

Plethors of Money.

One remarkable and significant fact, says the New York Post, is developed by the complete and detailed returns of the national banking system issued by the Comproller. This is the immense extent to which interior institutions have been contributing their resources to swell the working capital at New York. Two years ago, the entire amount due from national banks to other institutions had mounted to \$513, 100,000, or double what it was in 1892. The year ago, owing to the money squeeze in the winter of 1899, it had declined to \$55,872,000. The figures now compiled from last month's returns to the Comproller show the huge aggregate of \$1.205, 165,000. At New York City alone, a year ago, the total amount due by the national banks to other institutions was \$337,425, 160; this year it is \$476,140,069. This is in increase very much greater than the increase of individual deposits in the eriod.
