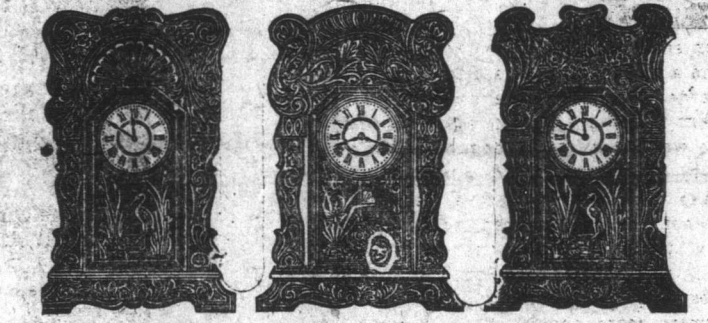

PARTY STANDING IN CANADA.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 28.—(By Canadian Press)—Since the last Dominion General Election on December 1929, there has been remarkably little change in party standings in the House of Commons. When the ballots counted nearly four years ago, Liberals returned 117; Conservatives, 64; Progressives, 64; and Independents, 4. Should the present election test the issue of the party, it seems likely that the Liberals will go with exactly the same number of members as were returned in 1929. Conservatives would have one and Progressives three less. In latter numbers, however, no alteration is made for existing vacancies. These are four in number.

One in New Brunswick and the one in Ontario are seats last represented by Conservatives; one in Quebec and Liberal and the fourth, in Ontario, Progressive.

By-elections have been held since the general elections of 1929 and in only three has there been a reversal of party fortunes. In two these, one in New Brunswick and one in Nova Scotia, Conservatives were returned. In one, in Ontario, Liberals were returned.

Roads Complained Of

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—For the past ten days the Municipal Council have been engaged in laying sewerage pipes along Hamilton Street from the Junction of Cornwall Avenue West, and during the present week the road has been closed to traffic.

This was done before any attention was given to the roads to the North, over which a large portion of the traffic would be diverted.

All the roads North of Hamilton St. are in a wretched condition, many sections are not better than river beds and altogether unfit for either horse drawn or motor vehicles.

The Topsail Road handles an enormous amount of traffic from Conception Bay, a large amount of which uses Cornwall Avenue as the direct route to the higher levels, and it is a very serious matter to have this portion of the road closed to traffic without seeing that the roads to the North were in passable condition.

Those who take the Mundy Pond Road at St. Clare's Hospital have to travel about a mile of road which will test the springs of any vehicle, to say nothing of the discomfort of the passengers.

The roads leading from Pleasant Street and Bennett's Dam to the Southside of Mundy Pond are in an equally deplorable state. As the work on Hamilton Street is proceeding at a snail's pace it is high time that the Council gave the above mentioned roads some attention and put them at least in a passable condition, I am,

Lady Byng Transplanting Canadian Flowers

Jasper, Alta., Aug. (Canadian Press).—Lady Byng, who is an enthusiastic flower lover, wishes to transplant some Canadian flowers to her English garden and to that end sent for her English gardener to make a special study of these wild things. Recently at the Lodge, before a little audience invited to meet her, she spoke informally on the subject. She commented on the number of flowers which she said over in England were only to be found in gardens, and which were frequently cultivated at considerable cost, but which out here in Canada people literally trod underfoot, they were so plentiful. She urged the members to cultivate rock gardens in Jasper. Her Excellency said it was astonishing how many people overseas thought that there were no flowers in Canada.

Feeding Wembley's Zoo

MEALS THAT TRAVEL THOUSANDS OF MILES.

Few visitors to Wembley realize that there are more than two hundred animals, birds and fishes on show in various exhibits. Many of them come from our Colonies, and their meals are specially shipped to Wembley.

The hay, for instance, which the Merino rams outside Australia House chew so contentedly, has travelled a thousand miles by land and twelve thousand by water.

South African lucerne, or alfalfa, as this hay is sometimes called, is the principal food of the nineteen ostriches, twenty sheep, and eleven goats living in the South African pavilion. The ostriches eat it mixed with maize which has been specially sent over.

Ostriches are generally regarded as greedy birds, yet they each eat only one and a half pounds a day.

They are very fond of dessert, however, and will eat anything visitors drop into the paddock. A short time ago a visitor dropped in an orange four inches in diameter, and one of the ostriches immediately snapped it up. Unfortunately, the fruit would not go all the way down, and the keeper had to squeeze it up through two feet of neck!

The Angora goats vary their diet with chaff also sent from South Africa while the Merino sheep eat all the mowing from the lawns.

.....

In a corner of the Indian pavilion are a dozen sickly geraniums—sickly because grubs feed on them. The grubs, however, don't live long, for they supply the Indian water tortoises with an occasional delicacy.

It is a pity that all pets are not as easy to feed as another visitor from India, the Bombay jungle snake. Its digestive organs work very slowly, and if you give it a lump of meat as big as your little finger tail-to-day it will not need another meal for a month.

The glutton of the exhibition is the giant conger, which lives in "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea"—a series of tanks filled with water from the Dogger Bank. It eats six whiting for its breakfast, and is hungry again long before lunch-time.

The pike, which lives opposite, like half-pound dace from the Thames, and several of these are sent to the exhibition every day.

Their neighbours, the trout, devour large lumps of raw beef-steak, while three hundred law worms is the daily ration of the perch.

Near the fish is a baby lion, named MacKipper. When he arrived at Wembley last year he was fed with condensed milk, but now he devours four herrings for his breakfast and an equal number for his lunch, tea and supper.

£300,000 Contracts

LANCASHIRE FIRMS DEAL WITH RUSSIA.

Contracts valued at more than £300,000 have been secured as the result of several day's negotiations between Manchester merchants, Lancashire spinners and manufacturers, and representatives of the Russian Government with regard to a supply of cotton yarn and cloth.

Approximately the contracts involve 15,000,000 yards of cloth and nearly 1,000,000 pounds weight of yarn.

The cloth will be in the "grey state" and a substantial part of it is for printing purposes, the printing being done in Russia. Most of the cloth orders have gone to manufacturers in Burnley and Blackburn and a large part of the yarn business has been done with spinners in Oldham and neighbouring towns.

A Complete Replica of Canada

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 22.—(C.P.)—An exhibit of particular interest to be shown at the Central Canada Exhibition consists of a miniature replica of the Dominion constructed under the supervision of Hon. Charles Murphy and shown by the Post Office department. Canada from coast to coast is reproduced in the most minute detail for the instruction of the observant spectator with tiny trains passing through the principal cities, crossing the finely reproduced rivers, and traversing the Rockies to their termini on the Pacific coast. 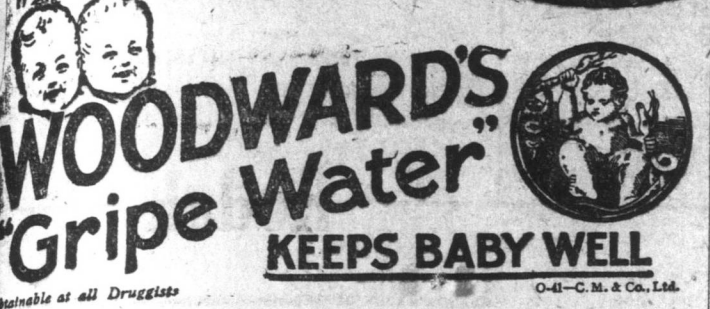

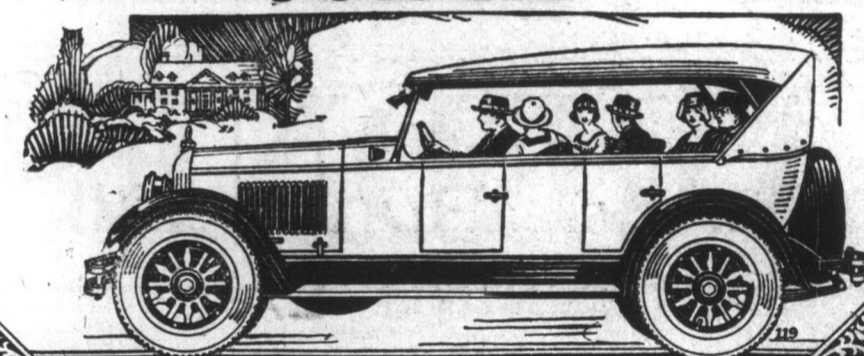

But when their mothers come with them I can't say a word to them without causing bad feeling, and it doesn't seem fair to me that I should have to put up with their tramping on my flower beds and chasing the hens and all that sort of thing and not be allowed to interfere. But if I do say anything their mothers are madder than wet hens. Yes, I love to have children as guests, but not mothers and children."

"Couldn't you say the same?" I asked, not because I needed to know but because I wanted to hear what she'd say. "She gave me a look that was more expressive than words. 'Would you advise me to? I wanted to keep on speaking terms with Lucille,'" she asked.

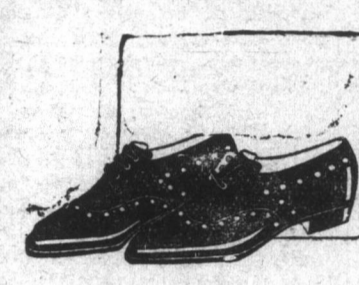

Opening of Burrard Dockyard
Vancouver's status as a unit
importance in the fast developing
Greater Vancouver was raised
notch recently when, in the
presence of about two thousand spec-
tators, the new Burrard Drydock of
10,000 tons capacity was formally de-
clared open for business by Hon. Dr.
King, Federal Minister of Public
Works, in a casual glance at the big

largest vessels entering this port sur-

raised out of the water with a degree
of ease that proved an eye-opening
to many of those assembled to witness
the ceremonies. With numerous flags
and a band playing and cheers eman-
ating from the large crowd, Tues-
day, August 11, the occasion of the for-
mal opening of the drydock will be
written in red ink in North Vancouver's
book of historical events of in-
terest.
Among those present at the opening
ceremonies were numerous officials of
the shipping concerns of the harbor
and the raising of the vessel was
watched with interest
for many months. The drydock will
accommodate any vessels of the port
up to 18,000 tons gross, which means
that the Empress of Australia, Em-
press of Canada and the Motorship
Empress will be the only vessels that
cannot be handled by the Burrard

dock is 260 feet in length, while the
second section is 300 feet long, giving
a total length of 560 feet. The entire
plant represents an expenditure of
slightly over \$3,000,000 and the dry-
dock itself cost upwards of \$1,000,000.
The shore plant consists of a new ma-
chine shop, new blacksmith shop,
storeroom, designing room, offices and
hospital. A permanent 700-foot con-
crete pier offers berthing accommo-
dation at the yard while at the end of
the permanent pier is a large crane
capable of lifting 100 tons. All the
buildings are constructed of steel, and
wood-block flooring is used in each
case. Roadways throughout the yard
are of concrete, this work having been
recently completed. The machine shop
is equipped with a 30-ton travelling
crane as well as other machinery of
the very latest type—North Shore

HAND-PRINTED PAMPHLETS FOR THE TROOPS.
Officers of the Special Branch of
Scotland Yard are searching for the
authors and printers of the literature
intended to stir up mutiny among the

The Prince is Ambassador for Great Britain
London, Aug. 24.—Correspondents
of the big London dailies and Reu-
ter's News Agency with the Prince
of Wales in his visit to South Am-
erica, naturally concern themselves
primarily with recording his per-
sonal activities and experiences, but

Aged Pastor
RETURNS TO NORTHERN MISSION
Sydney, N.S., Aug. 22.—(Canadian
Press)—"I intend to stay in the
active ministry of the Christian church
as long as I can stand on my feet,"
declared Rev. John Pringle, D.D.,
former Moderator of the Presbyterian
Church in Canada, and overseas army
chaplain, in announcing recently his
resignation to his congregation here
in St. Andrew's Church, and stating
his decision to take the post of Mis-
sion Superintendent for Northern
British Columbia, with headquarters
at Kamloops.
Dr. Pringle is in his seventy-fourth
year and came here seventeen years
ago from the Yukon. There was hard-
ly a dry eye in the church as the
veteran minister expressed his regret
at leaving the city where he had
labored so long. He said that his min-
istry here had been a happy one but
the western opportunity having pre-
sented itself he thought his duty de-
manded that he embrace it. He had
often been asked why at his age he did
not retire, but his nature was one
which could not stand idleness.
Dr. Pringle was born at Charlotten-
town, P.E.I., on June 7, 1852. He was
educated at Prince of Wales College
in that city, Queens University (B.A.,
B.D.), Kingston, and received the de-
gree of Doctor of Laws from Dal-
housie, Halifax. After teaching in
Quebec High School (1875-78) and at
the same time taking a theological
course at Morin College there, he en-
tered the Presbyterian ministry at
Georgetown, Ont., 1878, and later
held pastorates at Kildonan, (1893-
98). He went to the Yukon in 1898
and remained there until 1908 when
he came to Sydney.
In 1914 Dr. Pringle went over-
seas as Chaplain of the 17th Nova
Scotia battalion. He was promoted
Major in 1916, Lieutenant-Colonel in
1918, and was mentioned in despatches
November 20, 1918, by Sir John
French, later Earl of Ypres. Follow-
ing the war Dr. Pringle was elected
Moderator of the Presbyterian Church.

Insurance in Great Britain

THE NEW BUSINESS IN SPIRE OF DEPRESSION.

The figures giving the results of the new business in Great Britain have just been published, and show a period of trade depression and widespread unemployment. The life companies report new business of great magnitude. The fire insurance has been profitable, and the accident insurance has been un- satisfactory to the companies and the policy holders in their reports. There is a state of profound pessimism, and the advice received by the various Trust Companies of New York through its British Information Ser-

vice, according to these advices, the year has shown a number of amalgama- tions and it also has been notable as the year in which the mutualization of property life companies, one of the Scottish Temperance Life Companies and the other the British Insurance Company, both well known companies in the British Isles. One of the interesting features of the year has been the publicity given to the progress made by the insurance, while social insur- ance has received renewed attention from the recent recommendation of the Chancellor of the Exchequer for a further development of insur- ance of this nature. While such a state is out of the business, it is not its importance even in the public mind toward the insurance.

According to the Bankers Trust Company's advices, the resources of insurance companies of Great Britain at the close of 1924 amounted to less than £225,000,000 as com- pared with £320,000,000 for the last year, 1923. Of these assets, £174,000,000 were appor- tioned to the life business, something like £28,000,000 to marine and gen- eral employment liability branch, £29,000,000 to marine and gen- eral insurance, £18,8% of the as- sets in the debentures and share- holders' companies; 5.7% in ground rents, mortgages on real estate accounted for 8.7%, while £15,160,000 on policies and call loans ac- counted for 7.8%, and sundry other investments accounted for the bal- ance.



Some imagine that the plan provides for an unconditional guarantee of a bill of exchange tant amount to an en- dorsement by the guarantor. Such a belief is quite illusory and the busi- ness, if taken up by the insurance companies, must be done subject to the usual fundamental principles of insurance. Those who write credit insurance have no desire to shift var- ious claims, but the loss must be proved before payment is made. The default must be pressed to insolvency by the creditor and the debt must be admitted. Payment only of that portion of the debt insured is then made which will not be met out of the debtor's estate. Another principle is that the assured must bear a share in the loss. One of the objects of credit insurance is that traders may be able to obtain financial assistance of their bankers, and the function of credit insurance is to facilitate trade in nor- mal economic conditions as they are generally understood. It is not ex- pected to work wonders in a dis- organized world, but it is believed that such methods of insurance may be successfully developed.

Sickness insurance is receiving some attention on the part of British underwriters. At present there are only a few companies granting such insurance under a permanent con- tract.

During 1924 there were 402,000 new ordinary life policies written insur- ing a total of \$22,000,000. These figures compare with a total of \$35,000,000 new policies issued in 1923 for \$108,900,000 insurance. The pre- mium income in 1924 was \$56,000,000, comparing with \$49,000,000 in 1923. Claims paid in 1924 amounted to \$39,200,000 as against \$38,100,000 in 1923. Commissions and expenses ab- sorbed 14% of the premium income in 1924 as against 14.6% of the premium income in 1923. Detailed statistics for industrial life insurance, fire and accident insurance are not available for a later date than 1923.



Through Water From Superior to Hudson Bay

Port Arthur, Ont., Aug. (Canadian Press).—Ed. Marks, an explorer of the district, claims to have been the first man to suggest to the late Sir Adam Beck that some of the waters north of the Ontario watershed might be diverted from their course towards James Bay and turned south to supplement the Nipigon power supply, which project is now being considered by the Ontario Hydro. Marks makes the statement that a trout could swim from Lake Superior to Hudson's Bay.

The route would be up the Nipigon River to Nipigon Lake and through the Lake to Ombabika River, through the latter to Summit Lake and thence into the streams which flow north to Hudson's Bay. Summit Lake is on the height of land and its waters divide to flow in the two directions, some into the Ombabika which feeds the Nipigon and from the other end into the Little Current which later joins the Albany.

But any trout that made the trip from Lake Superior to James Bay could not return the same way, according to Marks. The fish could get up the Nipigon, but there are falls and rapids in the northern rivers which would prevent them returning.

BRITISH WOMEN'S TENNIS VICTORY IN U.S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—The tennis crown of Miss Helen Wills, of Berkeley, Calif., is at stake in the annual woman's national tournament, beginning at Forest Hills this afternoon and ending Saturday.

Miss Wills is defending the championship, which she has held two years and it is sought by 63 other stars including the British players who defeated Uncle Sam's best in team play at Forest Hills last week, when they won the Wightman Cup, emblem of International Women's Tennis Supremacy, which now goes back to England for another year's sojourn. Britain's feminine recruit, who had successfully defended the trophy Saturday, when they emerged victors by a margin of four matches to three at the end of the two-day international tournament. The invading forces clinched their

triumph in brilliant fashion when the doubles team of Miss Kathleen McKane and Miss Evelyn Collier, vanquished Miss Helen Wills and Miss Mary K. Browne, 6-0, 6-3, after the United States forces had staged a sensational uphill battle to square the series.

Holding a lead of two matches to one as a result of Friday's play, the British forces increased their edge when Mrs. Lambert Chambers, veteran captain, conquered Miss Eleanor Goss, 7-5, 3-6, 6-1, in the first match of the afternoon, but spectacular singles triumphs by Miss Wills and Mrs. Molla Mallory put the United States back in the running, until Britain's hurrican finish decided the issue.

Miss Wills gained the singles laurels of the series when she conquered her leading British rival, Miss McKane, in a tensely fought three set struggle, 6-1, 1-6, 9-7, while Mrs. Mallory turned in the other United States victory by downing Miss Joan Fry, 19 year old English girl, 6-3, 6-0.

The conclusion of the series, requiring five hours of play, not only brought out an unusually close battle for honours but also witnessed demonstrations on the part of the gallery of some 6,000 fans unparalleled in American tennis annals.

Aroused to a high pitch by the tenaciousness of the McKane-Wills struggle, the crowd grew more unruly as the play progressed, voicing vigorous protest against line decisions that seemed questionable, and later going so far as to boo Miss Wills when she finally appeared for her doubles match after delay.

Escutcheon Back After 166 Years Absence

QUEBEC, Aug. 20.—(Canadian Press)—The escutcheon of the kings of France once more is in Quebec after being held for 166 years by the town of Hastings, England, to whom it was presented by General Murray, first British governor of Canada, after he had secured it in capturing Quebec in 1759. In presenting the escutcheon back after 166 years absence to the city on Aug. 15 last, Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London, to whom the Shield was delivered by the town of Hastings, spoke as follows:

"I bear from the ancient town of Hastings to the citizens of Quebec a message of warm friendship and brotherhood and this escutcheon which, I hope, will prove a talisman to perpetuate it.

"At the great gathering at which I was entrusted with this emblem of the kings of France I was charged to say that the town of Hastings gave you back the Shield with feelings of friendship and of real affection; that they give it back as an earnest of their intense desire to see unity and brotherhood throughout the Empire and that they send it as a symbol of the lasting friendship between England and France of which Quebec should be for all-time the binding link.

"I could not fail to be deeply moved and impressed, when, in that old town (the premier Cinque port, and standing close to the spot where, William the Norman in 1066 descended upon the coast of England with his Norman and Breton followers and completely defeated the English under Harold) that I should be entrusted with this interesting symbol which I now hand to you feeling sure that it will be received with the same feelings of goodwill and esteem as those which promoted the donors.

"At the same-time as the original was handed over to me, I had the pleasure of presenting to the Corporation of Hastings a copy of the Shield for their council chamber and I trust that these will serve as two strong links in a chain to bind in lasting friendship our great community of Nations."

The Habit of Obedience

The life of every individual is largely made up of habits. The time when habits are most easily formed is during the early years of life. It is, therefore, most important not only that habits are formed which will develop the character and strengthen the will, but that the formation of all good habits begin very early in life.
Everyone interested in the children of to-day desires to see them develop into good boys and girls, and later into the right kind of men and women. Good habits are, however, essential in the child's life if he is to become a good citizen.

There are many ideals and standards to be desired, many good habits that should be formed in early childhood—truthfulness, honesty, justice, cleanliness, service, courtesy and obedience. Of these, the latter is one of the most important.

It is a common criticism to-day that children do not obey. If this is a just criticism, the fault is with the adult, not the child. It is often too much trouble to insist upon obedience; but this course will lead only to greater trouble in the future. Sometimes it is right for the child to be told the reason for a request or command; but there are times when prompt and unquestioning obedience is essential. The habit of obedience will never be formed through making unreasonable or unjust demands; but a demand once made should be followed to the end by absolute obedience.

Profits From Prophets

BUSINESSES THAT FIND IT PAYS TO KEEP THEIR OWN STAFF OF WEATHER PROFITS.

Weather conditions are a vital factor in every business, and several large companies keep private weather prophets, who are trained to observe the weather in relation to their particular business.

The London General Omnibus Company actually have hundreds of weather prophets in their employ. The London area is now so large that local weather conditions have to be carefully studied. Every inspector and timekeeper is instructed to report weather changes to the head weather prophet and traffic controller. The controller sits in a small room at Leicester Square, with a large map of the bus and Tube routes in front of him.
Suppose that a telephone message

came through that rain is threatening at Hendon, and that the wind is from the northwest. The controller calculates that rain will fall along certain routes. If these routes run near the Underground, he orders extra carriages to be attached to the trains. If there is no Underground near, he orders extra buses to be sent out.

Food And The Forecast.
Catering is another business affected by changes in the weather, and one large firm of London caterers, which has branches throughout Britain, employs two whole-time weather prophets.

These men consider weather conditions in relation to food. They know, for instance, that a rise in temperature of four degrees sends up the sales of ice cream in London alone 25,000 gallons a day. Thus, if one evening they forecast a heat wave for the following day, the ice cream freezers are set to work on the extra 25,000 gallons that will be needed.

Railway catering is affected in a very peculiar way by weather prophecy. Every railway chef has to be his own prophet, for early in the morning, when he sends in his order, he has to guess what the temperature will be at midday. All food in the restaurant car is kept on ice. On a hot day the ice melts quickly, and therefore a larger supply will be needed than on a cool day.

Big stores, who have booked space for large advertisements in the daily papers, also keep an eye on the weather. If their private weather prophet forecasts rain for the morning, the firm will rush through a sale of macintoshes or umbrellas.

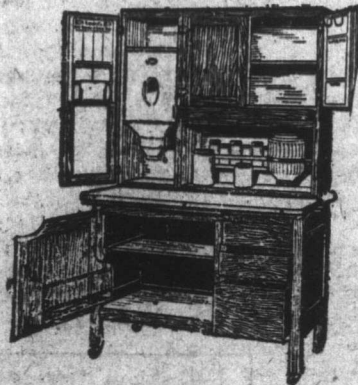
