SAW MILL BURNT AT NEW HAMBURG.

The hands employed at the mill went to dinner about noon, when everything appeared all right. On their return they found the mill in flames. This is the third time Mr. Ratz has had the mistortune to have his place destroyed by fire. The building contained a large quantity of valuable machinery. The loss is estimated at about \$10,000.

ELMA AND WALACE STOW.—The Show under the auspices of the Elma and Wallace Agricultural Society, was held at Listowel on the 7th and 8th insts. The weather was favorable, and the show turned out a decided success. Nearly fifteen hundred dollars were offered in prizes, and the entries exceeded fourteen hundred. There were upwards of five thousand strangers in town during the two days, and every one expressed himself highly gratified with the display, in every class. WELLINGTON FALL ASSIZES.

Tuesday, Oct. 13.

John Ramore, of Fergus, testified that Mr, and Mrs. McLean had lived in his house at Fergus, and that the two families were on Julimate terms. A letter was received last Thursday from Mrs. McLean, dated at Detroit, where she now was, as far as witness could tell. Never saw Hilen in Fergus.

Mrs. Ramore and John Collins were called, but neither was present.

A discussion arose as to the propriety of introducing the evidence given by Mrs. McDlean at the examination. It had been taken before Mr. Saunders, Police Magistrate, and Mayor Harris, on the 19th of May last, but the legal forms had not been used in writing it down. After a reference to the law on the point, the Judge decided that the evidence was illerally taken, and it was disallowed.

The law recognizes a man innocent until he is proved guity, and he must not be deprived of his liberty or his good name, until the charge is aubstantiated. Sudden Death in Erin.—On Sunday morning last Catherine Allan, daughter of Mr. Joseph Allan living on the second line of Erin, died suddenly. She rose in her ordinary state of health, and took breakfast with the rest of the family. Soon after that she went into the room, and shortly after her father going in found her quite dead. It is supposed that the cause of her death was disease of the heart. She was 23 years of age.
