

The procession now enters, headed by the Capadores, ban-derifierce and espadas on foot followed by the picadores mounted on horses, who take up their respective positions in the arena and

The picture now presented is a very strik-ing one indeed. The picadores with their broad sombreros, short coats and buckskin breeches, with their lances resting on their stirrups, sitting like statues on their hors's, while the capas and banderilleros in their while the capas and banderilleros in their perfect fitting sky-blue tights and short jacksts, resplendent with gold and silver lace, are all attention. The bugle sounds when a door leading into the arena, immediately opposite the director's box, opens and a bull is seen coming through this narrow passage. He is here given a slight reception and receives his first decoration. A man stationed over the entrance plunges into his back as he passes along a short barbed spear about three inches in length to which is fastened a knot of bright colored ribbon. Infuriated by this kind attention he literally hurls himself into the middle of the ring and for a moment stands pawing the earth and snorting with rage, while this is further developed by the ting of red flags in his face by the capas. His inactivity is of short duration. Espying a jaunty picador on his horse, he charges, with head down, at full speed at the horse. Now comes the test of skill on the part of the picador, which is to be shown in stopping the charge of the bull. If he fails in this the short sharp horns of the bull will be imbedded in the horse's body and both man and beast thrown to the ground. In order to successfully prevent this his lance must be in the direct line of attack of the bull otherwise it would be pushed to one side and the horse reached with the result as above despited. cribed. Too frequently his lance fails to strike the shoulder of the bull and then is witnessed one of the most revolting features of a bull-fight. The savage beast strikes the rse which is blindfolded, and if not killed by the first plunge is most horribly mutilated. So long, however, as the horse can keep its feet it is urged by its merciless rider, with yells and blows, around the ring so that he may have another opportunity to retrieve his past failures. When, however, the poor beast can no longer stand it is left to die and after the performance is dragged

from the ring.

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
