



London, May 7—Another strike in the shipping trade has been precipitated by the National Sailors' and Firemen's Union, and the National Union of Ships' Cooks and Stewards, whose officials this morning called out all the men in the employment of the Peninsular & Oriental Steamship

Company.

The unions demand that at least two white seaman as well as coxswain shall be carried for each lifeboat.

The Peninsular & Oriental Company has refused to concede the men's demand. A special meeting of the transport workers has been summoned, and will be asked to support the action of the unions.
