Africa, after the checks received by the three British columns, that of General Buller being the most serious of the war, with over a thousand casualties and the loss of eleven guns, has aroused the Home Government to further immediate action. The result of the Cabinet meeting on Saturday was the appoint-ment of Baron Roberts of Kandahar as chief in command of the Imperial forces in South Africa, with Lord Kitchener as chief of staff. The Cabinet considered that Sir Redvers Buller had his hands full in Natal. Acting on the advice of the War Office, all the remaining portions of the army reserve, including section "D," are called out. The seventh division will proceed to South Africa without delay. Nine militia battallons, in addition to the two battalions which have already volunteered for service at Malta and one for service in the Channel Islands, will be allowed to colunteer for service outside of the United Kingdom, and an equivalent number of militia battalions will be mbodied for service at home. A strong force of volunteers, selected from the yeomanry regiments, will be formed for service without delay. Local troops will be raised in South Africa. A strong contingent of carefully selected volunteers will also be sent for employmentin South Africa. The War Office unnouncement also says: "The patriotic colonies will, as far as possible, be accepted, preference being given to offers of mounted contingents."

London, Dec. 17.—The War Office to-day issued the following announcement:

"Acting upon the advice of the military authorities, Her Majesty's Government has approved the following "All the remaining portions of the army reserve,

including section 'D,' are called out. "The seventh division, which is being mobilized, will proceed to South Africa without delay.

"Nine battalions of militia, in addition to the two battalions which have already volunteered for service at Malta and one for service in the Channel Islands, will be allowed to volunteer for service outside of the United Kingdom, and an equivalent number of militia battalions will be embodied for service at home.

"A strong force of volunteers, selected from the yeomanry regiments, will be formed for service in South Africa without delay.

Mrs. James E. Rogers Was Killed Instantly and Her Body Terribly Mangled on Church Street on Saturday—The Fender Useless—Car Ran 60 Yards

Before Being Stopped.

One of the most terrible trolley fatalities | that have happened since the electric system was introduced in this city occurred on Saturday night when the life of Mrs. James E. Rogers was crushed out by motor car No. 528. Mrs. Rogers was going to her home in an open livery sleigh, attached to which was a team of horses driven by Ar-Church-street, and it was when the sleigh was crossing over the tracks at the interhappened. The trolley struck the sleigh in the side close to where Mrs. Rogers was seated, and the force of the collision threw her violently to the pavement.

Picked Up by the Fender. She was then picked up on the fender and carried some distance, only to roll off again, and receive painful injuries by being pushed along on the stone sets between the tracks. The desperate attempts of the motorman to put on the brakes made the car Principal Grant in Front.

The body was horribly mutilated, the scalp and a part of the face being completely severed. The legs were also almost cut off at the ankies, and one arm was broken

Driver Hurt Also. Arthur Kinsella, the driver of the sleigh, had a miraculous escape. The car knocked the sleigh to one side, and the horses ran over to the sidewalks, where they were stopped. Kinsella was hurled from his seat, and lay for some time at the roadside in an unconscious condition until a physician arrived, and he was able to be taken home. Two ribs were broken by the fall, but beyond this Kinsella is not seriously injured. He is resting easily at his home on Brantstreet.

An Inquest to Be Held. Patrol Sergeant Watson of the Agnessirect Division had the body of Mrs. Rogers removed to Stone's undertaking establishment, where Coroner Greig viewed the remains. That official then issued a warrant for an inquest to be held to-night at the Grosvenor House.



New York, Dec. 17.—The Washington correspondent of The New York Sun says:

The action of the Boer authorities in granting only part of the concessions requested by this Government in behalf of the British prisoners at Pretoria has apparently intensitied instead of abated the feeling in official circles here, growing out of the manner in which the Boers have treated the humanitarian overtures of the United States. While the Transvaal-authorities have agreed to furnish a list of the Hritish prisoners of war and statements of the condition of the sick and wounded among them on application, they have totally Ignored the request of the United States that the American Consul at Pretoria be permitted to distribute among the prisoners money with which to buy delicacles and tobacc.

The U. S. Feels Sore.

These requests of the United States were made after the Boers had declined to furnish lists of prisoners and statements of the condition of the sick and wounded among them, and to allow Consul Macrum to distribute money to his temporary charges. The attitude of the Boers is regarded here as not only contrary to usages in civilized war, but extremely discourteous to the United States, a neutral mation, which islanctuated merely by humanitarian motives in endeavoring to care for the British prisoners.




