When he reached the house Wright and Mrs. Clarke were in a state of intoxication. The body of the dead woman lay on a mattress on the floor, there being scarcely another article of gruitful. there being scarcely another article of furniture in the house. There were no marks on the body save a bruise on the

marks on the body save a bruise on the brow immediately over the left eye.

A Wound on the Ferchead.

Wright and Mrs. Clarke were too drunk to give any explanation of her death beyond the fact that she was alive but very weak when they left the house at 2 o'clock, and dead when they returned at 7. According to their statements the deceased had been suffering for some time with dropsy. A neighbor who arrived before the police took a small timpail from the hands of the deceased, Wright said he thought she had fallen from her chair and striking her head on the pail received the wound on her forehead.

Wright and Mrs. Clarke, who, it is alleged, have been living together as man and wife, were taken into custody by Detective Duncan.

The post mortem examination showed that every organ was diseased, but that the immediate cause of death was probably a severe shock.

In their evidence at the inquest, Wright and Mrs. Clarke swore that neither of them was present when the old woman died, but told contradictory stories of the hour of their arrival at the house, that evening Mrs. Clarke swore positions. Death Due to Shock.




