

C.P.R. BAY SERVICE

The Yarmouth Times says that it is stated in railway and steamship circles that the 22 knot steamship St. Andrew is soon coming to Canada from the other side and will be placed in commission in Nova Scotia—New Brunswick waters. The St. Andrew is at present owned by the Fishguard & Rosslare Railway & Harbor Company and is now performing a service in the English Channel.

The ship was built in 1908 by J. Brown & Cd., Glasgow. She is 351.1 in length, breadth 41.1, and depth 16.5. Her gross tonnage is 2,528, and net 1,034, triple steam turbines.

The Times has no definite information as to the particular locality in which the steamer will be employed, but the fact that it is freely stated that the C. P. R. will inaugurate a fast service between Montreal and Halifax over its own sysem leads it to believe that the flyer is untended for the St. John-Digby service, to seems to be taken for granted that the P.
