

**RIGIDITY OF OLD TOBYISM DOOMED TO DISASTROUS FAILURE.**

Has Absolutely Vanished From the Conservative Platform.

Adopted at the conference of Conservative Associations at Edinburgh, and is replaced by an Elastic Constitutionalism which has accepted and retained Distinctive.

London, Nov. 11.—No event in the recent history of the Conservative party approaches in importance the adoption of the new program by the conference of Conservative associations just held at Edinburgh.

The platform is frankly Democratic. It even goes beyond the Newcastonian of the Liberal in admitting popular control of party legislation, and further, it contrasts favorably with the Liberal Federation's policy, as allowing greater independence of opinion among the adherents of the principle of Unionism.

The rigidity of old Toryism has absolutely vanished and is replaced by an elastic constitutionalism, which Mr. Balfour and other leaders have accepted, though certain fossils like the Duke of Rutland continue to think incompatible with genuine Conservatism.

The program includes electoral registration reform, with a reduction of the period of incapacity required to qualify voters. This in itself is a triumph of the Liberal proposal in the same direction.

Next the conference approved the extension of the franchise to female ratepayers, the disfranchisement of illiterate voters, popular control of the liquor traffic, state provision of free assistance to workmen to enable them to acquire land for building purposes, an amendment to the employers' liability act, and factory acts in the workmen's interest.

**SOMEONE HAS BLUNDERED.**

There is nothing timid or squeamish about this proposal, but with another general election within eight months the members of the House of Commons hesitate to approve a course that is certain to arouse general repugnance.

**BLAKE IN ENGLAND.**  
His Line of Action Causes a General Newspaper Discussion.

London, Nov. 11.—The Star says Mr. Blake's arrival in London marks the final and lasting severance of his connection with the Dominion and the Conservative party in Canada.

The trade and navigation returns for the month of October show that Canada sent 1,355,754 pounds of beef west into Great Britain to the value of \$1,000,000.

At a dinner at the Liverpool Reform Club yesterday, Hon. Mr. Blake said that while the Canadians were deeply attached to their political principles, they were not less ready to accept the advantages of the Home Rule movement.

**BLAMES IT ON THE UNITED STATES.**

Officials of the Board of Agriculture Make Explanations About Scheduling Canadian Cattle.

London, Nov. 11.—The officials of the Board of Agriculture stated today that the decision to prohibit the importation of Canadian cattle was based upon the concurrent reports of three veterinary professors and to inspectors, who found four cases of pleuro-pneumonia.

The officials do not question the good faith of the Canadian authorities, but they show how mistakes may be made they instance the fact that although the United States Government has declared the whole country free from pleuro-pneumonia, five cases of the disease have been found from the United States landed at Deptford and Birkenhead.

**WAR PROBABLE.**  
With Peru and the Argentine Republic Against Chile.

London, Nov. 11.—A war is imminent between the Argentine Republic and Peru, and Chile on the one hand, and Washington, Nov. 11.—While no official information has reached Washington, the Argentine Republic on the one hand and Chile on the other, the recent course of events in the Pacific has caused a feeling of uneasiness in official circles.

At the close of the war in which Peru and Chile were engaged, Chile was completely defeated, and the provinces of the Argentine Republic were in possession of Chile, subject to Chilean law and authority, during a period of 10 years.

**AREA BELLES.**  
The Latest Trades Union in England—240,000 Possible Members in London.

London, Nov. 11.—The latest trades union development in London is the formation of the Domestic Servants' Union. Seven hundred servants have already joined, and the number of possible members in London is estimated at 240,000.

A New Machinery Act. We doubt if any master has been more legislated about than the method of dealing with the estates and persons of insolvent debtors.

The late Sir John A. Macdonald, whose shrewdness none question, whose ingenuity as a legislator no one doubts, whose wide knowledge of men and affairs all admit, shrank from the task of formulating a Dominion Bankruptcy Act as a hopeless job.

That there needs to be one uniform law for a nation seems to us to be a truism, its necessity is so obvious. Our traders in Canada face buyers selling in every province of the Dominion, it is intolerable that this internal trade should be subject to so vital a matter to so many varieties of laws as are now in vogue.

The titles of credit should be as regular, as unchangeable as the laws of the ocean. Merchants dealing in seven provinces, each with local trade laws, need to know and keep track of a body of legislation that would need a legal training, or at least a warehouse to have a resident lawyer in the office.

The outrageous laws of Nova Scotia show, too, that local legislators are too provincially narrow to be entrusted with the making of laws affecting the trade of the whole country. There any man may select a friend to be a preferential creditor, may create a bogus debt in his favor, then become insolvent, set his outside creditors at defiance and get his freedom from liabilities without paying them a dollar.

The Lake Magazine. The Lake Magazine, out to-day, contains among other excellent articles a paper from the pen of the late Hon. Mr. J. G. Macfarlane, entitled "The Revenue Tariff" which the requirements of the United States must entail for some years to come will be nearly as onerous as the present "protective tariff." And if any Canadian thinks that the Yankees in the readiness of their tariff are going to do anything of special benefit to Canada he has still much to learn. Wait and see.

Picture to yourself and then tell me if it is possible that girls can preserve their self-respect under such circumstances. Is it not more reasonable to believe that they will be dragged down to the level of the people they desire to elevate? I tell you, sir, that that is what happens in not a few cases.

Death at Fala, French Correspondent. [From The London Daily News.] The true story of the death of Olivier Pain, the French correspondent, whose mysterious journey to the Sudan in the summer of 1884 attracted so much attention, is at last known.

Judge MacMahon has taken into consideration the application of Mr. Mowat for an injunction to be granted restraining the drainage of new houses emptying into sewers which discharged their contents into the bay.

The loss of revenue now derived from the increase in population and in general prosperity would warrant the imposition of a direct tax upon large incomes and there would be no difficulty in collecting such tax under the more prosperous conditions of the country.

The management of the Chrysanthemum Show yesterday added to the reputation they have gained for thought and enterprise by admitting all school children for five cents each. The Pavilion rang with childish exclamations of delight every time boys and girls saw some beauty of the floral kingdom.

Two Imperial Spendthrifts. (From the London World.) It is not generally known that the German Empress, in spite of her many excellent qualities, is very extravagant, and owes large sums of money to a number of the Berlin tradesmen, one firm alone having a bill of 800,000 marks, or 210,000 against Her Majesty.

Want to Reopen the Closed Schools. The number of diptheria cases having materially decreased, the public school authorities wish to reopen the remainder of the rooms closed by Dr. Allen's orders. Yesterday Inspector Hughes wrote to the Medical Health Officer asking how soon the rooms could be reopened.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

The sealed verdict brought in by the jury in the case of Coleman v. Toronto was found by the judge to contain the statement that the diptheria in the Coleman family did not originate in the fact that they resided on the border of Ashbridge's Bay. On all other points the jurors disagreed, and this case will be tried over again at the January County Assizes.

The case at present in the court is that of Baker v. Essmer, concerning the selling of a farm upon false representations. The judge advised a settlement, but after a conference the participants concluded to allow it to go to the jury. The plaintiff was agreeable to come to a settlement, but could not undertake to raise a certain amount of money by the time named.
