



Englishwoman 70 Years Old Now Plans Trip to Africa.

London, Oct. 25 .- Three times round the world in three years is the record of Mrs. Roumleu, F. R. G. S., who lives in Southampton. Although approaching 70 years of age, she is now planning a visit to South Africa during the winter. She hopes to reach the Victoria Falls on the Lambesi River.

"The desire for travel came to her as a girl," but she was nearly 50 before she undertook the really long journeys, and since then she has traveled many thousands of miles.

"Since my husband's death, in 1912, I have visited practically every country in the world, and I know all the capitals of Europe," said Mrs. Roumleu. "I have traveled on all sorts of vessels, small ones and big, fast ones and slow. I was on the Cunarder Mauretania when she broke the world's record for crossing the Atlantic from New York to Queenstown.

"Though I have voyaged on almost every ocean, I have never been seasick, and the worst storms have not robbed me of a night's rest. There's nothing like the open sea for health and pleasure.

"My long trips have been singularly the world in three years is the record

like the open sea for health and pleasure.

"My long trips have been singularly free from accidents and shipwrecks. But I was shipwrecked once, not on a long voyage, but in crossing from Penzance to the Scilly Islands. I was none the worst for it, however.

"Last winter I went to India, Burma, and Ceylon. I have also traveled the islands of the Pacific, and covered every continent. I have seen many beautiful places, but I think the most lovely spot in the world is Honolulu.

"Yes, I hope to make many more journeys. In the three voyages around the world I covered about 100,000 miles or more, and I have traveled extensively in other directions, so that my total mileage must be very great.

"They sometimes tell me I am the most traveled woman in the country, but I do not know whether that is so. I only know that for 20 years I have covered nearly every country in the world, and I have enjoyed every inch and every day of it."

Of the 45 unindicted cases, one-third of the assailants remained at large, 22 committed suicide and in eight the evidence was insufficient to warrant indictment.

"Among the 69 indictments, eleven were 'no trial' cases. In the remaining 58 trials, verdiets of 'not guilty' were rendered in 16 cases, or 27.6 per cent. Of the 41 adjudged 'guilty', 35 served time with appeal pending in six cases; three were held for new trial, one was paroled and one was executed.

Suffer Stagnation Under Soviet Rule and Pumps are Idle.

Baku, Azerbaijan, Oct. 27-No part of Russia seems to possess more attractions for the American capitalist oil fields on the Caspian Sea. If properly developed these wells are capable of producing sufficient gasoline; kerosene, lubricating oil, vaseline and byproducts to keep the entre world supplied, it is said. But in their present state the fields present a melancholy picture. Only a small percentage of them are in actual operation. The great wooden derricks and the pumps, compressors and drills on the remaining wells are fast falling into decay. It is as if a great storm had suddenly visited a primeval forest, stripping the trees of their limbs and roots, and leaving ruin and desolation in its wake. At a distance the idle, decaying derricks, which cover an area of 60,000 acres, resemble a vast cemetery of conical tombstones. Increase in Cotton Culture— American Girl Teaches

Erivan, Armenia, Sept. 25.—(Associated Press, by mail.)—American methods of cotton-growing are being introduced into Armenia. A new cotton factory equipped with modern American machinery has just been completed in Erivan. At the present time more than 40,000 acres of cotton are under cultivation. This is 40 times greater than the acreage under cultivation in 1921. The Armenian government expects this year to produce 30,000,000 pounds of raw cotton. One factory in Erivan has an output of nearly 2,000,000 pounds a month.

In order to encourage farmers to cultivate their own cotton fields, the government is allotting them large quantities of free seed. The government pays \$2.75 for 40 pounds of the raw material. The present average yield is about 1,000 pounds an acre.

Djalal Oglu does not appear in any gazetteer or geography. It is a town of 6,000 souls, detached from the outside world and buried in the heart of the mountains of Armenia. It doesn't even boast of a telegraph office, newspaper, automobile or trolley-car. But there is a Vassar College girl here, Miss Phyllis Brown of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., who is teaching the Armenian American methods of farming.


