They found little sea and damp and expressed the belief that conditions would permit some of the entombed miners may still survive. Some bodies were found.

A PULP WOOD MATTER

New York, April 30.—The Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills Limited, of Canada, failed in a contention before the court of customs appeal asking for the free entry of ground wood pulp under the reciprocity treaty between this country and Canada. The decision says that a government concession to cut pulp wood on crown lands, a state was passed imposing a special charge on woodpulp exported in instances where the pulp-wood was cut on public lands. Later the company succeeded in an agreement with the authorities whereby no export tax would be levied on the concern's products shipped to foreign countries. Importations into this country were charged the full duty. The board of general appraisers sustained the claim, but Judge Barber says in his decision for the court, announced today, that to sustain the importers' protest would be an evasion of the royal law which is designed to prevent restriction of every kind in the export of pulp wood from Canada. The decision says that the court is unwilling to adopt such a construction.

VERDICT IN FULL FOR MR. NAGLE IN NOTE CASE

Jury Answers All Questions In His Favor—Decision Carries Face of the Note and Interest

The jury in the case of Thomas Nagle vs. the Quebec and St. John Construction Company, and the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, after being out an hour and a half returned about 12:20 o'clock today with answers to all 12 questions in favor of the plaintiff. A verdict accordingly was entered for the plaintiff for \$12,118.42 which included interest.

Convicted of Twenty Scott Act Offences in Moncton

Richard Must Pay \$1,065 or go to Jail For Five Years—It is Feared Boy is Drowned

Moncton, N. B., April 30.—This morning Legar R. Richard was convicted on twenty Scott Act charges and sentenced to a term of five years in the penitentiary or to pay a fine of \$1,065 in default of payment to serve five years in jail, three months for each offence. This is said to be a record C. T. A. penalty in a Moncton court. Richard says he cannot pay the fine and must serve time.

PAY PASTORS FIFTEEN DOLLARS PER WEEK

Starting Fund to Increase Pay Inspires Fear of Ruined Independence

London, April 30.—The Baptists of Great Britain tonight celebrated their 200th anniversary in the Albert Hall the completion of the fund of \$750,000 to provide more adequate stipends for the ministers of the church. At present 140 ministers receive less than \$775 yearly, while 700 are paid less than \$750.

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IMPORTANT MOVE IN IRISH MATTER

Steps Towards Peace In The Home Rule Situation

LAST NIGHT'S SPEECHES

Big Men of Liberal and Unionist Parties Declare Themselves But Nationalists Take No Part—Door to Settlement Still Open (Canadian Press) London, April 30.—The proceedings in parliament last night gave still another turn to the home rule kaleidoscope, and the general opinion of the house at the conclusion of the debate on Austen Chamberlain's motion for an inquiry into the alleged "plot" against Ulster, was that a highly important forward movement in the direction of peace had been made on both sides.

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Why The Delay In Naming The Royal Commission?

Moncton, N. B., April 30.—The Transcript today prints a vigorous editorial protesting against delay in appointment of the royal commission to investigate the Dugal charges. It says "There is willingness on the part of the opposition in this province to await a reasonable time for investigation and decision of the royal commission, but there is no disposition to await an indefinite period. If a royal commission cannot find out the facts, or if a royal commission does not act, this inaction does not by any means limit the possibilities of educating public opinion through the disclosures. They can be made in the columns of an independent press and should be so made. The lieutenant governor should either act or say that he does not intend to act in the appointment of a royal commission. The hour has come for plain speaking."

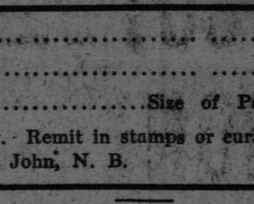

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

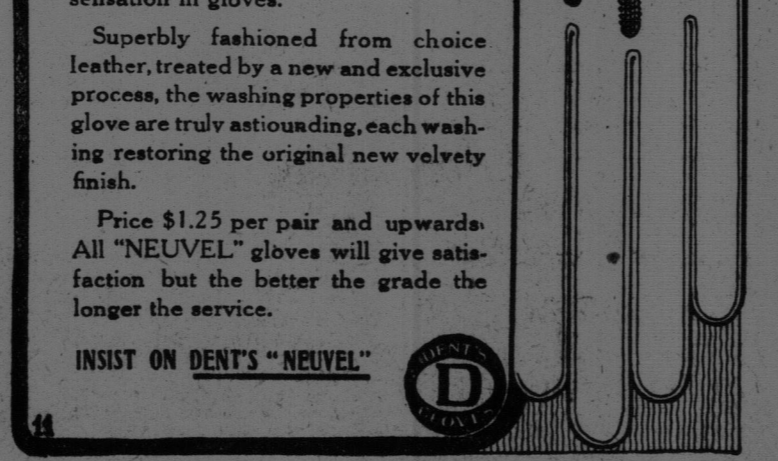

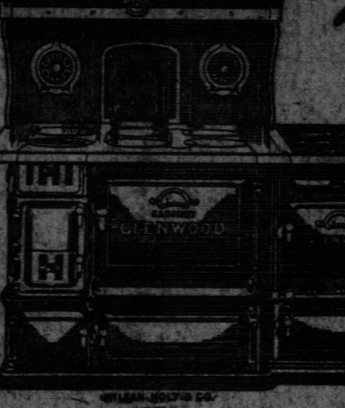

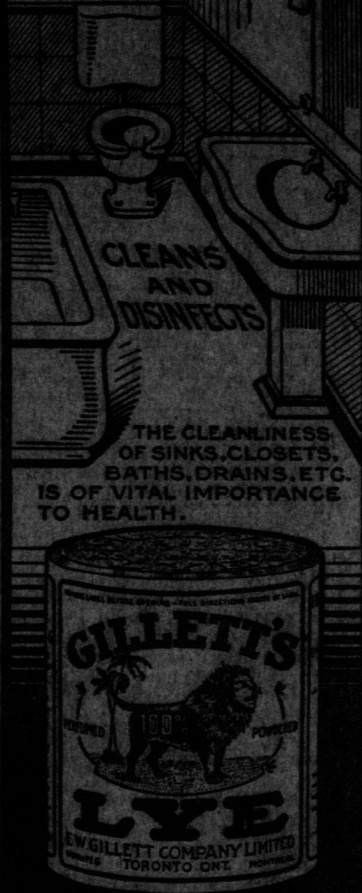
Found Guilty of Grand Larceny
MAY BE GIVEN TEN YEARS

Arrested For Transactions Relative to Estate of Mrs. Rosa Szabo, Sent - Twice Tried on Charge

On April 29—Burton W.
