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THE SHERMAN SILVER BILL.

The vice on the conference report in the Senate was 20 to 20, and in the House, 172 to 90.

The House passed the measure July 14th, two days after its passage by the Senate.

By reason of the enactment of the Sherman silver act, that portion of the Bland silver bill of 1876 which required the monthly purchase and coinage of not less than \$2,000,000 of silver bullion into standard silver dollars, is hereby repealed.

The bill of 1890, as stated in the first section, increased the purchase of silver bullion by the government over that provided by the Bland bill, by distinctly saying in the first section "that the secretary of the treasury is hereby directed to purchase, from time to time, silver bullion to the aggregate amount of \$4,000,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be necessary to meet the monthly public debt statement as of the first day of each month, and to issue in payment for such purchases of silver bullion."
