

If small dealers attempt to stand out of the combine, and trust to stand out of the combine, and trust to their ability to secure local supplies, they are at once cut off from the trading list of the trust, for unless they buy all, they cannot buy anything from that corporation. It is, of course that corporation. It is, of course that corporation is of course that the course that regularity and sufficiency in the supply from local stock farms that is needed in a city trade and so the smaller dealers are forced to co-operate with the trust or close out their business. These combines of capital are doing an interesting business and each adan interesting business and each addition to the list is forcing a consideration from the people that will eventually straighten matters more in the public interest. The business is being very distinctly overdone now, and not all the members of the ring will prof-it alike with Rockefeller, Morgan and Vanderbilt. The capitalist is fencing Vanderbilt. The capitalist is fencing off for his particular advantage every avenue of trade, and toleration of his selfishness has long ago ceased to be a popular virtue. Someday men with as clear a sight as any of the great 'captains of industry' will find their way into the legislature and in a spirit of unselfishness work out the trust problem from a standpoint of national interest. The nation can resolve itself into a business communty capitalized and qualified to work the undoing of any concern that is trampling ion public privileges or oppressing the people. There are a few men who are working to this end and their hands will be strengthened when the people understand their aims and the virtue of the results attendant up-

GREAT STEAMSHIP COMBINE.

New York, April 22—The Trans-Atlantic steamship combination formed by J. Pierpont Morgan will have a capital of \$179,000,000, of which \$60,000,000 will be 6 percent, cumulative preferred stock, \$60,000,000 common stock and \$50,000,000 four and a half percent debeatures. preferred stock, \$60,000,000 common stock and \$50,000,000 four and a half percent debeatures.

The underwriting syndicate has subscribed \$50,000,000, forty percent of which was placed abroad and the remainder here. As yet the company has barely got beyond the organization stage. The corporate title is still undetermined. As announced last week the combination will have an American charter, but those in authoritively stated that "a working arrangement" has been made with the German lines—North German Lloyd and Hamberg American—as a result of which the relations between the new combination and the Common are considerable effort in arranging an interesting afternoon's work.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal said that if this service was established it would divert much American traffic.

An important concession was signed by the King of the Belgians on April 14, by which an Anglo-Belgian company secured the right to build the Cape to Cairo railway planned by the late Cecil Rhodes, through the Belgian Congo, The line north of Rhodesia will thus be diverted from German East Africa.

as a swede turnip. Some years I have planted half of each and fed the red ones first. Last year the yellow ones gave the largest yield, as well as the best quality, and I will sow only that variety this year.

The ground for mangels should be manured in the fall, though I have mostly in my own practice put the manure on in the spring, but do it early, as early as possible, using the shortest manure available. Having worked the manure in, I leave it till it is time to sow, then harrow and make the drills. I do not like sowing on the flats. I always like a drill for any kind of roots. But I do not make them high. I usually sow nearly four pounds to the acre. I put the seed into a cotton bag and rub it well, then pour it into a dish and out all the pieces of stalk, etc., so it will feed freely through the holes in the drill. It is a good plan to try the drill first on a barn floor or a smooth place on the road, to see how it sows, before putting it in drills. I use the ordinary double-drill seeder drawn by a horse. Loosen the set screws and set the shear a little lower than it is used for turnips. Watch the machine closely, and examine it screws and set the shear a little lower than it is used for turnips. Watch the machine closely, and examine it often, so as to be sure it is sowing regularly. After sowing, put on the land roller. Here is one secret of success in getting a good catch of mangels.
