London, June 27.—At the opening of the inquest into the Nihnan murder, held this evening at the Court House, before Coroner Ferguson, four witnesses were called—John Charles, the Indian, who saw the murder; Levi Doxter, David Williams and Jonas Cooper, James Masee, K. C. County Crown Attorney, acted for the Crown, while Mr. Fauld of the firm of Troth, Fauld and Co. acted for the defense.

The prisoner, McArthur, who is charged with Nihnan's murder, was called after each of the four witnesses told his story, he was cross-examined by Mr. Magee, Mr. Fauld and the coroner. The inquest was then adjourned until Monday evening at 8 o'clock.



INSPECTOR HUGHES TO STAY

On Condition That He Be Placed in Charge of the Inspectorate and Be Held Responsible.

HAD DIFFERENCES WITH MR. CHAPMAN But They Did Not Cause His Resignation—Committee Decides to Keep Him.

It was brought to light at a meeting of the public school management committee yesterday afternoon that there has been friction between the senior inspector, Jas. L. Hughes, and the junior inspector, W. F. Chapman, but that it was not owing to this that Mr. Hughes tendered his resignation.

The matter of Mr. Hughes' resignation was presented in a report from the sub-committee on Monday. Mr. Hughes' resignation was recommended that the report of Inspector Hughes be not accepted, but that he be placed in charge of the inspectorate and be held responsible for the administration thereof.

Trustee Douglas believed that two inspectors were a necessity, but wanted to know who was behind Mr. Hughes' resignation. He thought the sub-committee on teachers should take the management committee into their confidence.

Dr. Noble, chairman of the Teachers' Committee, declared that the newspaper reports of Mr. Hughes' resignation were wrong, which opinion was also shared by Trustee Kent.

The Reasons Why. At this juncture Mr. Hughes spoke. He said that he never had any cause of trouble with any of the members of the board, who he had been treated outrageously by some of them. He had had conferences with Mr. Chapman, but they were not responsible for his resignation. He had received four offers of resignation until he tendered his resignation. Mr. Hughes declared that he never once had spoken to any trustee in regard to an increase in salary. He would not stay if offered \$10,000 a year under the present conditions.

Trustee Douglas said that he had never realized that he was held in such high esteem by the officers and teachers until he tendered his resignation. If it were desirable that he should stay he would do so at a sacrifice to himself. He would remain on one condition, and that was to be placed at the head of the department and be responsible to a committee of the board. He had always experienced trouble with Mr. Chapman, but did not want to refer to it. Anything he did was done above board. If an investigation was ordered he would be prepared to go on with it.

Would Keep Him Home. Trustee Douglas said if Mr. Hughes remained he would endeavor to keep him at home and not allow him to go about lecturing in the United States.

In answer to this Mr. Hughes declared that he had spent one day a year lecturing in the United States, and when he did so it was at his own expense. He had recently received an offer of \$500 to go to a convention in California and deliver an address. On his lecturing tour he had not been away on Saturdays and holidays.

Trustee Douglas still contended that Mr. Hughes should remain at his post all the time. Dr. Noble thought it was good training for Mr. Hughes to go abroad.

Mr. Douglas was aware that Mr. Chapman differed with Mr. Hughes in many things, but he believed in the value of the school system. The instilling of American ideas into the school system of Toronto was a cause, said the speaker.

Trustee Jones' Views. Trustee Jones agreed that there could not be two heads in the department still he did not want to see either Mr. Hughes or Mr. Chapman leave the service of the board.

A LETTER FROM LOND. A. H. St. Germain of Deer Park Tells of What He Sees.

A. H. St. Germain of Deer Park, who is at present in London, Eng., writes The World an entertaining letter under date of June 16. He says: "On Sunday last hundreds of thousands of people assembled outside of Buckingham Palace, and especially in Trafalgar Square, the Strand, Fleet-street, and along the whole route to St. Paul's Cathedral to see the King and Queen, Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of the royal family, members of the cabinet, generals and officers in full uniform, and many distinguished peers and civilians, all wearing their way to the solemn thanksgiving services of an empire. On the way the royal carriage stopped at Temple Bar, when a ceremony reminiscent of historic rights and privileges of the city of London was performed. Here, at the farthest western boundary of his dominion, the Lord Mayor waited in state robes, accompanied by the City Marshal, the City Remembrancer, the mayor, and a score of other officers, the royal carriage stopped, and Joseph Chamberlain, the Lord Mayor, in the name of the citizens of London, did you welcome. The King touched and saluted, and said: 'Thank you very much.' 'When their Majesties entered the cathedral the cheering of hundreds of thousands of people rang clear, and the joy bells rang from all the city churches. The Colonial Agents-General are having an arduous time selecting those who will occupy the seats of the colonies by the disposal of the colonies by the government, the applications being at least double the number of seats available. Some of the agents have got over the difficulty by balloting. Extraordinary applications were applied for to obtain seats. Several applied because their great-grandparents were early settlers in Australia, one because his cousin was resident in Natal until five years ago, and another because the governor of Australia had promised to give him a seat. 'In London everything is commotion. The royal family are taking a deep interest in the function. The King and Queen have twice visited Westminster Abbey to inspect the preparations, and have been delighted. A part of the coronation procession will comprise two miles of mounted men, including prices, Bengal cavalry, colonial troops, and Malay, African Indian Cavalry, Maltese and Cinghese soldiers. An architect has figured out that the total number of seats that can be placed along the route of march will be 402,800. He approximates the number of persons desiring seats as follows: Americans, 120,000; provinces, 150,000; colonies and foreigners, 30,000; leaving for London and suburbs about 200,000. The prices of seats vary greatly. In the Strand they range from 5 to 8 guineas; 40 suburban windows on the first floor, and 25 guineas for windows on the second floor. The market for seats has been desperate efforts to keep the market—now exorbitantly high—from falling lower. People who bought seats had little regard for cost, but it will be interesting to see how the speculators will fare as the day approaches. I firmly believe that if the public remain moderate, as they are at present, there will be melancholy vista of empty seats on Coronation Day. 


