\$12,000 FIRE IN LOMBARD-ST.

BRADSHAW'S CHEWING QUM FACE TORY BURNED OUT.

The Blaze Confined to the Second Story of the Building-Two Firemen Injured-Other Firms Will Suffer From Loss By Smoke and Water-Losses Covered By

Shortly before 1 o'clock this morning in alarm of fire brought all the central sections of the brigade into Lombard. street, where clouds of smoke were seen rising from premises on the north side, near Church-street, The entire of this side of the street is occupied by manua facturing firms.

The premises are numbered 40-42 Lombard-street, and are occupied by M. Fernandez, cigar manufacturer; Britten & Bradshaw, chewing gum and the Anglo-American Novelty Company, counter-check books. The in-terior of this frim's premises was not quite finished.

The factories in this neighborhood are built closely together, separated only by very narrow lanes, so that if the fire had obtained headway in one building, great difficulty would have been experienced in checking its spread.

P. C. Snider was the man who gave the alarm, which brought the Lombardstreet men with their engine to the scene. Inspector Stephen, with a strong posse of constables, was on the scene immediately.

The warehouse, of four stories, is of brick, with stone facings.

The fire appeared to have originated in the first floor, occupied by the Novelty Company, and spread from there through the second floor, occupied by Britten & Bradshaw. Mr. Maughan Says It May Be Reduce Eleven Millions This Year. Legislation as it affects the city was considered by a sub-committee of the Executive yesterday afternoon. Dr. Ryerson's bill to amend the Assessemnt Act was fully discussed. Exception was taken by Chairman Shaw, several of the aldermen and by a deputation of the Ratepayers' Association to the clause that the value of land having finally passed the Court of Revision and the County Judge, the council may by bylaw determine that such value shall remain for the four following years.

determine that such value shall remain for the four following years.

Ex-Ald. Defoe said the Ratepayers' Association considered the assessment of Toronto 25 per cent too high. A levelling of assessment should be made and that at once. The city was acting on false pretences in going to the money markets of the world to obtain loans on any such statement as an assessment of \$150,000,000.

Ald. Lamb replied that no towm in the world had less taxation apart from local improvements. It was the extent of these that swelled the assessment.

Mr. Defoe gave examples of inequalities of assessment. Adjoining properties in King-street between Bay and Yorkstreets were put down at widely differing figures.

streets were put down at widely differing figures.

Assessment Commissioner Maughan said he had been governed by arbitrators' figures as to remunerative values.

Ald. Hallam said that, though he had upheld the Commissioner's figures when a member of the Court of Revision, he believed that the assessment of the city generally was 35 per cent. too high.

Mr. Maughan justified the action of his department, and surprised many present when he said there was a decrease of \$11,000,000 in the assessment last year, and he would not be surprised to see another \$11,000,000 decrease this year.

'It is utterly impossible to keep up the present assessment in the circumstances in which the city is. If things get into a settled condition and values stand the assessment might stand at the same a settled condition and values stand the assessment might stand at the same figure for three years. The great objection to Dr. Ryerson's proposal is that in Toronto land values vary so much. While they are increasing in one portion they are decreasing in another. East of the Hay Market property which a year or two ago was \$11 a foot is now only \$8.50. At the same time property at College-street and Spadina-avenue had increased from \$70 or \$80 per foot to \$400.




