TWENTY-SEVEN NURSES GRADUATE FROM GENERAL PUBLIC HOSPITAL

Needs of Hospital are Outlined by Speakers at Public Exercises.

That the General Public Hospital nust have the financial aid of the monied people of the community if it was to continue its work of ministering to the sick and afflicted was the keynote of the address given by M. E. Agar, president of the Board of Hospital Commissioners, last evening, at the Nurses' Home, when the graduation of nurses took place. Dr. Thomas Walker and Dr. Walter W. White, past presidents; Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Public Health, and Mrs. J. Verner McLellan, commissioner of the Hospital, were on the platform with Mr. Agar. Miss Margaret Murdoch, superintendent of nurses, sat in the front line with her graduating class. His Worship Mayor Potts and Mrs. Potts were present. Commissioner R. W. Wigmore and Mrs. J. Boyle Travers, vice-president of the Women's Hospital Aid all spoke words fo congratulations to the graduating class; praise to the president for his untiring faithfulness in carrying through such treemedous projects, congratulations upon the appointment of Mrs. McLellan as commissioner, who had accomplished things that otherwise could never have been done and joint praise to Mrs. McLellan and Alexander McMillan, D.S.O., for their work in preparing such an excellent programme.

Mr. Agar gave some statistics of the bermanent improvements made in the hospital in the last eight years, which included the Nurses' Home, \$210,000; chief work in preparations, \$2,000; epidemic hospital, \$85,000 and many other additions, amounting to \$417,000 in the eight years outlined. He said that the yearly expenditure for supplies had amounted to about \$100,000 and each year called for more expenditures, as the demands grew for those who could not pay, but who must be cared for. For this reason the people must see how necessary it was to give financial support.

Mr. Agar also said that it was not necessary for people to die to bestow their wealth upon this institution, but he hoped that some of those with means at their disposal would in the evening time of life enjoy the privilege of see-







HOUDINI UNMASKS SPIRIT MEDIUMS

Magician in Book Says He Cannot Accept Any Evidence So Far.

New York - Harry Houdini, the nagician, is a most unpopular man in the West 72nd and West 89th street

the West 72nd and West 89th street sections of this city. In these two sections there are more professional spiritualists per square inch than any number of persons can shake any number of stickc at.

But Houdini's book will do little to lessen the belief of confirmed spiritualists. "Once a spiritualist, always a spiritualist," might be an apt slogan, certainly it would be the truth. Houdini may be right, but he is butting his head against a stone wall.






