For the four others warrants were issued. These will be forwarded to Washington for immediate execution, unless assurances that they will voluntarily come into court are re-ceived from the defendants this after-noon.

noon. The two who surrendered during the forenoon were David Lamar, alleged paymaster for Captain Franz Von Rin-telen, and Jacob Taylor, of East Orange, N. J., president of labor's national peace council, the medium through which, the government alleges, Von Rintelen sought to direct his activities. Both entered pleas of not guilty, and were released in \$5,000 ball.
