The tunnels would be 100 feet below the bottom of the Channel—a solid cover of chalk over the roof of the structure. The present proposal is to have a tun-nel thirty-two miles from daylight to daylight. On the English side it will start from a point between Folkestone and Dover; on the French side between Grisnez and Calais. The whole of the work will be carried out with electricity, with which the tun-nel will be lighted and the trains driven. Electrical trains will convey the work-men to and from their work and it is anticipated that the daily rate of pro-gress will be such as has never before been secured.

Only one cook was reported to have made her appearance at the bureau dur-ing the entire week. The totals in all lines of work including the casual work-ers for the week, were forty-one appli-cations for work, 131 employers' orders and twenty-one positions filled. In the out of town districts there were nine girls asked for work, twenty-two em-ployers' orders and one vacancy filled. Mistresses have become discouraged, and are seeking for men to do housework now," said Rev. Miller, as he told of a woman in Rosedale who secured a boy in his second year at High school, who was forced to give up his schooling. He is doing all the cooking and waiting on table for \$40 a month and board, and attends night school." If we could get a few more lads like this one, it might ease up the situation, he said.
