current acts upon seven-eighths of the berg, but there are nine-eighths upon which the powerful under-currents can exert their tremendous force.

Save the Forests!

Mr. Robson Black, Editor of Canadian Forest and Outdoors, well says that "every mile of spruce or pine or fir given to the annual bonfire will have to be bought back by the next generation in higher costs of lumber and paper, in forfeited industries, in dwindling public revenues, and a sacrifice of population." And Sir Henry Thornton, head of the National Railways, declares that the preservation of the forests is of vital importance to the railway system which belongs to the people of this country. He says: "The forest is a main pillar of our freight and tourist traffic. I appeal to every Canadian to protest the forest."

The forests of Canada provide employment for 120,000 men and the annual production is worth \$604,000,000. The destruction of the forests vitiates out employment, retards the prosperity of the country, hurts agriculture by lessening the rainfall and affects power development on the rivers. The great menace to the perpetuation of this immense national resource is fire. There are about 6,000 forest fires annually in Canada with a resultant loss of many millions of dollars worth of timber much of which will not be replaced in this generation. Nineteen-tenths of these fires are due to carelessness. The worst offenders are campers and sportsmen, with settlers and farmers a close second. This is the season of greatest danger. Let there be then caution and carelessness on all hands. Let every man who goes into the woods or who lights a brush fire hold himself strictly to account, so that nothing shall be done on his part to cause further wastage and nothing shall be left undone to maintain all reasonable means of prevention of fire in the woods!

### Sixth Century Graves

YIELD MANY PRE-CHRISTIAN RELICS.

LONDON, April 15.—(A.P.)—The discovery of a number of skeletons with numerous funeral relics of pre-Christian date near Stratford-on-Avon in a sixth century cemetery, is regarded by English archaeologists as one of the most important finds ever made in England.

The gem of the collection consists of a magnificent urn, or bowl, of a warrior's shield, which was found buried with a body. The shield boss which is pronounced to be unique in iron, beautifully decorated with plates of cast bronze with gold attachments and ornamented with gold on the apex and around the rim.

During the course of the excavations 214 interments were found, some 40 of them having been cremated and the ashes buried in earthenware urns of beautiful designs.

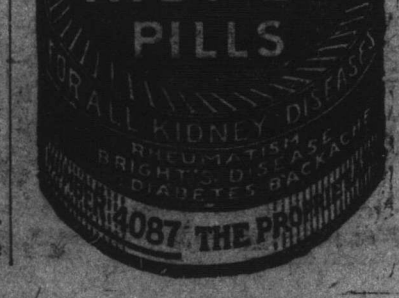
**Los Angeles Adventurers**  
LURED BY GOLD AND PUR OF SIBERIA.  
LOS ANGELES, May 2.—(A.P.)—Siberian gold is the lure that is to send 100 Los Angeles adventurers to sea, May 8, on the Albatross-registered schooner Speedway, bound for the Kamchatka peninsula and the lava-strewn shores of the Sea of Okhotsk. The modern argonauts have contracted to stay five years with the expedition, which claims the sanction of the Soviet government.

Placer mining and fur trading in a region inhabited only by the wild tribes of Yakuts and Tungus will be the lot of the Californians. The Speedway, however, plans to return to Los Angeles every winter with furs and, it is hoped, gold. The vessel will go back to the Arctic in the spring with supplies.

The expedition is said to be the first of its kind organized to seek gold in Siberia, although it is similar to the ill-fated Fred J. Wood expedition, which was wrecked on the

Alaskan coast about a year ago while carrying 150 Californians and their families in search of new gold fields.

### Protests From Overseas Don't Disturb Labor

MACDONALD MINISTRY UNMOVED IN DETERMINATION TO CARRY OUT BUDGET.

LONDON, April 30.—(British United Press)—The Labor government is not at all disturbed by the already arriving protests from the Dominions against its jettison of the Imperial Preference principle as indicated in yesterday's budget speech. The prospect of loss to the Canadian motor industry through the abrogation of the McKenna tariffs finds it politically regretful but unmoved in its determination.

"We do not believe in tariffs as a permanent bond of Empire," says Chancellor Snowden, and unquestionably the cabinet are unanimous to support. They are convinced that free trade is right in principle and that it is good for Britain in practice. They believe also that the British Empire cannot persist as a peaceful influence in the world if it arouses world antagonism and distrust by creating barbed wire tariff entanglements around its red patches on the map.

On the tariff question by itself the Liberal party is solid in support of the Snowden budget. On the preferential point with its involved repudiation of the Imperial conference agreements, the Liberals are divided to some extent, and the Conservatives, of course, will unanimously fight the Labor proposals on the grounds of good faith as well as of good business.

There is no doubt, however, that the budget as a whole will pass and neither is there any doubt of its popularity among the people. To an extent which will compel the quickening of another issue between the parties before the opposition will dare to invite a general election.

The Conservative leaders are walking some decisive socialist steps. They believe that some plan of a preference is essential to the continuance of the Empire, but recognize its lack of appeal to the home voters.

They believe also that socialist policies mean not only imperial dissolution but disintegration at home. They are hoping for a campaign that will combine both issues. "The government, however, is dealing the cards."

### Tsao Kun's Presidency Due to His Loud Snore

CHINESE TALE OF NEW PRESIDENT TELLS HOW PENNILESS DRIFTER LEFT HAYSTACK FOR THE ARMY.

With the accession of Tsao Kun to the presidency of China, the usual crop of fantastic stories purporting to account for the rise of any notable figure has appeared, not the most fantastic being one obtained from native sources in Tsao's own province of Chihli.

According to this account, Tsao's enlistment and subsequent rapid advancement as a soldier in the armies of the old Manchu dynasty would have been impossible but for his sonorous snore.

Tsao, originally, was a cloth merchant, appearing having been put into that service by a father, noted for his stern disposition, the story goes. Becoming proficient, he was provided with a barrow and stock of goods wherewith to make rounds among prospective buyers and chaffered keenly with the housewives of neighbouring villages. He was discontented with this prosaic occupation, however, and sought solace for the pangs it caused his adventurous spirit by engaging in escapades which failed to find his father's approval.

The parent and young Tsao drifted and the lad, bethinking himself of a career that would supply his demand for activity and color, sought to enlist at a military camp not many miles from his home. He was rejected because of inability to provide a proper guarantor. Although despondent, he was determined not to return to his family and sheltered himself in a haystack, where he fell asleep.

An officer from the camp, strolling through the vicinity, heard the lusty evidences of Tsao's slumber and roused him unceremoniously. In response to the officer's inquiry as to why such a robust young man should be sleeping the day away, Tsao told his story of eviction from home and rejection by the recruiting officials.

The officer, became interested, used influence to obtain the waiving of the necessary guarantor in Tsao's case, and the youth enlisted. His rapid grasp of military matters impressed his superiors and sensational military career culminating in Tsao's advancement to the highest ranks and elevation to the presidency, followed.

### "Strong" Tide

TIDE IS BLAMED FOR COLLECTION OF BOOZE BOTTLES IN HARBOR.

SAN PEDRO, Cal., April 29.—The term "mean," high tide, over which there are periodic wrangles in the courts, has been given a novel and literal interpretation in police court here.

Thomas Mitchell, 70-year-old ship's carpenter, who lives in a boathouse along the Wilmington water front, told the magistrate that booze bottles bobbing up in quantity in the vicinity of his marine abode had been washed there by the "meanest" high tide ever heard of in all his nautical experience.

The retort of members of the harbor dry squad who made the arrest was that if a reasonable excuse could be advanced for the congregation of the floating bottles, the case might not be dropped.

### Berlin's Birthrate Declines

BERLIN, April 14.—(A.P.)—Births in Berlin fell to 38,551 in 1923, as against 76,665 in 1913. This decline is having a great effect on the public schools. The number of children entering the lowest classes in 1923 was only 31,000, in 1913 the number of first-year pupils was 69,000.

Berlin's births numbered 51,997 in 1919; in 1920 they rose to 62,614, but in 1922 sank to 45,686, and a year later fell to 38,551.

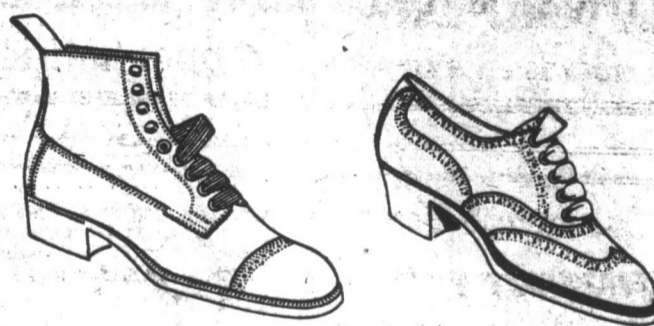

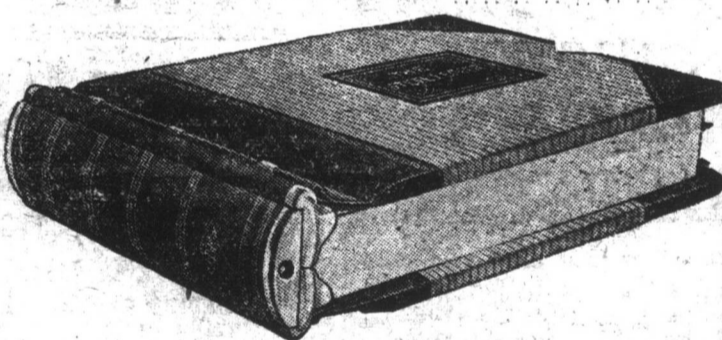
