






The Standard Oil Company, it is suid, entered the Roumanian field with the purpose of purchasing the entire Roumanian oil field properties, and set about to obtain the right to erect pipe lines leading from the Ploesci fields direct to the port of Constanza, on the Black Sea. These efforts met with violent opposition, and the opinion was freely entertained at the time that other governments whan that of Roumanian combined to defeat this privilege. As a consequence, the Standard Oil Company, it is said, had to content itself with properties already obtained, and since 1995 has been in active competition with P. u. sian refineries.

Following the efforts of the Standard Oil Company to acquire the entire Roumanian oil fields the Roumanian government passed a law which prohibits the sale of government owned fields. The conditions of the lease are regarded as onerous, but Prussian interests have managed to continually acquire additional holdings, until before the present war.

Members of the Fund Committee Clearly Explain Whole Case-Family Now is Receiving \$103. 50 a Month

A former member of the Ladies' Committee of the Patriotic Fund, but is not now connected with it in any way, tells

"Mrs. Isabella Parsons, of Marsh road, is the mother of seven children. The oldest is thirteen and the youngest twelve months. The father enlisted in August. The case came under the notice of the Patriotic Fund; the woman was entitled to \$30 a month besides her \$15 a month as part of her husband's pay and \$20 per month as separation allowance. From a decision of the Patriotic Committee she was to receive \$30 a month.

With the notification of this fact, there
was enclosed a check for \$10 and a grocery order for \$10. Later on she got \$10
more. For the first month she got \$20
in money and a \$10 grocery order Of
her next month's allowance from the
Patriotic Fund, she received—\$10. From
that day to this, despite every attempt
she has not received a cent. Instead of
\$120, her due allowance for three months,
she just got \$40. The woman, who tells
this story, said that she knew a man
who gives \$500 to the Patriotic Fund
yearly and until this case is seen to, he
refuses to give another cent."

15, and as it was represented that the family was in need an order for \$10 in groceries was sent out in advance of the regular check. Later a check for \$20 was sent, making \$80 in all, paying up to Sept. 15th.
