KAISED ARRIVES FOR THE FEDERAL

German Ruler Gets a Very Hearty Greeting MET BY THE KING

People Doff Hats As Emperor Drives to Palace—Great Throng Again for Last Look On Face of Edward VII.—Canadian Special Notes

London, May 18—Emperor William arrived in London at noon today. The German imperial yacht Hohenzollern reached Sheerness last evening, but His Majesty did not land until this morning, when he proceeded to the capital.

At Victoria station the emperor was welcomed by King George, His Majesty's eldest son, the Duke of Cornwall; the Duke of Connaught, Prince Henry of Prussia and others of the royal family and diplomats. The greeting of the monarch was most affectionate. From his cousin, the emperor turned to greet the Duke of Cornwall and kissed him on both cheeks.

As the emperor and King George drove to Buckingham Palace great crowds in the streets exhibited a lively interest in the German ruler. The men raised their hats and the women waved their handkerchiefs as the royal carriage passed. Arriving at the palace, the emperor was taken at once to the apartments of Queen Mother Alexandra.

At Victoria station, Sir G. H. Reid and Sir Alfred Jones will occupy the ninth carriage tomorrow following ex-President Roosevelt and M. Pichon.

Sir G. H. Reid said yesterday that the arrangements were in every respect satisfactory and show a proper conception of the seven held by Canada and Australia in the empire in whose name they represent the place held. The arrangements made by His Majesty's command will give the utmost satisfaction to the people and are such as might be expected from King George, who has such a perfect personal acquaintance with every part of the empire. Visitors from over the sea will be allotted special places in the enclosure in Hyde Park, to witness the funeral progress.

London, May 19—The king will send a royal carriage for Lord Strathcona to attend the funeral. Mr. Miles of Montreal will represent the Montreal board of trade. Mr. Cockburn of the Bedford board of trade and Colonel Burdell has sent a wreath on behalf of the Ladies' Association of Montreal. There is also a wreath from the tuberculosis hospital of Montreal, recently opened by King Edward. The Canadian office is doing all possible to furnish seats for visitors, but have only sixty seats at their disposal, and there are 460 applications.

COMET HAS FOULED THE WORLD; WERE NOT MET THROUGH THE TAIL

A Swish to One Side Delayed Earth's Passage Until Today

Rain Checks for Delayed Performance is the Way Despatch Sums it Up—Astronomers' Reports After Observations of Last Night Made Known This Morning That We Still Have the Journey to Make, Though Some Say Comet Will Side Track Us

New York, May 18—The most careful computation of the world's greatest astronomical astronomer have gone wrong over the central appendix of Halley's comet. The comet, which is now on its way to the earth, was not on the tail, which might be compared to the shadow of a planet, or the moon eclipsing the sun, did not pass through the comet's tail.

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AMHERST LOSES TWO CITIZENS

Government Prepares a New Declaration

David T. Chapman and R. W. Ambrose Dead—Latter, Well Known Traveller, Stricken With Apoplexy While in Bridgewater

Amherst, N. S., May 18—(Special)—Death came suddenly to two of Amherst's best known citizens last night. David T. Chapman, head of the firm of Chapman Brothers who died at his home here and R. W. Ambrose, traveller, who died very suddenly in Bridgewater.

His wife who was a daughter of the late Dr. Nathan Topper, and niece of Sir Charles Tupper died about six years ago. The surviving members of the family are Garnet K., associated with his father in the business; Miss Miller, at home; Mrs. Victor G. Curry and Miss Gertrude, in New York; his mother, Mrs. David Chapman, and brother, A. W., residing in Dorchester. R. C. Fuller and D. W. Robb are brothers in law.

At ten o'clock last night word of the death of B. W. Ambrose, the well known commercial traveller, reached here from Bridgewater. Apoplexy caused Mr. Ambrose's death. It is understood that he only ill a few hours. For some years he had made Amherst his headquarters, representing the Imperial Oil Company and other concerns. He was perhaps the best known traveler in the province.

At this time certain observations were made that may be of importance in adding to scientific comet lore. There was compensation for the scientists, however, in a spectacular exhibition of aurora lights and in some meteoric phenomena. The scientists said they believed there was no direct connection between the aurora borealis and the comet.

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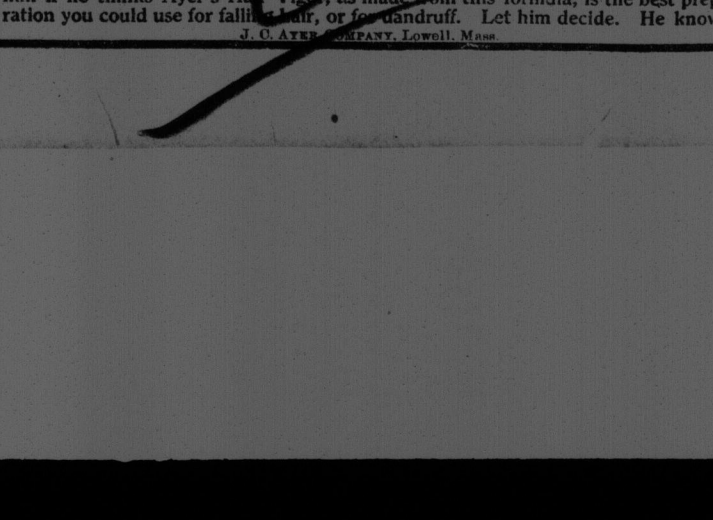
