



Elders' Districts.

The Congregation is divided into fourteen districts. Each district is assigned to one or more Elders. The Elders visit the families in their respective districts, note changes of residence, and acquaint the Minister and Session of cases requiring special attention, such as sickness, &c. *For residence of Elders see preceding page.*

DISTRICT No. I.—Mr. JAMES TASKER.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Mile End.

DISTRICT No. II.—Mr. C. D. PROCTOR.

From St. Lawrence street (not inclusive) East to Long Point and Longueuil and from the River north to city limits (including Petite Cote).

DISTRICT No. III.—Mr. ROBT. WEIR and Mr. ALEX. MCFEE.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the river and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV.—Mr. T. A. GIBSON and Mr. JOHN TAYLOR.

From Union avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park avenue (inclusive), from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. V.—Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR.

From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI.—Mr. JOHN L. MORRIS and Mr. P. S. ROSS.

From McGill College avenue to Union avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the mountain.

DISTRICT No. VII.—Mr. G. M. KINGHORN.

From University and Hanover streets (inclusive) to Beaver Hall square (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the river by McGill street.

DISTRICT No. VIII.—Mr. ALEX. MACPHERSON.

From McGill College avenue to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the mountain.

DISTRICT No. IX.—Mr. JAMES A. CANTLIE.

From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to University and Hanover streets (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street to the river by Duke street (including both).

DISTRICT No. X.—Mr. JAMES CROIL and Mr. ALEX. MITCHELL.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to St. Mark street (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI.—Mr. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XII.—REV. DR. J. CLARKE MURRAY.

From St. Mark street (inclusive) to Cote St. Antoine, and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Cote des Neiges.

DISTRICT No. XIII.—Mr. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the river by Ann street.

DISTRICT No. XIV.—Mr. JOHN LARMONTH.

From Mountain and McCord streets (not inclusive) to farthest West, and from Dorchester street (not inclusive) to the river and Lower Lachine road.

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PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at Eleven A.M. and Seven P.M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednesday Evening at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P.M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.

THE MINISTER'S BIBLE CLASS for Young Men, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock.

YOUNG WOMEN'S CLASS.—A course of Biblical study will be conducted this winter by Mr. Barclay.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May and October.

ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.

THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation, appointed at the annual meeting.

The fund for the support of a missionary in India, undertaken by the congregation four years ago, is now under the management of Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, to whom contributions for this purpose should be sent : *Address No. 22 St. John street.*

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.

THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION meets in the School-room every Sabbath Morning at a quarter past Ten o'clock, and on alternate Monday Evenings at Eight o'clock during the winter months.

THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.

APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEXANDER EWAN, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St., near the Church.

MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.

CASES OF SICKNESS should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.

THE MINISTER is at home on the first Thursday evening of each month, and can be seen usually any morning between the hours of nine and ten.

Missionary and Benevolent Funds.

The following are the Schemes for which the General Assembly appoints collections to be made annually in all the Congregations and Mission Stations of the Church:—

I. Home Missions. The Home Mission fields of our Church are in many respects the grandest that any Church was ever privileged to occupy—extending from sea to sea, a distance of nearly 5,000 miles. The work of supplying religious ordinances to Presbyterian families in the more remote and sparsely settled districts devolves upon two Committees—one for the Western, and the other for the Eastern section of the Church, known as the Maritime Provinces. Together, these two Committees employed last summer, more than 300 missionaries, of whom upwards of 100 were ordained ministers, who conducted services at about 730 different places. The expenditure was \$56,605. The amount required for the current year is estimated to be \$61,500, calling for enlarged contributions from the congregations all along the line. The number of missionaries employed in the *Western section* in May last was 229. The expenditure was \$48,953. This year, owing to the extension of the work in the North-West and British Columbia, the Committee ask for \$53,000.

II. Augmentation of Stipends. This fund was instituted six years ago by the General Assembly with a view to supplementing inadequate stipends in some of the smaller and financially weaker congregations, the desire of the Assembly being that none of the ministers should receive less than \$750 a year with a manse. The effort has thus far been successful. But last year there was a deficit of \$3,768 in the Western section, which this year requires \$30,000. The Committee of the Eastern section ask for \$8,000. Many of the congregations, at different times receiving aid from this fund, have now become self-sustaining, but on the other hand, new congregations are being added to the Church every year, some of which require assistance for longer or shorter periods. On the principle that the strong should help the weak, this fund should be generously supported, for "*whether one member suffereth, all the members suffer with it.*"

III. French Evangelization. There are 38 ministers and missionaries employed in serving 89 preaching stations, in which are 1,062 families, 1,417 communicants and 1,075 Sunday-school scholars. 2,796 copies of the Bible and 23,800 French tracts and pamphlets were distributed last year by the colporteurs of the Board. The attendance at the mission schools was 912 pupils, of whom 324 were the children of Roman Catholic parents. In the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools there are at present 140 pupils. A new institution was opened last October in Ottawa, under the auspices of the Board, for the higher education of young women, and in which special attention is given to instruction in the French language, it is named Coligny College, and occupies the spacious building formerly known as the Ottawa Ladies' College. The total amount required this year by the Board is \$73,000, viz: \$30,000 for the general work; \$9,000 for the maintenance of the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools; \$9,000 for the enlargement of the buildings at Pointe-aux-Trembles, and \$25,000 for the purchase, repairs, and equipment of Coligny College, Ottawa.

IV. The Colleges. Since 1887, when the Common College fund was done away with, the congregations contribute to the respective Colleges as their judgment sees fit to dictate. So far as they have been published the estimates for the current year from congregational sources are as follows:—For Knox College, Toronto, \$6,500; for Queen's College, Kingston, \$4,400; for the Presbyterian College, Montreal, \$4,500, and for Halifax College, \$9,500.

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V. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Annuities to the widows of ministers are paid from this fund, ranging from \$100. to \$300. per annum. The amounts expected from the congregations of the Western section are \$5,000 for the General Assembly's fund, and \$2,000 for that formerly in connection with Church of Scotland. Each minister contributes annually to this fund from \$8 to \$12.

VI. The Assembly Fund. This fund is chargeable with all expenses connected with the meeting of Assembly—the printing and issuing of the minutes, salaries of the clerks, printing documents for committees that have no funds of their own, such as reports on the State of Religion, Sabbath-schools, Temperance, &c. To meet these expenses at least \$5,500 are required this year.

VII. Manitoba College The circumstances of this College being exceptional, a special contribution is authorized by the General Assembly from the whole Church. The requirements for this year call for \$10,000 from congregational sources.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. \$15,000 are required by the Western section and \$3,000 by the Eastern section, to enable them to continue the pitifully small annuities at present paid to ministers who have retired from active service owing to age and infirmity. The highest annuity is only \$200. An effort is being made to secure a permanent endowment fund of at least \$200,000 in this connection, which it is hoped will commend itself to the practical sympathies of the wealthier members of the Church.

IX. Foreign Missions. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has at present a staff of thirty-two ordained missionaries engaged in preaching the gospel to the heathen. These are assisted by twenty-two Canadian ladies (in addition to the wives of the missionaries) and a staff of native assistants—teachers, catechists, Bible-readers, Zenana visitors, colporteurs, &c.—to the number of 250. The number of communicants connected with the missions at date of last annual report was 3,668, and of young people attending schools and Bible-classes, about 3,000. The missions are as follows:—[1] To the Indians in the North-West; [2] the mission to Formosa; [3] the new mission to Honan on the mainland of China, to which six ordained missionaries have been recently appointed, besides a lay medical missionary; [4] Central India, where we have five ordained missionaries, six Canadian ladies—two being doctors of medicine—and a large staff of native helpers; [5] the new Hebrides—the oldest and one of the most fruitful of all our missions—in which there are at present three ordained missionaries and their wives, who are assisted by a large number of native teachers; [6] The Trinidad Mission begun in 1867 by the Rev. John Morton, and which has now a staff of five ordained missionaries and their wives, assisted by three Canadian lady teachers. There are now about 2,000 young people in the schools, and 382 on the roll of communicants. The total amount expended last year in support of our Foreign missions was \$93,122.62. The estimated expenditure for the current year is \$106,516.

The above are the Schemes of the General Assembly, to which all the congregations of the Church are expected to contribute annually. The mode of contributing for them in this congregation is by means of a schedule sent to all the members and adherents at the beginning of the year, in which they are requested to enter the amounts they desire to contribute for the different purposes named, and to transmit it to the Treasurer. Those who prefer to contribute anonymously are at liberty to do so. As this is the *only* way in which the contributions of St. Paul's congregation are asked for those purposes, it is earnestly hoped that none will decline, but that each will give according to his or her intelligent judgment.

N. B.—In addition, and quite distinct from these, it is to be remembered that this congregation is pledged for the support of Rev. George Mackelvie, our missionary in **Central India** under the auspices of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. The amount annually required for this purpose is about \$1,400.

REV. GEORGE MACKELVIE, M. A.

The members of St. Paul's Church will doubtless be glad to have in their hands, for reference, the following brief sketch, obtained from an authentic source, of the missionary who now represents the congregation at Mhow, Central India, in room and place of the late Rev. ROBERT CAMPBELL MURRAY, our first missionary, whose lamented death in December, 1887, following so soon after that of his estimable young wife is still fresh in our memories.

Mr. Mackelvie was born in the County of Tyrone, Ireland, on the 23rd of March, 1859, but was brought up from early childhood in Glasgow, where he attended the Green Street National Schools. He was afterwards apprenticed to the engineering trade, and wrought at it for some years; but as he was anxious to improve his education, especially in those branches where he thought he most required improvement, he began to attend evening classes in Anderson's College, Glasgow.

Being at this time a member of Dalmarnock Parish Church, and a teacher in its Sabbath School, he was induced by the minister, Rev. James Kelly, to give himself wholly to the work of the Master, and when he entered the University classes of 1879-80 it was with a view to studying for the ministry. The success that had already attended his efforts as a city missionary and the teacher of a large Bible-class left no room for doubt that he was well suited for the sacred profession of which he had made choice.

After a pretty successful College course he graduated with the degree of M. A. in 1884. He then entered on his Theological curriculum, and attended for two sessions the classes in Glasgow University, but before completing his course he was induced by some friends to come to Canada. He arrived in Montreal in October, 1887, and spent his third session in Theology at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, where he won the respect and esteem of his professors and fellow-students, for his ability as a scholar and his earnestness as a Christian. Soon after completing his studies he offered his services to the Foreign Mission Board, as a missionary to Couva, Trinidad; but the answer was delayed, and in the meantime when St. Paul's Church asked for a missionary, he applied and was accepted.

Mr. Mackelvie was licensed by the Presbytery of Montreal on the 18th of May, 1888. On Sabbath evening, the 27th of that month, he was ordained in St. Paul's Church, to the office of the ministry, and designated as a missionary to Central India. He reached his field of labour a very short time afterwards, and immediately engaged in the study of the language of the people residing in that part of India. Being now able to converse and preach freely in Hindi, Mr. Mackelvie has fairly entered upon his missionary labours with every reasonable prospect of success.

Amidst the native states of Central India are placed here and there British military stations called Camps, to watch over British interests and to preserve the peace of the native states. One of the largest and strongest of these is Mhow, about 300 miles N.E. from Bombay, situated on the brow of and amidst the outstanding spurs of the Vindhya hills, nearly 2000 feet above the sea-level, on the back of two gently sloping hills, about four miles square, with Maharajah Holkar's

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territory bordering it on all sides, containing from 25 to 29,000 people, of whom 10,000 are British soldiers, fully the one-half in native regiments. The civil population is with a few exceptions native. The Parsees or fire worshippers, the most progressive of the natives of western India, occupy a much more prominent place in the community than their small numbers would lead one to expect. As contractors, store-keepers, clerks, &c., they have become generally wealthy. The Mahomedans are found in large numbers, but are too lazy, ignorant, sensual and bigoted to ever rise to much importance. Their religion has fossilized them where they are not Hinduized. The Hindoos form the larger proportion of the people, intelligent, sharp business men, greatly circumscribed with Caste—which amongst the low classes has destroyed all ambition—very conservative and religious in every thing. A military camp does not usually present influences favourable to Christianity, Mhow being no exception, and hence our missionaries have been labouring at a great disadvantage. It has been faithfully worked by Rev. J. Fraser Campbell from 1877 to 1884; by Rev. J. Builder from 1884 to 1888, and for the past year by Rev. Mr. Mackelvie; and these have gathered a small Christian community that are seeking to the best of their ability to keep the lamp of life burning amidst the dense darkness about them.—*Rev. John Wilkie.*

Pastoral Letter.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH:

The year, whose report this letter introduces has not been marked in any special way. The work in the various branches of the Church's life has gone on quietly and successfully, each branch indicating signs of increased vigour and efficiency. Most cordially do I appreciate the help given in different ways in carrying on the work of the congregation, and it is not a little to be able to say that in all the work there has not been a single note of discord. A specially gratifying feature is the year's experience in the large and most regular attendance of young men at the Sunday afternoon Bible-class; it speaks well for the future of the congregation, and my earnest prayer is that these young men, whose lives I shall watch with the deepest interest, are getting something from our meditations together that will help them to do their part nobly in life's battle. Wherever they may be placed, may they one and all be able to say:—"I am not ashamed of Jesus Christ and His gospel."

To the members of the Choir, who with unwearying faithfulness contribute so much to the beauty and helpfulness of our service, I am deeply indebted, and to Mr. Johnson for his earnest and untiring endeavours in connection therewith.

In one or two things there is cause for admonition and room for amendment. Some of our members are very irregular in their attendance at Church, the slightest of excuses seeming to justify absence, and I would remind such in the kindest way that their careless irregularity is not only a spiritual loss to themselves, but is detrimental to the whole congregational life. Again, some of our members are very careless and irregular in the matter of communion. Pray, think seriously of this and let no light matter lead you to slight or disobey the Master's own invitation, "Do this in remembrance of Me."

The number of those contributing to the Missionary work of the Church is still disappointingly small. I do wish each member of the congregation would earnestly ask "Does Christ not wish—not need—my help in His work?" "Can I be happy in the consciousness that my name is not amongst the fellow-workers with Him?"

One thing more. The deficiency in the ordinary collections is

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very disappointing, none the less so, that it is manifestly the result of want of thought. The cause is not far to seek; it is to be found in the unreadiness of the people to adopt the plan of the Trustees, a thing which surely should not be. The Trustees are deserving of a unanimous loyalty. The Trustees are entitled to know from each one of us on what they can count weekly towards the necessary revenue; this would in no way infringe on the voluntariness of our gifts to God and God's work. I hope that this year each member and adherent will intimate to the Trustees a weekly sum on which they can rely for the absolutely necessary income. We can all of us supplement that voluntarily from Sunday to Sunday as God prospers us.

The Trustees ask for \$5,000 of ordinary collection. There are 642 members and I feel sure that no one who knows anything of the congregation will think that the Trustees are asking too much.

Those matters may seem largely external, but they are vital to the life, prosperity, and usefulness of the congregation.

Above all my prayer is that in our homes and in our hearts there may be more and more the spirit of true religion, the spirit of our Lord and Master, that the families and individuals of St. Paul's by their life may be increasingly witnesses for Christ and fellow-workers with Him.

Report of the Kirk-Session.

In presenting their usual annual report to the congregation, the Kirk-Session desire to acknowledge their gratitude to the Giver of all good for the prosperity of the past year, and express their hope that the year on which we have entered may be still more fruitful in the Master's work. Sunday services have been largely attended, both morning and evening. Mr. Barclay has occupied the pulpit with great regularity, not having been absent a single Sabbath since the re-opening of the church in September last. The large attendance at all the services, is encouraging evidence of appreciation of Mr. Barclay's pulpit ministrations.

The necessity for additional pew accommodation is being more and more felt. Many of our own families require more sittings and there

are also numerous applications from others who desire to worship with us that cannot be entertained. With a view to this lack of accommodation, the Board of Trustees are understood to have at present under consideration a proposal to erect a gallery at the end of the church, or in some other way to meet the difficulty. In the meantime, with concurrence of the Presbytery of Montreal, arrangements are in progress for opening a branch Sunday-school in the western part of the city for the convenience of the families whose distance from St. Paul's Church renders it difficult for them to attend the Sunday-school and Bible-classes which are conducted there.

The amount contributed for the Benevolent Schemes of the Church is nearly equal to the amount received last year, but we regret to find that the number of contributors has not increased. It is earnestly hoped that those who have not seen their way so far to adopt the schedule mode of giving, will do so this year.

The Kirk-Session has learned with much satisfaction that the Young Men's Association has resolved to give to its proceedings more of a direct and practical missionary character than heretofore, and to enlist the sympathies of its members in aid of the important work of the General Assembly's Home Mission Committee in the North-west. It would be well indeed for this highly-favoured congregation, as a whole, to consider whether it might not do a great deal more than it has yet done for the advancement of religion in those parts of our own country that are inadequately supplied with the means of grace, as well as in foreign lands that are still in heathen darkness.

We continue to receive very satisfactory and encouraging accounts from our Missionary in Central India, the Rev. George Mackelvie, in regard to the work he is doing in that field. In this connection the members of the congregation will, we feel sure, read with interest the brief sketch on another page, in which personal reference is made to Mr. Mackelvie and to his field of labour in India.

The Kirk-Session regret to notice from the Treasurer's statement, that there is a considerable falling off in the ordinary Sunday collections as compared with last year. This deficiency may be accounted for to some extent from the fact that for nearly three months, during which time the church was closed for the repairs and decorations, no collections were taken. It is to be hoped that the congregation generally will join in any plan that the Trustees may suggest to secure a larger number of subscribers by the envelope system.

The members of the Kirk-Session in their visits to the Sabbath-school have been much gratified in observing the efficiency with which it is conducted under the able superintendence of Mr. John L. Morris, and they feel that the congregation is under great obligations to Mr. and Mrs. Morris and the staff of teachers who so regularly and willingly carry on this very important work. It has also been a source of pleasure to observe the large number of young men who are in regular attendance at Mr. Barclay's Bible-Class on Sabbath afternoons. It is hoped that a still larger number of young men will avail themselves of the advantages thus placed within their reach.

THE CHOIR.—Too much praise cannot be given to Mr. Robinson, the organist, and to the members of the choir who give their services to the Church so regularly, sometimes at great inconvenience, and in all kinds of weather. The Kirk-Session feel quite sure that the entire congregation cordially join with them in this expression of their appreciation of their valuable services.

Many of the older members of the congregation were delighted to see in their midst for a brief period during the past year, the Rev. W. M. Black of Anwoth, Scotland, and to listen to his voice from the pulpit. Mr. Black is the son of the late Rev. Dr. Edward Black, the founder of St. Paul's. He was for several years superintendent of the Sabbath-school of this congregation, and before leaving Canada he was instrumental in founding St. Mark's congregation in this city.

It has also been very pleasing to many to read in the *Presbyterian Record* interesting letters from the Rev. Dr. Jenkins on the subject of his recent visit to Egypt, and his many friends rejoice to know that at his advanced age he was able so thoroughly to enjoy such a trip.

Although the number of deaths in the congregation during the past year has not been above the average, some of those who have been long connected with the congregation have been removed. They have entered into the rest that remaineth for the people of God. Others have been cut down in the prime of life and in the midst of their usefulness in the Church and in the world, reminding us that "there is no discharge in that war," and admonishing us to work while it is called to-day—seeing "the night cometh, when no man can work."

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The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday the 13th January, 1890, at 8 o'clock p.m.

The Rev. James Barclay was unanimously elected chairman of the meeting, and Mr. E. B. Greenshields requested to act as secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting held on the 14th January, 1889, were read and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees and Treasurer's financial statement having been placed in the pews of the Church on the previous Sunday were taken as read.

The chairman moved, seconded by Mr. Alex. Ewan,

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.—Carried.

Mr. R. S. Kinghorn submitted the report of the Committee on the Missionary and Benevolent schemes of the Church, whereupon it was moved by Mr. C. D. Proctor and seconded by Mr. J. McDonald and carried,

That the report of the Schedule Committee be received, approved and printed with the other reports for distribution, and that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds contributed during the year, and that

Mr. J. MURRAY SMITH, Mr. R. FORSYTH,
Mr. R. S. KINGHORN, and Mr. A. S. EWING,

be elected members of the Committee for the current year, and that the thanks of the congregation be given to Mr. R. S. Kinghorn for his efficient performance of the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee.

Mr. James Tasker moved, seconded by Mr. R. S. Kinghorn,

That the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year.—Carried.

The chairman announced to the meeting that the two Trustees retiring by rotation this year were Sir Donald A. Smith and Mr. James Burnett, and that both were eligible for re-election.

It was then moved by Mr. H. Newman, seconded by Mr. W. B. Court and carried,

That Sir Donald A. Smith and Mr. James Burnett be re-elected Trustees for the usual term.

The following resolutions were thereafter put to the meeting and carried unanimously,

Moved by Mr. R. Macfarlane, seconded by Mr. F. E. Jodery,

That Mr. P. S. Ross be thanked for his services as auditor for the past year, and that he and Mr. John McDonald be requested to continue in the office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. Alex. Macpherson, seconded by Mr. H. Newman.

That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Organist for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

The following resolutions were also unanimously passed:—

That the thanks of the congregation be recorded for the generous gift of five thousand dollars from an anonymous contributor towards the erection of a manse in connection with the Church, and

That the thanks of the congregation be given to Mr. John L. Morris for the active interest he has taken as superintendent in the Sunday School in connection with the Church, and that this meeting appreciates thoroughly his faithful services and the success which has attended them.

Mr. John McDonald moved a cordial vote of thanks to the Rev. James Barclay for his able conduct as chairman of the meeting. This was seconded by Mr. R. S. Kinghorn and unanimously carried.

In replying Mr. Barclay expressed the pleasure he felt in attending the meeting, and thanked the office-bearers of the Church, as well as all interested in its work, for the hearty support given to him.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with prayer.

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Report of the Trustees

of St. Paul's Church for the year ending 31st December, 1889.

The Trustees of St. Paul's Church have, at the expiry of another year, the pleasure of laying before the members of the Church the Treasurer's financial statement, and of congratulating the congregation upon having had a prosperous year.

In doing so, they take the opportunity of expressing their complete satisfaction with the earnest and able manner in which the Rev. Mr. Barclay has conducted the services of the Church, and with the success which has attended his labours.

The pews are all rented, and the amount collected by the Treasurer is nearly the same as last year, being \$7,784.30 against \$7,800.56. This shows that the number of people attending the Church is fully as large as last year, but there is a considerable falling off in the contributions of the members to the ordinary plate collections. In 1888 they were \$4,388.14 while this year they are only \$3,517.64, a decrease of \$870.50. There was a loss in the subscriptions through the envelopes of \$612.93, and in the ordinary collections of \$257.57.

The Trustees regret that the appeal they made last year for more support to the collections has not been responded to. They hope that the members of the congregation will realize the necessity of increased liberality in this matter, and that the collections for the coming year will reach at least the sum of \$5000.00. Last year there were 109 subscribers by the envelopes, while this year there are only 94. It is hoped that there will be a general and liberal response to this appeal, and that there will be a large increase in the number of subscribers to the envelope system. If the members prefer to do so they can send to the Treasurer in one sum the amount each may wish to give for the year, in place of using the envelopes. This plan has been adopted by some, and the Trustees hope that those who do not like the envelope system may see their way to subscribe in this manner.

In speaking of the finances of the Church this year it must be remembered that during the year \$11,734.00 has been paid by the congregation for the Manse fund, and \$2495.15 for decorating the

church. A further sum of \$1057.82 has also been expended in necessary repairs to the building, and the usual subscriptions have been given to the schemes of the Church and to the support of the Missionary in India. So that although there is a deficiency in the ordinary revenue, there is evidence of greater life and activity in the congregation.

Following out the recommendation unanimously carried at the last annual meeting, the building of the Manse was commenced in the spring. It is now nearly finished, and will be ready for occupation in a few months.

The interior of the church has also been very greatly improved by suitable decoration. The want of this has been felt for some time, very little having been done to the walls and ceiling since the church was built. The Trustees feel sure that the members of the congregation are pleased with the beautiful and attractive appearance which the interior of the church now presents.

Several meetings of the Session and Trustees were held to try to devise some scheme for increased pew accommodation by putting up a gallery in the church. As the building was not originally designed to have a gallery, and as there was a difference of opinion as to the effect a gallery might have on the appearance of the church, the matter was left in abeyance.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Sir Donald A. Smith, and Mr. James Burnett, both of whom are eligible for re-election.

Fraser, a student in the Presbyterian College, has charge of the Evening service for the present season, and so far we have to report the attendance smaller than in former years, owing no doubt to the mild weather during November and December, permitting those usually found at those meetings to attend their own churches in the city.

The interest however in these services is well sustained, from the fact that they have always been self-supporting.

We have to report the School again in good working order at the close of the year, notwithstanding the disastrous effects of the late epidemic of typhoid that visited the district during the summer months.

St. Paul's Dorcas and Aid Society.

1889.

At the close of another year we present our report of work done with feelings of thankfulness for the measure of success vouchsafed to our labours and with encouragement to renewed zeal.

The meetings have been well attended, great interest taken in the work, and by united effort much has been accomplished both in relieving the wants of our own poor, and in forwarding the interests of the various charitable institutions of the city.

In the early part of the year in answer to an appeal made by Mr. E. B. Greenshields, on behalf of the Trustees, the ladies of the congregation decided to undertake to collect the remaining sum required for the Church decoration, and were successful in securing nearly the amount required.

The usual work for the Industrial Bazaar was proceeded with and when finished was valued at \$163.00, and subscriptions received for same object amounted to \$120.00.

In the latter part of the year our attention was principally directed towards making up clothing for the poor, and in this branch of our work we have been very materially assisted by the handsome gift of a sewing machine from Mr. Alex. Mitchell, and to him we would tender our grateful thanks. Flannel garments were made and sent to St.

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Margaret's Nursery, and Protestant Infant's Home, besides many individual wants relieved. Flags were also made for Sunday School decoration, and we are now engaged on work for the Hervey Institute. Donations of money have been sent to the Woman's Presbyterian Missionary Society, towards the support of their nurse—Home for Friendless Women—Sheltering Home—Diet Dispensary—East End French Mission School—Protestant Insane Asylum, to furnish a room—and to assist in providing tea for the French Mission pupils at their anniversary meeting.

There were distributed among the poor fifty yards flannel, forty-six yards cotton, forty yards of dress goods, twenty made-up garments and several parcels of tweed samples.

We would acknowledge with thanks a very useful donation of tweed samples from Messrs. Cantlie, Ewan & Co., also sewing cotton from Mr. Hunter.

Repeated appeals have come from the Woman's Presbyterian Missionary Society, urging the ladies of St. Paul's Church to take a greater interest in their work and become members of their Society. It is earnestly hoped that many of the ladies will, in the coming year, avail themselves of this privilege and help on their good work. A request has also come from the Female Mission Schools; for material for sewing class, and asking for young ladies to teach the children to sew; we trust that some may find it convenient to do so.—A donation of material was sent.

Before closing our report we desire to express sincere thanks to those ladies who have kindly undertaken the duty of collecting, to Mr. Barclay, for kindly reading at our meetings, and to all who in any way have assisted us by carrying on the work. We look forward to a year of increased usefulness, and trust that those in a position to give will be generous and thus enable us to carry on our work with greater efficiency than heretofore.


