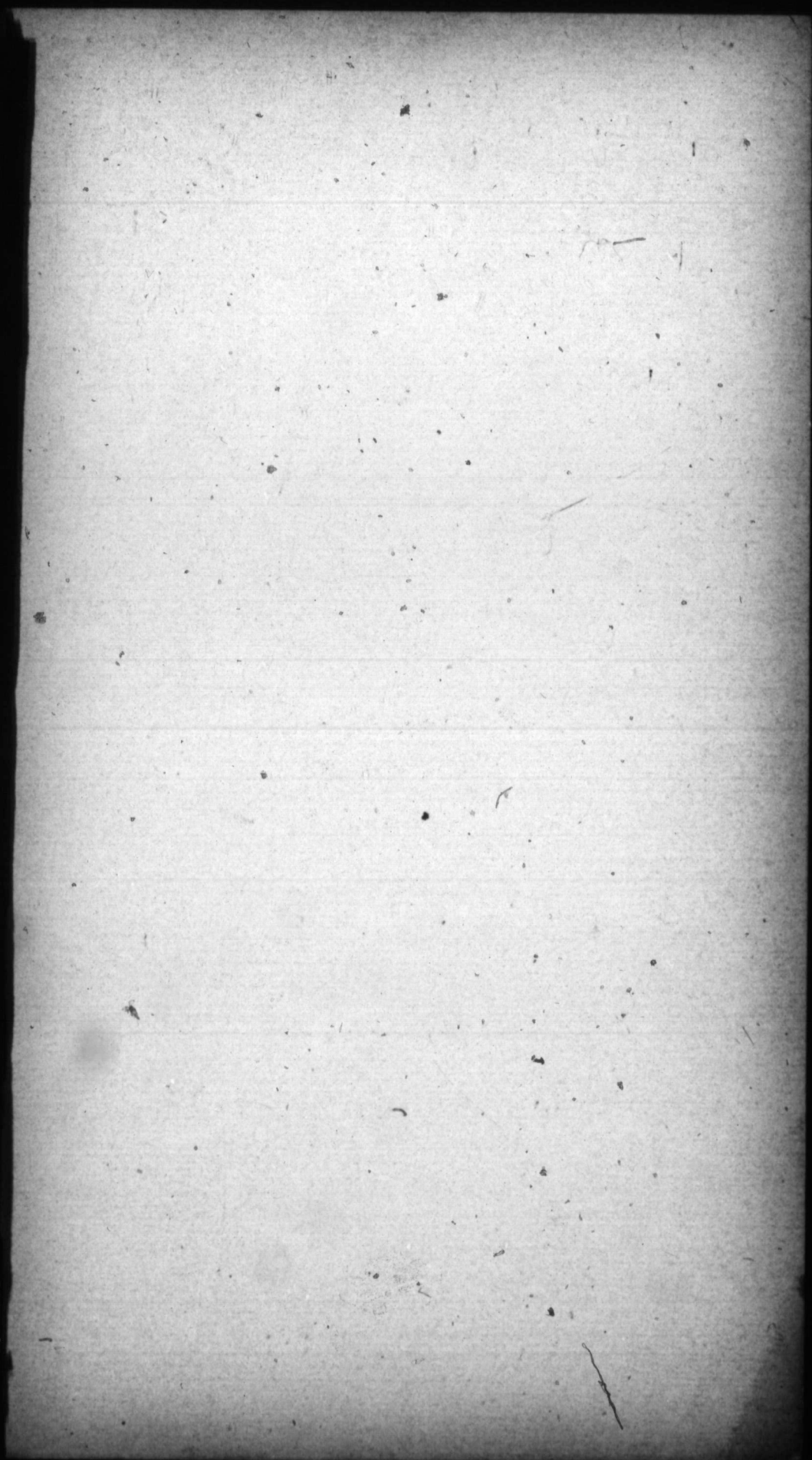

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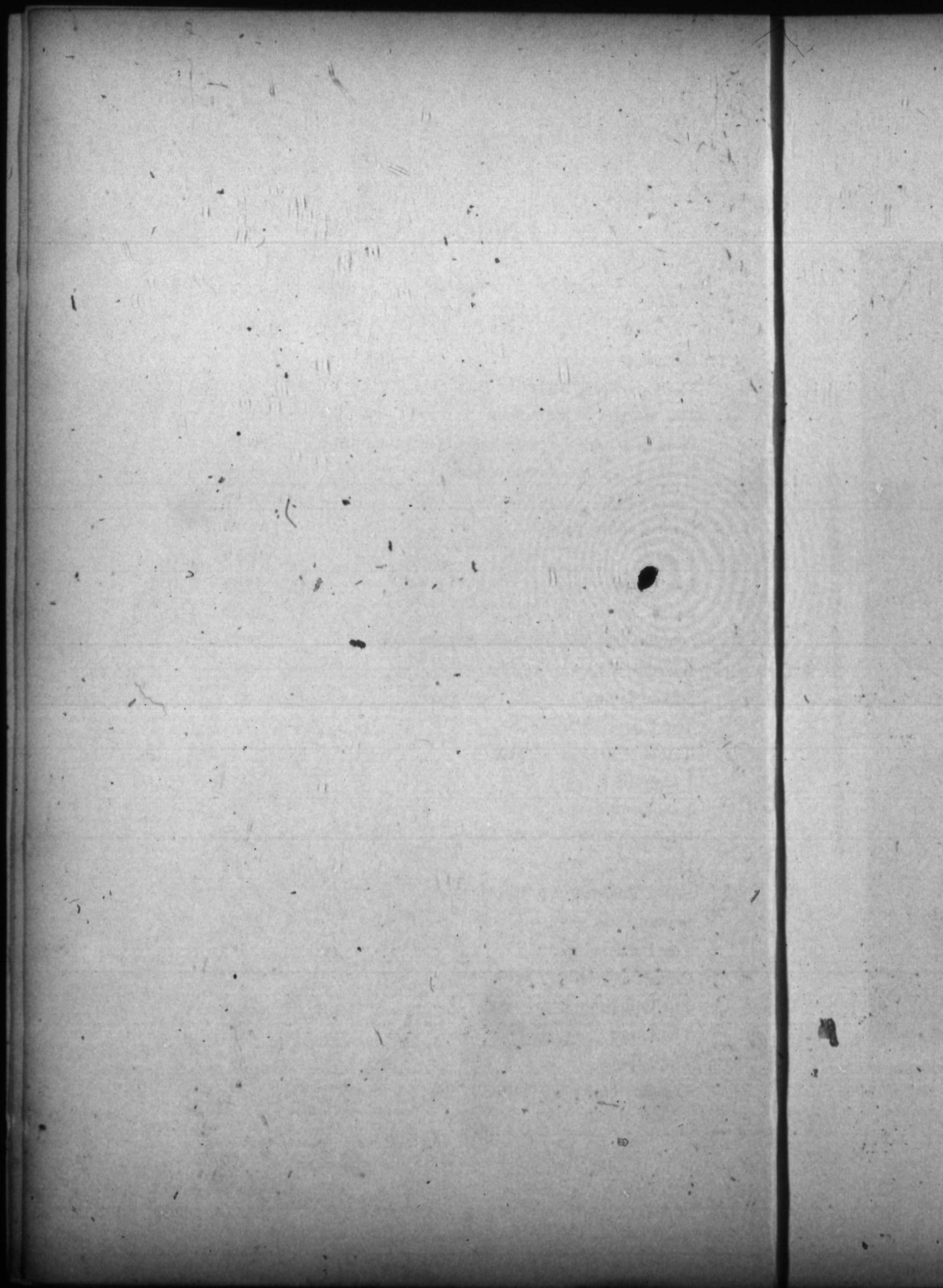

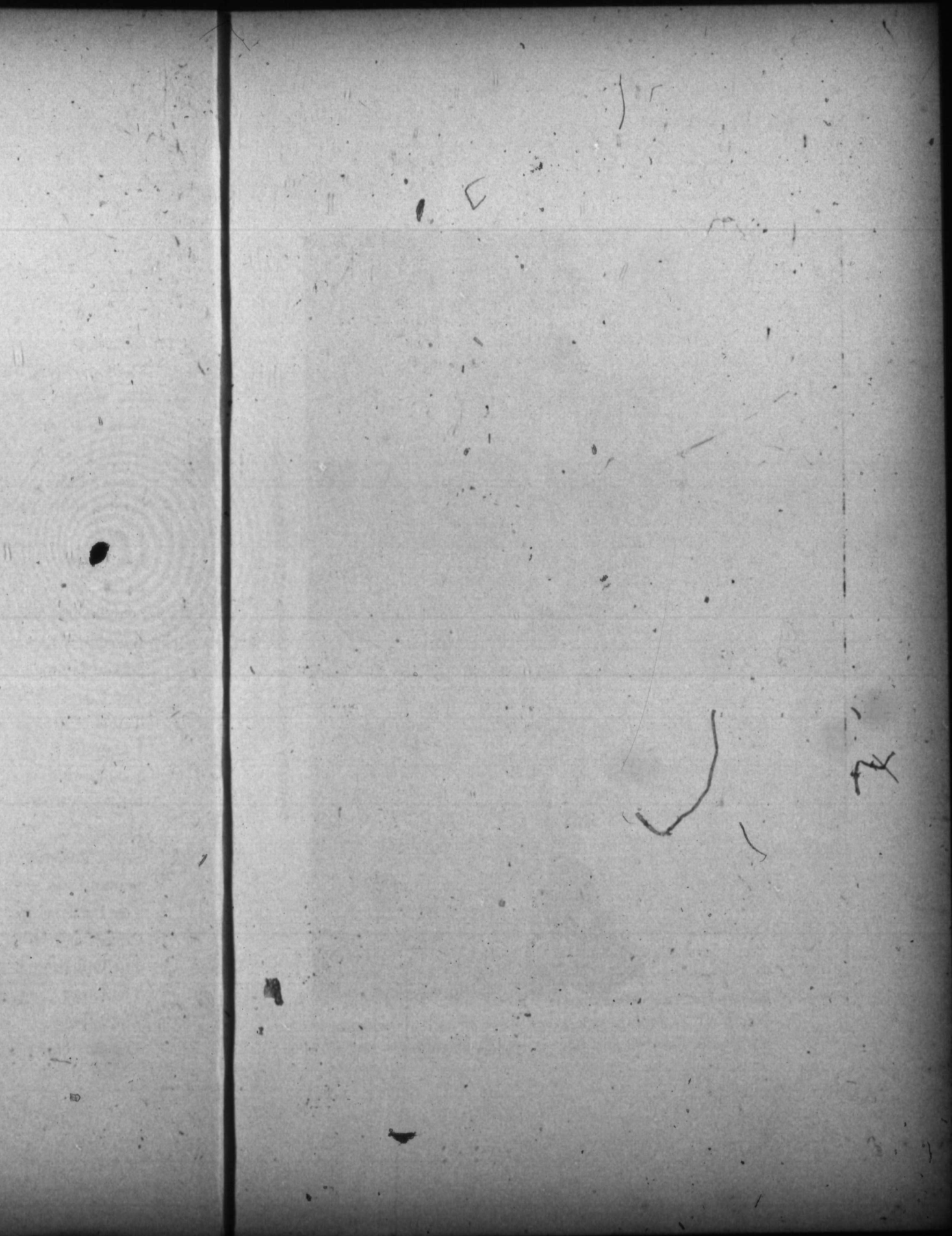

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Trinity College School.

“*Beati mundo corde.*”

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened on the first of May, 1865, under the Head-mastership of the late Rev. C. H. Badgley, M.A. During the summer of 1868 the School was removed to Port Hope, and in January, 1872, the first portion of the permanent buildings was completed and occupied. The School premises now consist of over twenty acres of land, affording ample space for large Cricket, Tennis and Football grounds and Skating-rink, situated on high land outside the town of Port Hope, and commanding beautiful views of Lake Ontario and the surrounding country.

In 1895 new buildings were erected, and were thus described in the *Toronto Globe* of July 2nd, 1896:—“The new buildings are both extremely imposing and handsome externally, while within they are wonderfully substantial and commodious, as well as perfectly laid out and planned so as to suit the purposes for which they are intended. In rebuilding, it was found necessary to pull down all that remained of the old School with the exception of the tower, new and deeper foundations even being necessary to bear the weight of the massive structure to be erected upon them. The building is four storeys in height, the south front being about 300 feet, and the west over 100 feet in length. At the eastern end is the beautiful chapel, more lofty and stately in appearance than its predecessor, and under it is the dining hall, the windows of which on each side are well above the

ground. Under the whole length and width of the building are tunnels, ten feet wide and eight feet high, in which are all the ventilating, heating, waterworks and sewerage pipes, so that in case of anything needing repair or alteration it can be done expeditiously. The ventilation of the building is carried out in a most scientific manner, while the heating arrangements by means of steam pipes are very satisfactory.

"The building is as nearly fireproof as it is possible to make it, little if any woodwork being visible in any part. The floors in all the corridors are of Deseronto terra-cotta, covered with cement, while in the rooms they are made of wood, double, with asbestos between them. The ceiling girders are of steel and the exterior walls are lined with terra-cotta brick, with rough-finished plaster over them. In the corridors and up the stairways there are deep dados of brick, while at the stairways the brick archways and the wrought iron railings are most effective in appearance. The whole building is divided into five sections, with fireproof walls between each, and each portion has its own stairway, some being made of iron and others of stone. The roof is of slate.

"An addition in the rear of sixty by fifty feet contains the furnace and boilers, bath rooms and lavatories, and is connected by passages with the first and second floors of the building. At the north end of the west front is the handsome gymnasium, which was built seven years ago of brick and stone, two storeys in height, with round towers of massive stone at the north and south angles, with a long balcony shaded by an overhanging roof between them. The building is also connected by a passage way with the main building and contains, besides the gymnasium and five-court above, a large play-room on the ground floor for use in wet or stormy weather, with cricket, football photographic and furnace rooms.

"The architects were Messrs. Darling, Sproat & Pearson of Toronto. The cost of the building was \$90,000, and it is

"The beautiful situation of the School at such an altitude above the town and lake is an attraction not only from an artistic point of view, but also as insuring pure air and perfect drainage, while the large grounds afford ample provision for cricket, tennis, and all other outdoor sports, to which, if one might judge from the sun-tinted faces, the boys are much addicted."

A very handsome and appropriate addition to the "Speech-room" has lately been made by the Old Boys' Association, and consists of a series of oak panels upon which, in letters of gold, are recorded the names of the Head Boys of the School, the Bronze Medallists, and those who have obtained Honours and Scholarships at Trinity University and elsewhere.

In the event of any infectious disorder breaking out, facilities are provided for prompt isolation and efficient nursing in the Head Master's house. Boys who are attacked by any infectious disorder will be at once removed thither and kept there under the Doctor's supervision until all danger of spreading the disease is over. For ordinary ailments there is a suite of rooms adjoining the Matron's apartments, where the patients are secluded from the rest of the School, and receive whatever attention their cases may require.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the session of 1871-72, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor, the Provost, and the Professors in Arts of the University of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may, from time to time, be appointed by the Governing Body.

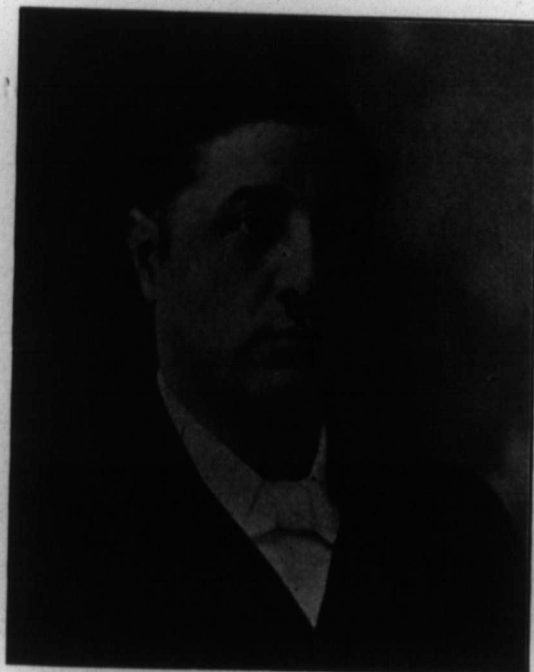

Course of Instruction.

The course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Scripture History, Catechism, Chemistry, Physical Science, Bookkeeping, Drawing, Vocal Music and Military Drill.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examinations of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, etc. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits.

A Preparatory Form has been opened for little boys who are not sufficiently advanced for the work of the lower First Form. Careful instruction is given in elementary English subjects.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School system. Out-of-

school government is, accordingly, to some extent, vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

Fees.

The Fees for board and tuition are \$267 per annum, or \$89 per term for boarders, and \$67.50 per annum, or \$22.50 per term for day-boys, and are payable at the beginning of each term *in advance*; if, however, payment of the Fees, together with any School account of the previous term, is made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of ten per cent. off the Fees is allowed, thus *reducing the charges* to \$240 per annum, or \$80 per term, for boarders, and to \$60 per annum, or \$20 per term, for day boys.

Each new boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance Fee of \$4, which is devoted to the maintenance and improvement of the Boys' Library and Reading-room, and a Fee of \$12 in lieu of bedding, etc., which are now supplied by the School instead of, as formerly, by the Pupils.

The above Fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, etc., and medical attendance.

A Half-term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a Pupil. If such notice is not given, a Half-term's Fee will be collected.

The following rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:—

“The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a fortnight after a boy

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presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the parent or guardian for the amount (with bank charges) at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over twelve years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence, as shall perfectly satisfy the Head Master and the Governing Body.

To secure admission, a deposit of \$10 must be made on application, which will be accounted for when the boy finally leaves School.

Forms of application can be obtained from the Head Master.

Exhibitions.

THE LATE VENERABLE JOHN WILSON, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough, bequeathed \$1,500 to the School for the purpose of founding two Exhibitions of the annual value of \$50 each, for the sons of the Clergy, in the Province of Ontario. These Exhibitions are tenable from year to year during the whole period of the recipient's residence at the School; provided that his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The nomination to these Exhibitions rests in the hands of the Head Master, to whom a letter testimonial of previous good conduct must be presented by the applicant.

Bursaries.

The Corporation of the School offers to the sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada, TWENTY BURSARIES of the annual value of \$120 each, tenable from year to year

during the whole period of a boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The son of any clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work or in a Church School or College in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Head Master by the parents or guardian of the boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. *Ceteris paribus* preference will be given to the sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, Ottawa, Niagara, Algoma and Huron.

Scholarships.

REV. F. A. BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP.

A Scholarship of the annual value of \$60 has been founded in memory of the late REV. F. A. BETHUNE, M.A., who died on the 20th January, 1877, at Cannes, in France, and who had been for nine years a most efficient and zealous Assistant Master in the School.

The Scholarship (to be known as "THE REV. F. A. BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP") will be awarded annually to the boy who obtains the highest number of marks for General Proficiency in the Fifth Form Examination in June, on condition that the holder continues for another year to pursue his studies in the Sixth Form of the School. The Scholarship will not be awarded unless at least two-thirds of the total number of marks be obtained.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Corporation of the School offers for competition ten Scholarships of the annual value of \$60 each, and tenable for five years, on the following conditions:—

Scholarships.

BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP.

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The competitors shall not be more than twelve years old on the first of September preceding the Examination.

The subjects of the Examination shall be the same as those for entrance to the High Schools of Ontario.

The Examination shall be held in the School at Port Hope immediately before the opening of Michaelmas term, and be conducted by the Masters of the School under the direction of the Head Master.

No Scholarship shall be awarded to any one who obtains less than two-thirds of the total number of marks.

No boy shall continue to hold a Scholarship unless his conduct and attention to his studies are satisfactory to the Head Master.

A scholar who is eligible for a Bursary may have the stipend of his Scholarship increased to \$120 per annum, at the discretion of the Head Master.

The Examination in 1900 will be held at the School on the day preceding the opening of each term. The Candidates must notify the Head Master of their intention to compete for the Scholarships fourteen days beforehand, and send him at the same time a certificate of their age.

GEOGRAPHY.—Canada and the British Empire; the Continents.

HISTORY.—Leading events in Canadian and British History.

GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION.—Elements of formal Grammar; descriptive and Narrative Composition.

ARITHMETIC.—To the end of vulgar fractions.

WRITING.—A paper to be set.

Boarding.

Boarders are received into the School building, which is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by the Resident Masters, who direct the boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by an experienced Lady Matron.

The Head Master particularly requests that every boy should be supplied with white linen collars, which must be worn, except in play-time.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their boys to school with all their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and *clearly marked with the name in full*.

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$5 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

Each boy will be supplied with twenty-five cents per week pocket-money, which will be charged to his account at the end of the Term, and from this will be deducted the cost of all unreported breakages and damages to furniture, etc.

No boy will be permitted to go away from the School during Term, except for some very important reason which meets with the approval of the Head Master.

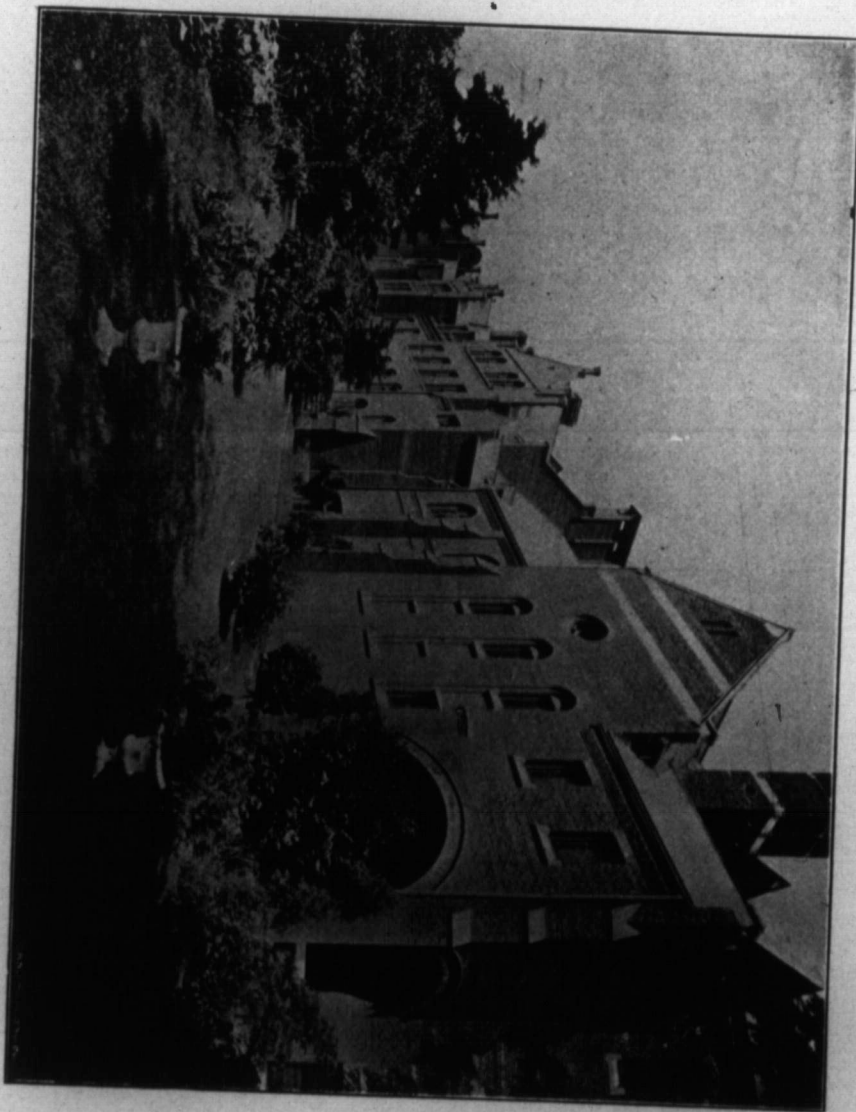

The sanitary arrangements are modern and very complete, new and extensive bath rooms having been added, together with a system of ventilation which has proved remarkably satisfactory.

It having been the object of the original promoters of the School to establish a Church School where good tuition could be obtained at as low a price as is consistent with efficiency, no greater fees are charged than will cover the cost of management; whatever profits may accrue will add to its efficiency.
