In precenting to our friends another number of the Academic Gazelle, we have no ordinary pleasure in being enabled to state, that at no period have the patriotic intentions of the l'ounder and supporters of this educational Institution, been in more gratifying course of realization than during that which has clapsed since our last issue. The attendance has been greater than in any corresponding Term, and the examination exercises at the close, afforded conclusive evidence to the friends of education present, of the judicious adaptation of the system of instruction, and the ability and real of those on whom devolve the labour and responsibility of applying it. These were apparent in the marked advancement of the pupils, generally, in the several departments of study to which their attention had been respectively directed, and their familiarity with the subjects included in the general course of examination, embracing, as it did, a thorough review of the entire work of the Term.

Nor is our gratification limited to the contemplation of results already reached. It stretches onward to the future, and anticipates more of that which is destined to advantage and ennoble these Provinces-the vital germ of a mighty Empire-than our space will permit us to express. To spread the blessings of an education, combining the intellectual and the christian elements, over the whole land, at such charges as will place them within the reach of all who appreciate and carnestly desire their possession, has been, and is the commanding motive to exertion of the honoured Founder, and the Trustees and Officers of the Institution. To this sublime object, and not to purposes of personal enrichment will, nay, must, the efforts of the Board ever he directed. All that has been appropriated, whether as private subscriptions or donations, or Legislative grants, has been made subscrient to this great end; and we can conceive of only one other object for which we could urge a stronger chim upon the surplus accumulations of the wealthy, or upon the liberality of an enlightened government, than Institutions which are conducted on the principles and for the purposes thus indicated.

During the past summer the Building for the accommodation of young gentlemen has undergone a very thorough repair and refitting. All the rooms have been newly painted and papered. A more commodinus Dining Hall has been furnished and opened, new kitchen, pantries, &c., creeted, and a variety of other arrangements made, which must promote the regular working of the Institution, and increase the comfort and home-feeling of the pupils.

In relation to the spacious edifice opened in August, 1854, for the accommodation of Female Students, we may repeat the statements made in our last issue, that "it was planned and finished for the express purpose of affording a pleasant, healthy, and desirable residence for Young Ladies requiring a course of liberal educational training. Its apartments

are exceedingly commodious, and the whole Building is thoroughly ventilated upon the most approved principles. It is liberally supplied with Musical Instruments, and its numerous rooms are tastefully and comfortably furnished, so as to present a most inviting home for upwards of eighty resident students. It is designed to be in every respect, in proportion to its extent, equal to any public Institution devoted to the advancement of Female Education on this Continent."

Since our last Gazette was issued, several important improvements have been made. Among them may be enumerated, the papering of all the students' rooms—a spacious and siry Gymnasium, for the purposes of healthy exercise and agreeable recreation—five new rooms for Music practice—a large and well lighted spartment for classes in Oil Painting—with some alterations in school rooms, rendering them more commodious and convenient. Some progress has been made in suitably fencing and ornamenting the grounds.

New arrangements have been made, to give increased efficiency to our Musical Department, which has been also introduced into the Male Branch. The general direction of this Department has been committed to a gentleman of high attainments, trained and recommended by Professor B. F. Bakka, of Boston, whose talents and wide-spread professional reputation fornish an ample guarantee that the instruction given will be systematic and thorough. Professor Powers will be assisted in the Female Branch by the valuable services of Miss Smith, an accomplished pupil of the same school, and other competent instructors, and we express our utmost confidence that an education on the most approved modern principles of musical science will be here imparted to those who have time and suitable taste for acquiring so delightful an accomplishment.

By this arrangement the other teachers in the Female Branch are enabled to devote themselves to the more uninterrupted prosecution of their duties in their respective Departments, and to general oversight and Government. Thus we trust this Branch, in imitation of its senior associate, will continue to sustain its claims upon the confidence and support of parents and the public generally, while successfully labouring to clevate the tone of semale character and influence throughout the Province.

#### Female Education.

A FEW remarks upon the course of study prescribed in the Ladies' Academy, together with the principles which control the general management of its literary department, may not be inappropriate.

We heartily subscribe to the sentiment uttered by a distinguished educator of our times, that "cultivated, well regulated female intellect is the most pressing want of the age." All the measures of the Institution are adapted to this desirable end.

The superior advantages of a systematic course of study recognized universally in colleges and universities, we deem equally indispensable for securing to young Ladies the proper object of all education—mental discipline. A course of study, is carnestly recommended as a means of imparting steadiness and completeness to habits and character, as well as to knowledge; especially as a means of correcting that impatience of thought, that tendency to the desultory and the superficial, which are proverbial failings of young Ladies, and which are fostered by the ordinary modes of female education. Instead of choosing their own studies, on entering, as fancy or chance may dictate, it is considered desirable, whether they remain long enough to finish the course or not, that the order of studies prescribed should be followed, as far as circumstances will permit.

It would be superfluous to advocate what must now be considered a settled principle,—that the introduction of the abstruser sciences into a course of study for females, is of the highest utility.

The Mount Allison Ludies' Academy, afford that additional testimony on this point, to that of intitutions of a similar kind, of longer standing

It is only needed to mark from time to time the increasing vigor and correctness of thought, the improvement in judgment, and in the power of concentration, which are plainly perceptible in the young Ladies pursuing these branches, to be satisfied that they are favourable to mental development, a result which we look for with far more anxiety than for the mere display of great acquirements in knowledge. It is pleasing to find that this class of studies is gaining favor with the pupils thomselves. So far from being considered as drudgery, they are entered upon and prosecuted with an eagerness amounting almost to enthusiasm, and with the most marked success.

The ornamental branches, without being depreciated or displaced, will always be pursued in subserviency to the solid studies. They will be made the accessories and embellishments of learning, not its substitute. They may thus serve as a recreation, while they aid in perfeeting and polishing the work of education.

With reference to physical education. It is constantly kept in view that perfect health is indispensable to success in study, as well as in all the after pursuits of life. Accordingly, provision is made for such exercises as are best calculated to promote the healthy action of the system. A regular course of Calisthenics, comprehending all the movements required to develop every part of the muscular frame, is practised as a part of school duty, no more to be neglected than a recitation, without sufficient reason.

We will only add, that each new term we hail with peculiar pleasure, the unexpected return of some, whom, having finished their anticipated residence with us, we had hardly hoped to see again. This is particuarly gratifying, as affording proof that not only have they themselves acquired an interest in study, but that their parents and friends appreinterrupted attendance at school to secure thorough mental training. I young friends have been actuated.

It proves that they are resolved to give their daughters an education which regards not accomplishments merely, but one which has for its object to modify the character, and to bestow the power of self-control, one which will enable its possessor to enrich the genial atmosphere of home with calm and elevated enjoyments, or in the more expressive words of another, which will enable her "to bring from the world of science, and the world of letters, supplies to make the household fire burn brightly,"-an education which shall prepare the daughter, the sister, and the mother to exert a moral influence, the stronger always for being associated with intellectual vigor.

#### Organ for the Hall.

The desirableness of a powerful and fine-toned Organ, to aid the singing classes, and for use on other occasions, in our new Hall, has been felt since the opening of that fine edifice. The matter was recently taken into consideration by the students in the two branches of the Institution, who, we are happy to say, have, with the concurrence of the officers, formed committees for the purpose of raising the necessary funds for this important object. Their expectation is, that by application to the officers, the present and former students, and other of their friends for roluntary subscriptions, the end will be accomplished before the close of the spring Term. ## GENERAL CIRCULAR.

#### MALE BRANCH.

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This Branch of the Institution has been opened and in successful operation more than thirteen years. The arrangements which were made for the accomplishment of the important object for which it had been founded were such as obtained for it a high position in the public estimation, very early in its history; and those upon whom the direction of its affairs has devolved have been stimulated and encouraged by its prosperity to continued efforts to render it, in all its departments, ever increasingly efficient. Each year has consequently been marked by valuable additions to its educational facilities, and by more or less extensive general improvements throughout the establishment. And as it will continue to be conducted upon the same principles which have secured for it such enviable and distinguished popularity, and such extensive and continued patronage, the attention of young men and of the parents and guardians of youth is confidently but respectfully invited to it, as an Institution where, under most favorable circumstances, the advantages of a thorough intellectual training may be obtained in safety and comfort.

#### Course of Study, Classification, &c.

THE Course of Study is designed to ensure to the Student thorough preparation for comfortable entrance upon a course, either of special training for Agricultural, Mechanical or Commercial pursuits, or of specific study for professional life; it is therefore systematic and extensive, including all the branches of Science and Literature, which are taught in the best conducted educational establishments on this Continent and in Great Britain.

The aim in arranging the order in which the several subjects for study succeed each other in the course, has been, not only to secure, to the greatest possible extensible symmetrical development of all the intel-

lectual powers of the regular Student, but at the same time also to accommodate the class of worthy young men who, being able to spend but a short time in the Institution, wish to devote it all, to particular studies.

The Students being classified according to their respective scholastic attainments, are arranged in three distinct Departments. Each Department is subdivided into classes, and has assigned to it its own appropriate portion of the course of study.

#### I. PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

This is designed as a preparatory school for such of the more youthful Pupils as may not be prepared for the exercises of the classes in the higher Departments.

By omitting the Latin and Greek in the Collegiate Department, the studies of that Department may be completed in from two to three years.

But where there is no intimation of desire on the part of the Parent | 2rd " or Guardian of the youthful Student, dictating a modified course-he will be examined, and have his place assigned in the Department which he may be found prepared to join; and will be required to pursue the regular course as above given, while he may continue in the Institution.

#### The Wethod of Instruction,

Is that which, after careful observation and mature experience has been judged best calculated to interest the youthful mind, and to deve-lop most harmoniously all its powers. The best text books extant, in the various studies, are placed in the hands of the Student, who is required to make himself acquainted with successive portions of these as they are from day to day definitely assigned by the Teachers, and to furnish satisfactory evidence of such acquaintance in his recitation-rooms at appointed hours. To do this he must study, and persevering in so doing, week after week, he acquires the habit of methodical study. But to prevent the preparation for the recitation-room from becoming mere task work, and the recitations mere memoriter repetition of words and phrases, the Student is encouraged to extend his range of inquiry beond the limits of his text-book,—to investigate and think and talk for himself;-to lead him to do so is the constant endeavour of all the Officers of lustruction.

#### Domestic Arrangements, &c.

The Governor and his family, as well as the chief Preceptress and other Teachers, live in immediate and constant connection with this Academic family.

The Pamily and Class organizations are entirely distinct from those of the other Academy, and the Students of the different branches are not allowed to associate, except in accordance with well-considered and established regulations, under official direction.

Parents and Guardians of Young Ladies may feel assured that while the most strenuous efforts will be made to secure the development and strengthening of all the mental powers, and for the formation of right general habits, and a high principled moral-a Christian-character, due attention will also be given to the preservation of the health, and to the cultivation of refined taste and lady-like manners.

## SITUATION, BUILDINGS, etc.

Sackville, being at the head of the Bay of Fundy, is a retired Counry Village, pleasant and healthy, and casy of access from all parts of the Lower Provinces.

The Academy Buildings are elegant, spacious and comfortable, and delightfully situated upon an elevation of ground to that they command one of the richest and most extensive views in diffish North America.

## LIBRARY, APPARATUS, otc.

The Institution is liberally supplied with all the suzillaries desirable for either the enterprising Teacher, to aid him in his work of Instruction, or the ambitious Student, to facilitate his honorable progress.

The Library, containing about three thousand well-selected volumes is always accessible.

The Recitation-Rooms, Laboratory and Lecture-Room, are amply furnished with Geographical and Astronomical Maps and Globes, and Philosophical, Astronomical and Chemical Apparatus.

### GOYERNMENT.

This will be parental and mild, although atrict and firm. Measures of disciplinary severity will be employed only after consultation and serious deliberation, and after the trial of other means has been found insufficient to secure the observance of the rules of order and propriety. Every reasonable precaution will be used to preserve a healthy state of moral feeling. It is determined that no one shall continue in the Academy, whose character and habits are found to exert an influence unfarourable to good marals or good order. Daily records of scholarship and conduct will be made with great care.

The Principal, acting under the direction of the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee, is responsible for the general supervision, government and management of the Branch for Male Students in all its departments, all communications therefore respecting this, should be addressed directly to the Rev. #### Terms.

The Academical Year is divided into three Terms, of fourteen weeks The current Term began on Tuesday the 22nd November last, and it will close on Wednesday the 27th February, 1856. The ensuing Term will begin on Thursday the 28th February, and close on Wedthe 4th of June.

The next Academic Year, will begin on Thursday, the 14th August.

#### Vacation.

Ten weeks preceeding the second Thursday in August.

### MISCELLANEOUS REMARKS.

All who design to become Students in this Institution, should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of a Term, as the regular classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received at any time. The only pre-requisites for admission into the Prinary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the Pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

To ensure the admission of new Pupils at the commencement of the next Term, to either Branch of the Institution, early application should be made.

All the resident Students are required to devote a portion of each Sabbath to the united study of the Sacuan Scrurrenes, under the direction of the officers of the Institution.

Students in good standing in either Branch, can receive an honourable dismissal from the Institution, at the end of the Examination at the termination of any term; and at no other time except in special cases.

Students in either Branch, who may pass a satisfactory examination in all the Studies of any of the Departments, will be entitled to a regular Certificate or Diploma.

Each Pupil should bring with him:-Not less than three suits of clothes; eight day and three night shirts; six pairs of stockings; two or three pairs of shoes; two hats or caps; also a cloak, or overcoat; an umbrella; comba and brushes; and a Bible with marginal references.

Parents are particularly requested to send severy Article of Clothing marked with the number of the Pupil in full

Parents and Guardians are respectfully requested to write to the Principal or the Governor and Chaplain directly, should they find it necessary to recall a Student in Term-time.

Parents and Guardians are earnestly advised that students should be furnished very sparingly, if at all, with spending money. Money sufficient to meet incidental expenses should be lodged with some officer of the Institution, or with some other responsible person-

#### Conferential Recognition.

At the first session of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America, held in Halifax, in July last, the state of the Mount Allison Academy was taken into consideration, with certain suggestions laid before that Body by the Trustees, relative to requisite alterations in the Charter of the Institution, in order to adapt it to the new organization of the Church. Those suggestions met with the cordial approval of the Conference, and immediate steps will be taken by the Executive Committee of the Hoard to obtain from the Legislature of New Brunswick the necessary ensetment.

The sulpained resolutions were passed by the Conference, and appear in its published Minutes. The Conference appointment of Trustees will take effect from and after the Legislative amendment of the Charter of the Academy :-
