

Paris Commissioner Gets Ax.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—(Special.)

The decision of the Dominion Government, reached within the last few days, to consolidate the various branches of the Canadian service in Paris, means that Mr. Anatole Poindron, trade commissioner, will cease to hold office. The trade and commerce and immigration offices are to be placed under one roof, and Can-ada is to get more advertising in Paris than has obtained under the old system.

Mr. Poindron was appointed by the late premier and his work, it is alleged, has not been satisfactory. Under the centraliza-tion scheme the Paris offices will, It is expected, be conducted at an annual outlay of \$12,000 instead of \$50,000, the old figures.





The Great Circulation Question

The various reports on the question of newspaper circulation procured in the interests of a number of large advertisers and advertising agents, have now been completed.

These reports are largely the result of laborious research into minutest details and would occupy a large portion of an edition of a newspaper if published in full.

Four chartered accountants were engaged on the work, several of whom spared no pains to reach conclusions based on actual facts.

These reports are supported by the report of an American expert.

The reports of the chartered accountants cover a year and parts of a year, and, together with Toronto reports, establish some facts of paramount importance to advertisers. The reports establish—

1st. That The Montreal Star and La Presse are the two Montreal daily papers in the front rank, with La Patrie a good second.

2nd. That, in all Canada, The Montreal Star has the largest circulation of any Canadian paper, La Presse coming second and very close behind The Star.

3rd. The Montreal Star gives advertisers thousands of circulation more than it claims in its circulation table.

4th. That La Presse and La Patrie have for years been giving advertisers less circulation than they claimed in their circulation tables.

5th. That La Presse and La Patrie publish, besides their ordinary editions, special diminutive editions eliminating the bulk of the Canadian advertisements, but retaining the same title, that is, "La Presse" and "La Patrie." These miniature editions of La Presse and La Patrie are both circulated amongst the factory hands and others in certain cities and towns in the Eastern part of the United States, including Fall River, Lowell, Manchester, and Providence and other Rhode Island towns, and all this circulation has been included in circulation tables as bona fide circulation. This has been going on for years. In the case of La Patrie, the extraneous circulation referred to, improperly included in published statements of circulation intended for advertisers, amounts to 4,000 a day,—in the case of La Presse it amounts to some 20,000 a day.

6th. The Montreal Star's bona fide paid circulation exceeds by 14,000 a day the combined bona fide paid circulation of all the other English papers in the City of Montreal, that is, The Montreal Star exceeds the aggregate of all the others by a surplus of more than 14,000 a day.

7th. The local bona fide paid circulation of The Montreal Star, that is, the circulation of The Montreal Star in Montreal and suburbs (the Island of Montreal), exceeds by more than 13,000 a day the combined bona fide paid circulation of all the other English daily papers in the same territory.

Although there is no rivalry between the English and French papers, yet the question of relative position is interesting.

The figures of only The Star, La Presse and La Patrie are given here,—the other daily papers of Montreal falling below 30,000 a day each,—so that it will be seen that this is dealing only with the two papers of first magnitude, The Montreal Star and La Presse, each with circulations exceeding 75,000 a day, and a paper of the second magnitude. La Patrie, with upwards of 40,000 a day.

These figures are submitted as the more startling figures of the reports. It will be readily admitted that the reports justify the painstaking labors of the accountants and the expert.

As Canada has the distinction of having the only paper on the continent whose bona fide circulation is, and has been for twenty years, greater than the publishers have claimed in their circulation tables. It may be interesting to read what the American circulation expert has to say on the question. From a certified copy of his report here are his words: "Whereas the writer has, during the past year, audited the circulation of about thirty-five daily papers, it is absolutely the fact that The Montreal Daily Star is the only one whose publisher had actually more circulation than he was claiming."

The reports submitted manifest evidence of the most painstaking scrutiny.

This whole subject is of vast interest to advertisers and to advertising agents solicitous for the interests of advertisers. Here is an American expression of opinion: "A publisher who seeks business on false pretence or misleading claims of circulation, is not in a position to censure any other purveyor of goods who gives short weight or short measure."
