FASTEST MILE OF YEAR CHAS. EDWARD, 1.37 3-5

Three Favorites Win on Opening Day at Brighton Beach—Another for Roseben.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Brighton Beach opened to-day with a good crowd and a big crowd. The Brighton mile, the feature race, was won by Charles Edward in the fastest time of the year. With 114 pounds up he covered the mile in 1:37 3-5, which is but one-fifth of a second above the record mark set by Dick Wells in 1903 at Chicago. Roseben took the six furlong handicap in 1:12, with 140 pounds up, from the favorite, Suffrage. Three favorites won. Summary:

SMELTING SUGGESTIONS. Whatever may be the quality of the ores found at Cobalt, their full value has admittedly not been received by the miners from the smelters.

The government over there preserves the secret of the process, and the wise men of the west have not been able to get a line on it.

Nothing will be said, it is understood, to any private party. If the government, however, could be persuaded to interest itself so far, it is quite probable that the German authorities might be got to meet the loads of Canadian soil, and an arrangement mutually satisfactory be arrived at.

Scientifically, and in all other ways the Germans have often proved themselves good fellows, and if rightly approached by the proper parties, no doubt something would eventuate.

No one is more concerned in this matter than the Ontario government. Even on the low ground of royalties the matter is of importance.

If the Ontario Government cannot act directly, should they not endeavor to open negotiations through the Dominion Government, and, if necessary, through Downing-street, to reach the custodians of the smelting mysteries of Saxony and obtain some concessions which will enable the Cobalt ores to be treated in approved fashion?

How to get at the home side of the question is a matter to be dealt with in an earnest and aggressive spirit by all agencies concerned in the betterment of the people. The pulpit, the

press and our leading educationists (not excluding trustees) should join forces to impress upon parents the seriousness and the dignity of the task that belongs to them.

It is, however, in the schools that reform is especially needed. Nor is it a certain that reform should begin with the "method" so much as with the personality of the teacher.

It seems an ungracious thing to say, but the fact is only too painfully impressed upon the ordinary lay observer that the laxity of manners and disrespect for discipline on the part of children and parents, is to a very large extent reflected in the demeanor of too many of our teachers.

The ideal teacher should be dignified without being stiff; genial without being frivolous; firm without being tyrannical; and, above all, his actions should reveal the spirit of justice and fairness, coupled with a genuine desire to do good rather than merely keep school.

Given a set of teachers who are alert enough to the need of educating their disciples daily to higher levels, and the discovery of wise methods for educating the young who are entrusted to their care would follow in natural course.

BRITISH POLITICS. Not the least significant feature—or rather lack of feature—in the British political situation is the indifference shown by the public to vigorous denunciations of the government.

Such denunciations are directed against the ministerial policy, not in favor of it. Thus the nonconformists resent bitterly the postponement of the measures of relief promised the passive resisters who are still being confronted with the alternative of fine or imprisonment on refusal to pay the educational rate.

The Welshmen have been conducting a vigorous campaign of protest against the delay in introducing the bill for the disestablishment of the Church of England in Wales, and have only just been placated by an undertaking that it will take a prominent place in the business of the next parliamentary session.

The labor members—at least the independent section of them—show themselves less inclined to ever to work in harmony with the official Liberal party, and are also at variance with the Irish Nationalists, who on their side threaten all kinds of dire vengeance on the government for its alleged betrayal of the home rule cause.

Through all this pothole the great British public remains to all appearance utterly unmoved.

Previous conflicts with the house of lords, such as those associated with the franchise reforms, and the disestablishment of the Church of England in Ireland, have always been accompanied by vigorous popular demonstrations. These causes were completely identified with the Liberal party throughout the country, and were carried into effect by the sheer weight of public opinion expressed in a manner which could not be mistaken.

Mr. Henry Campbell Bannerman's government suffers, however, from the negative character of the program with which it went before the country at the last general election. The people unquestionably vigorously condemned the administration of Mr. Balfour—so much is admitted and indeed cannot be questioned.

That is now ancient history. The point of present importance is whether the constructive policy of the cabinet as it has been developed since power was added to office, meets with popular favor. When the Liberals were in opposition, the extreme radical section showed the most vigorous life and still dominates the party, though held in curb by the presence of Liberal Imperialists such as Mr. Asquith, Mr. Haldane and Sir Edward Grey.

No evidence as yet exists that the British people generally are prepared to abandon their long preference for gradual rather than revolutionary reforms.

THE UNITED STATES AND THE TRUSTS. President Roosevelt and the officers of the United States Department of Justice have formulated a new program in connection with the state processes against monopolistic lawbreaking corporations. It is now proposed to ask the federal courts to grant relief in one or other of the following ways:

But this long and stubbornly-contested struggle for the vindication of public rights has an immediate lesson for Canada, which already suffers from similar conditions.

If the Dominion is to provide the greatest good for the greatest number everything that men's legislation and administration can do should be done for the protection of the mass of the people.

WORCESTER, Mass., July 10.—The state police, at the end of a 12-hour investigation into the death of Chas. L. Burnap, an employe of the Edgewater Hotel, Shrewsbury, who was shot and killed at an early hour Tuesday morning, near his place of employment, arrested Mary Brennan of Worcester, aged 21, on a charge of manslaughter, early this morning.

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ULTIMATUM TO THE CITY ON UNION STATION PLANS

Must Decide in Two Months—Viaduct and Bridges Propositions Contrasted.

Once more, in spite of all that has transpired to indicate the urgency of the case, the city hall have asked for more time to consider what should be done with the Esplanade.

The gleam of light in the distance flashed from a communication from the railway commission, which was more or less of the nature of an ultimatum, and informed the mayor and his colleagues in official language that they had dilly-dallied the union station quite long enough and that plans must be submitted by Sept. 1.

The government also had a representative of the postoffice department present, George Ross, to wit, who reminded the controllers that they had made no provision yet for the new postoffice.

"Toronto has now a postal revenue of \$12,000,000 per year, with an expansion of \$100,000 per year. What we want is a site of the post office, a possible area to serve our present needs, with room for expansion in the next 25 years.

A lot of talk ensued over the question of a viaduct for the Esplanade, the cost of which was set by George Ross at \$1,000,000, or thereabouts, from two to ten million dollars.

R. C. Steele, president of the board of trade, J. W. Moses and J. P. Ellis, of that body, favored a viaduct. Cecil B. Smith, the civil engineer, and City Engineer, also recommended Barclay Parsons' plan, which would be a bridge.

Mr. Smith pointed out that bridges could be constructed as required over a number of years, while a viaduct built at once, while disarranging the railway work for three years. The viaduct would not provide for the eastern section of the Esplanade, but with bridges the Chery street district could be attended to at any time.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 10.—With hundreds of delegates already in the city and with more due to-day, the 23rd annual international convention of the Christian Endeavor is under way. The city is decorated with green and white streamers flutter in the breeze.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 10.—Extensive peasant disorders have broken out in the eastern part of St. Petersburg Province, especially in the districts traversed by the canal connecting the Baltic and Caspian Seas.

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NEW OCEAN PALACE.

The Anchor Line "California" is Modern in Every Respect.

The new Anchor line twin-screw steamship California was launched on Tuesday, July 9, from the shipbuilding yards of D. W. Henderson & Co., on the Clyde, Scotland, the christening ceremony being performed by Lady Ure Primrose.

The ship California is a strikingly handsome and imposing vessel, with a straight stem and elliptical stern, having two steel pole masts for fore and aft schooner rig and two funnels.

She is divided up so as to insure safety into nine watertight compartments and has six lifeboats, which are fitted with Marconi wireless telegraph system.

The first cabin accommodation is well arranged, with accommodation for 300 passengers on the bridge and main deck. Staterooms on the bridge deck will be luxuriously fitted with dressing, folding washstands, wardrobes and electric lights; have large square windows fitted with ornamental shutters that can be adjusted at will.
