Cold Weather of the Past.

"Speaking about cold weather" reminds us of the following incidents which we jotted down in our diary at the various times mentioned:

The statistics of the good old winter are curious: "In 401 the Black Sea war mytickly from cover 1, 768, and cold

are curious: "In 401 the Black Sca wa entirely frozen over. In 768, not only the Black Sca, but the Straits of Dardanelles was frozen over; the snow in some places rose fifty feet high. In 822, the great rivers of Europe—the Danube Elbe, etc.—were so hard frozen as the bear heavy waggons for a month. In 860, the Adratic was frozen. In 99 everything was frozen; the crops totall failed, and famine and pestilence close the year. In 1967, most of the traveller in Germany were frozen to death on the road. 1133, the Po was frozen from Cremona to the sca; the wine casks were burst, and even the trees split by the action of the frost, with immense noise In 1236, the Danube was frozen to the bottom, and remained long in that state in 1316 the crops wholly failed in Germany; wheat, which some years before sold in England at six shillings the quarter, rose to two pounds. In 1339 the crops failed in Scotland, and such a famine ensued that the poor were reduced to feed on grass, and many perished miserably in the fields. The successive winters of 1432.34 were uncommonly severe. It once snowed forty days without interruption. 1469 the wine distributed to the soldiers in Flanders was cut with hatchets. In 1664, the winter was excessively cold. Most of the hollies were isilled. Coache's drove along the Thames, the ice of which was eleven inches thick. In 1709, occurred the cold winter. The frost penetrated three yards into the ground. In 1716, booths were crected and fairs held on the Thames. In 1744 and 1815, the stronger ale mengland, exposed to the air, was covered, in less than fifteen minutes, with ice an eighth of an inch thick. In 1809, and again in 1812, the winters were remarkably cold. in 1814, there was a fair on the frozen Thames.

New York, March 15.—An official statement of the condition of the Erie Railroad Company shows that the liabilities are; capital stock, common, \$78,000,000; capital stock, preferred, \$86,536,900; funded debt, \$26,458,000; consolidated mortgage issued but not sold, \$3,886,000; loans, etc., received by collatoral, \$226,767,456; floating debts, bills payable chiefly for supplies and labor, \$1,864,000; supplies and labor to March 1st, \$1,580,-000; the assets amount to \$8,806,400; the total rents of the leased lines are \$1,117,000, the income from which is greater than the annual payments; the securities in the transury amount to \$758,400, estimated to be worth \$6,174,-100; the carnings of the road from Nov. 1871 to date are, \$21,000,000,000 in excess of the expenditures.

THE CANADIAN FISHERIES. The Secretary of the Treasury at

Washington has issued a circular to

Collectors, directing them to notify American fishermen that the provisions of the Treaty with Great Britain proclaimed July 4, 1871, relating to the fishermen will not go into effect until the laws required to carry then into operation have been passed by Congress, the Parliaments of Great Congress, the Parliaments of Great Britain and Canada, the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and to warn them that their business must be carried on subject to the ratification of the treaty. The circular states that the lishermen of the U. S. are prohibited from the use of inshore fisheries. They may, however, take fish on the southern coast of Newfoundland from Cape Ray to the Ramean Islands, and on the western and northern coast from Cape Ray to the Quiripon Islands, on the coasts from Mount Folly to and through the Straits of Belle Isle and then northwardly, but without prejudice to any exclusive rights of the Hudson Bay Company. They may dry and cure fish on any part of the sonthern coast of Newfoundland above described, and off the coast of Labrador not settled. If settled, there must be a previous agreement with the inhabitants. They may also enter any bay or harbor for the purpose of shelter, reparing damages, purchasing wood or obtaining water. British officers may go on board any vessel in any bay within three miles of the coast of Canada, and stay as long as she may remain; and they may examine the Britain and Canada, the Legislature Things Carious to Know.

Leg. Besides the fact that ice is lighter than water, there is another curious thing about it, which perhaps some persons do not know, namely: its purity. A lump of ice melted will always become purely distilled water. When early navigators of the Artie seas got out of water, they melted fragments of those vast mountains of ice called feebergs, and were astonished that they yielded only fresh water. They thought the ice was frozen salt water, not knowing that the icebergs were formed on land, and in some way launched into the sea. The fact is, the freezing turns out of it all that is not water, such as salt, air, coloring matter and all other impurities. Frozen sea water makes fresh ice. If you freeze a basin of indigo water, it will make ice as that made from distilled water. 
