

MINUTES

NINETEENTH SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD

OF THE

UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

I. SEDERUNT.

Toronto, Tuesday, June 5, 1855, 71 b'clock, P. M.

The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, met, and, after sermon by the Rev. James Dick, the Moderator, from 2 Cor. iv. 1, 2, was constituted.

The Presbytery of London reported that they had inducted the Report of Lon Rev. Mr. Waddell, into the pastoral charge of the Congregation don Presbyters in Harwich, on October 31st, 1854; the Rev. Archibald Cross, to that of Ingersoll, on January 11th, 1855; the Rev. John Hogg. into that of Detroit, on March 14th; and the Rev. James Duncan into that of Bayfield, on May 9th. Further, that they had accepted Mr. Logie's demission of the pastoral charge of Bayfield, on October 13th, 1854, and Mr. Devine's demission of that of Goderich, on February 28th, 1855; and that they had organized the Congregation of Westminster, on August 2nd, 1854.

The Rev. Mr. Duncan's credentials were read and approved August 2nd, 1854, with the understanding that he should, by and bye, engage in ministerial labour. On January 30th, 1855, he was appointed, in compliance with the wishes of the people, to officiate in Bayfield, on the days when it would otherwise be vacant. At the earnest request of the people, this appointment was so extended, as that he should statedly supply it.

Lerost of Laron to L. estyters

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that, on the 5th of September, 1854, the Rev. James McIntosh, formerly of Sheils, in the Presbytery of Aberdeen, Scotland, having presented the requisite testimonials, was received into connection with the Church in Canada, and his name placed on the list of probationers; that on the 3rd of October, 1854, the Rev. Peter Glassford, formerly minister of the U. P. Congregation of Leitholm, in the Presbytery of Kelso, Scotland, having presented the requisite testimonals, was also received into connection with the Church, and his name placed on the list of probationers; also, that on the 3rd day of October last, they had inducted the Rev. Alexander Kennedy, to the pastoral charge of the U. P. Congregation of Dombarton and Canton, and that his name had been added to the Rod of Presbytery; and that on the 8th day of May, 1855, they Lad received the Rev. Peter D. Muir, formerly of the U. P. Congregation of Huntingdon, C. E., and placed his name on the list of probationers.

Parent of Wel-Lugar Licely

The Presbytery of Wellington reported that they had inducted the Rev. J. F. A. S. Fayette, into the pastoral charge of the U. P. Congregation of Euphrasia and St. Vincent, on Thursday, 25th January, 1855.

Leport of Brant l' esbytery.

The Presbytery of Brant reported that, on the 9th October, 1851, they had inducted the Rev. Joseph Scott, into the pastoral charge, of the Congregation of Blandford; and that on the 6th February, 1855, they had dissolved the pastoral connection between the Rev. George Murray, and the Congregation of Woodstock.

Roll of Flamboro Preshytery.

The Roll of Flamboro' Presbytery, which had not been transmitted, was now handed in by the Clerk of that Presbytery; and the Roll of the Presbytery of Durham, not having been transmitted Red of Durham to the Clerk of Synod was, in the absence of the Clerk of Presentative bytery, filled up to the best of the knowledge of the members of

Presbytery present, and of the members of Synod. The Roll of Synod was now called and marked.

Lo'l called

Proceeded to make choice of a Moderator, when, on motion Moderator cha- of the Rev. Mr. Coutts, seconded by the Rev. Professor Taylor, the Rev. Robert Torrance was unanimously chosen Moderator, who thereupon took the Chair, and addressed the Synod.

Unfaished business, list of.

The Clerk presented a list of the business left over from last year, as also, of Reports required to be made by Committees appointed at last meeting of Synod.

Devotio sto condict.

The Rev. Joseph Scott, and the Rev. Archibald Cross, were appointed to conduct the devotional exercises of the Synod tomorrow-morning; and on motion of Professor Taylor, seconded by

Mr. Duff, it was agreed that, in the devotional exercises of tomorrow, theré shall be special reference to the state of the Nation, and of a large portion of the civilized world, as engaged in war; and that the gracious interposition of Divine Providence, at so momentous a juncture, be earnestly implored.

The Rev. Mr. Skinner having stated that the Rev. Mr. Cavan, Missions, Mr. Orwho had been appointed to deliver an Address at the missionary mistor to address meeting of Synod, on Thursday evening, would not, on account of ill health, be present, it was, on motion, agreed that the Rev. Mr. Ormiston be, and he is hereby requested to take the place of Mr. Cavan, and deliver an Address on Missions, on Thursday evening.

The Rev. Messrs. Dick and Waddell, were appointed to ex- Accounts Com. to amine the accounts of the Synod's Treasurers. Report to be Audit. given in at the evening Sederunt, on Thursday.

The Moderator now resigned the office of Convener of the Mr. Dick to be Committee of Bills and Overtures, and the Rev. James Dick was Convener of Com. of Bills and appointed Convener in his stead.

TORONTO, WEDNESDAY, June, 6, 1855, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Torrance, Moderator.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Messrs. Cross Devotional Exerand Joseph Scott.

The Rell was called, and the minutes of last Sederunt were read and approved.

On motion of Mr. Jennings, and seconded by Mr. Aitken, it was Resolved—That the action of the London Presbytery, in inducting the Rev. James Duncan to the charge of the Congregation of Bayfield, be sustained now, as said induction has taken place; but feel it due to the Synod to declare that the Presbytery has committed an irregularity, by disregarding the law of Synod, stated on page 129, of printed minutes of 1850, to the following purport, namely, "that no preacher be ordained or installed till he have gone, at least, once over all the Presbyteries."

Eldership, Overture on Took up the Overture of Mr. Skinner on the Eldership of the following purport:— To the Reverend the Moderator and other Members of the United Presbyterian Synod, to meet in Toronto, June, 1853, the following Overture is respectfully submitted:—

That, whereas, the undersigned, at the making up of the Synod Roll, in June 1852, gave in the name of a Ruling Elder from each of the two Sessions in which he presides, believing that in so doing he was acting in accordance with the recognised principles of Presbytery, and with the law and wonted practice of the Church-and whereas, some of the members of Synod objected to the relevancy of each congregation and session being represented in Synod by a Ruling Elder, especially when more than one congregation are under one pastoral superintendenceand whereas, this question, so seriously affecting the interests of our congregations and Sessions, in relation to their full and proper representation in our Church Courts, was then left in abeyance, and at no subsequent Sederunt brought up for further consideration :- It is hereby respectfully overtured that this Synod, in their present session, do relieve the minds of vacant congregations, as well as of those where more than one fully organized congregation are under the pastoral care of the same minister, by affirming the law of the church, as recorded in the "Rules and Forms of Procedure, in the Church Courts, in the United Presbyterian Church," Chap. I. par. 12, 'It is the right and duty of every session, whether in a settled or a vacant congregation, to appoint one of the elders to sit as its representative in the Presbytery and Synod.' Also, section III. para. 1. 'The Synod is the Supreme Court of the Church, and is composed of the whole ministers having charges, with an elder from each session, holding a commission for that purpose.'

After reasoning for some time, a motion was read by the Rev. Reasoning Mr. Jennings, with a view to dispose of the question, when the Overture. hour of noon having arrived the Synod adjourned, to meet again at 2 o'clock.

III. SEDERUNT.

TORONTO, WEDNESDAY, June 6, 1855, 2 o'clock, P. M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Torrance, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of the former Sederunt were read and approved.

Resumed the business interrupted by the adjournment in the Eldership, morning.

1. Mr. Jennings, seconded by Dr. Ferrier, moved, That the Rev. Mr. Skinner's overture, requiring that the Synod affirm it to be the law of the Church, that every Session (though several be con-

nected under one pastoral charge) be represented by an Elder, te not sustained, as it would be an innovation on the fundamental principles of Presbytery:-that any elders who are now present. or who may come by appointment to this Session of Synod, shail be allowed to retain their seats, inasmuch as the mind of this Court has been undecided since said innovation commenced, but that, thenceforth, one elder only shall be appointed from one or more congregations forming, in the meantime, one pasteral charge.

2. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Aitken, seconded by Dr. W.(Taylor, That without interfering with the constitution of the present Synod in respect to the ruling elders, as determined by former practice, the custom of only one ruling elder from each session being recognised as a member of Presbyteries and Synods be abandoned, and henceforth all ruling elders of this Churen, in good standing, be acknowledged as members of Presbyteries and Synods.

3. It was further moved by Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Dick, That this Synod approve of the spirit of the overture, and while admitting, as an abstract principle, the right of all rating elders to a seat in the courts of the Church, the Synot samply affirm the right of every Session to be represented, irrespective of its position as to pastoral oversight.

The motion of Mr. Thornton was put against the amendment of Mr. Aitken, when 25 votes were given in favour of the former. and II for the latter.

The next vote was taken between the motion of Mr. Thornton. and the motion of Mr. Jennings, when there voted for Mr. Thornton's motion 31, and for that of Mr. Jennings' 4.

The motion of Mr. Thornton was declared to be carried; and the Synod did, and hereby do, agree and decide in terms of the said motion.

That this Synod approve of the spirit of the overture; and while admitting, as an abstract principle, the right of all the ruling elders to a seat in the courts of the Church, this Synod simply affirm the right of every session to be represented, irrespective of its position, as to pastoral oversight.

Mr. Jennings requested that his dissent from this decision. should be marked, for reasons to be afterwards given in.

Took up an overture from the Rev. Mr. Thornton, anent trials als for, Overture for ordination, stating substantially that there is a diversity of practice among Presbyteries in this matter, and requesting the

On motion of Mr. Dick, seconded by Mr. Ewing, the Synologorius, agreed to dismiss the overture, and affirm the present rules and affirm the present rules and practice of the Church, take as the Synod did, and do dismiss and affirm, in terms of the motion.

The Report of the Committee was received, and the thanks of Record the Synod were given them for the diligence with which they had Tables, performed the duties entrusted to them.

The Committee of Distribution, consisting of Rev. Messrs. Distribut Combiners, and Ormiston, was then reappointed.

Called for the Reports of Presbyteries on the Inspection of Statems, aspection of Reports of Theology.

The Presbytery of London reported that they have had only one London, student in theology under their inspection, and that he had performed, in a satisfactory manner, all the exercises which had been prescribed to him.

The Presbytery of Flamboro' reported that, they have had one Flamboro's student under their inspection, and that he had given in some exercises which had been sustained.

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that, they have had two Torontostudents under their inspection, who, in consequence of their attendance at University College, Toronto, had met with the Committee of Presbytery, only once.

The Presbytery of Durham reported that, they have had under Durham, their inspection, two students, viz: Messrs. Tisdell and McFaul, and that they had satisfactorily performed the exercises appointed by the Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Brant reported that, they had during the Brant

whole of last year, one student under their inspection, that he had been several times before them, and been examined on most of the subjects prescribed for students of the 3rd year; and that he had to leave the Theological Hall, last August, at the very commencement of the session, on account of ill health. Further, that they had received Mr. William Clarke, certified, by the Presbytery of Falkirk, as a fourth year's student, that he had been once before them, and had delivered several exercises to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

Next Meeting of The next meeting of Synod was appointed to be held, in the City of Hamilton, on the first Tuesday in June, 1856, at 7½ o'clock, in the evening.

Adjourned, to meet at 7 o'clock. Closed with the benediction.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Torrance, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of the last Sederant were read and sustained.

Letter, Committee the Report to be Problem on Union with the Presbyterian Church of Canada, read at the former Sederunt, by Professor Taylor, together with the relative documents, be printed in the appendix to the Synod's Minutes.

Took up an Overture, from the Presbytery of Wellington, of the Presbytery of Wellington, of the

Memorial and Overture to the United Presbyterian Synod, on the subject of Union with Evangelical Presbyterians in this country.

As the United Presbyterian Church has expressed a desire for Union with the Evangelical Presbyterian Bodies in this Province, especially with the Presbyterian Church of Canada—as the great barrier to Union, particularly with the latter, is obviously a difference of opinion between the two Churches as to what constitutes the fundamental principle of State religion, as exhibited in the papers which have appeared in the Ecclesiastical Missionary Record of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, and in the Canadian United Presbuterian Magazine—those in the tormer maintaining that there is a point at which the civil magistrate is bound by Divine law, and consequently has a Divine right, as a Christian magistrate, to wield his sword, and coerce his subjects to recognise the God of the Bible as the God of the nation, and to obey the dictates and ordinances of revealed religion, such as what is called the external santifica-

tion of the Sabbath, the instruction of the children in the state schools in the knowledge of the Bible, the religious sonction of oaths and mar-riages—denying at the same time that there is any persecution or faligious intolerance in coercing the citizens to these observances, and maintaining that the passages in the Westminster Confession of Faith, to which the United Presbyterians object, do not teach persecuting or intolerant principles in religion; those in the latter maintaining, on the other hand, that all interference of the civil magistrate, in the way of authoritative command, to observe this or that dictate or ordinance of revealed religion, is an infringement of the religious liberty of the citizens; that while the civil magistrate is bound to do all that he does as a civil magistrate, as well as the private citizen, to the glory of God, yet there is no point, in the profession of the Christian religion, where he may legitimately enter with his sword to enforce it on his subjects, and that the Statute Book of the New Testament Church is absolutely destitute, even by implication, of the shadow of a warrant for the primary principle of state religion; and maintain that to affirm that the Westminster Confession of Faith does not teach persecuting and intolerant principles in religion, is contrary to the tenor of both the National Solemn League and Covenant, and the Acts of Parliament connected with the enforcement of them, to the fact that not one Presbyterian, so far as we know, held even the doctrine of toleration in those days, and to the history of the Church of Scotland down, in particular, to the year 1828, when the Test and Corporation Acts were repealed; taking into account the great discrepancy of opinion as to matter of historical facts and doctrinal principle, the Synod is hereby overtured to make a distinct declaration as to the true meaning of the exception to the Westminster Confession, in the second question of our Formula, put to ministers and elders at ordination, and to students at being licensed, which says, "you are not required to approve of any thing in these documents which teaches, or is supposed to teach, compulsory or persecuting and intolerant principles in religion," as on this hinges the whole question of difference between the two Bodies.

Preachers to have two Sabbaths a Lord's Supper.

1. That although preachers are urgently required to supply wear, to observe vacant congregations and stations, yet it is reasonable and proper that they be allowed, at least, two Sabbaths each, every year, to be at their own disposal, for the purpose of embracing opportunities of observing the Lord's Supper, in Congregations within their reach. Your Committee, however, find difficulties in suggesting any plan by which this can be secured without interfering with

the appointments of preachers to particular places, and therefore they think that it must be left with the preachers themselves and with the Presbyteries, to fix on those Sabbaths when the several preachers might be left unemployed with a view to the object contemplated.

2. That preachers be enjoined to attend the meetings of the Preachers to at-Presbyteries, in the bounds of which they happen to be, so far as tend Presbytery, practicable;—that Presbyteries take opportunity of conversing with them, for the purpose of receiving information, and giving advice and direction:—And that Presbyteries be also enjoined to enforce the laws of Synod respecting the duties of preachers, and that preachers be exhorted to a diligent and conscientious discharge of all the services expected of them.

3. That in cases of Ministers demitting their charges for reasons Demitting muchs which, in the judgment of their respective Presbyteries, affect their usefulness, it be understood that they cannot be placed on the Roll of Probationers without the consent of all the Presbyteries of the Church, or by the direct action of the Synod.

4. That in regard to Ministers or Preachers of the United Presbyterian Church, coming to this country without the sanction of the Mission Board in Scotland, or Ministers or Preachers from other denominations, the same consent of all the Presbyteries, or Synodical action shall be required, in order to their being placed on the list of Probationers.

Resumed the consideration of the third Resolution, in the series introduced by Mr. Jennings at the former Sederunt, of the tenor following :-

3. That this Church having reached such strength, and the material interests of the country being so prosperous, we are therefore well assured this Church can be entirely self-supporting, and in duty ought no longer to accept any aid from the Mission Fund in Scotland.

Mr. Jennings consented, after reasoning, to withdraw the above resolution in favour of the following, which was moved by Dr. Ferrier, seconded by Mr. Hogg, and unanimously adopted, viz:-

That this Synod shall henceforth consider, and hereby declare Deliverance. themselves, to be self-sustaining, so far as congregations now settled are concerned; it being understood that such congregations as still need the stipends of their ministers supplemented, shall receive what is necessary from our own funds; and that whatever is received from the Church at home shall, in future, be applied solely to the extension of their mission field in this country: it being further understood that this shall not interfere with existing arrangements between the Synod at Home, and minsiters or preachers in this country.

Mr. Jennings, seconded by Dr. Taylor, moved-That inasmuch Union, report of as it is alleged there is a discrepancy between the statement of Committee of the first Committee of this Synod, on Union with the Free Church, In their Report, dated Hamilton, 9th May, 1848, marked Section 1. page 53, and the declaration in the Testimony, and objection taken to the same; and inasmuch, also, as said alleged discrepancy has been considered by certain members of the Free Church, and insisted on, as a barrier to Union, this Synod declare that the Report of proceedings of said Committee, as published, is not to be regarded as binding upon the conscience of members of this Church, and that the declaration in the Testimony is to be taken as expressive of the views of this Church on the question of the magistrate's power in matters of religion.

It was moved, in amendment, by Mr. Barrie, seconded by Mr. Amendment.

That the Synod do not entertain this motion, inasmuch as the statements of our first Committee on Union, in their conferences with the Committee on Union with the Presbyterian Church of Canada, are no part of our subordinate Standards.

The amendment being first put to vote, was carried by a large Deliverance majority; and the Synod did, and do resolve and decide in terms thereof.

A. Received a Memorial from the Rev. Andrew Kennedy, in relation to his Agency as Colporteur of the Presbyterian Board of Publication in Philadelphia.

On motion of Professor Taylor, it was

Resolution on

Resolved, That the Synod agree to state that they approve of Colportage, as adapted to the circumstances of Canada; that they regard it as a matter of the highest importance that the literary matter thereby presented to the community be of a sound, scriptural, instructive, and editying kind; that they gladly recognize the publications of the Presbyterian Board of Publication, in Philadelphia, as deserving that character; that it affords them pleasure to learn that the Rev. Andrew Kennedy, an aged minister of this Church, who is, in Providence, disabled for public preaching, is appointed an Agent for the Board in Canada West, and that they cordially recommend him, in that capacity, to their brethren of the United Presbyterian Church, and to the people of God in general.

Printing, orders for. Ordered, That a sufficient number of Blank Forms, for Presbyterial and Congregational Statistics, be printed under the direction of the Clerk of Synod.

Ordered, That 400 copies of the Minutes of this meeting of Synod, be printed for the use of Ministers and Sessions.

Ordered, That the sum of £2 be paid to the Church Officer, for his attendance and services at this meeting of Synod.

Thanks to 1st Congregation, Toronte, The thanks of the Synod were given to the Minister, and other office bearers, and congregation, of the First United Presbyterian Church of Toronto, for the accommodation furnished this meeting of Synod.

The Moderator then addressed the Synod.

After engaging in praise, the Moderator announced that the next meeting of Synod would be held in the City of Hamilton, on the first Tuesday of June, 1856, at half-past seven o'clock, in the evening, and then closed the Session with the apostolical benediction.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON UNION, AND RELATIVE DOCUMENTS.

Toronto, August 30, 1854

The Committee on Union met. Present, with the Convener, the Rev. Messrs. Thornton, Jennings, and Skinner. The Convener was called to the Chair, and the meeting was constituted with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Skinner. The Rev. Mr. Thornton was appointed Clerk. The Convener stated that he had been duly furnished with an authenticated copy of the Deed of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, dated 17th June last, and that he had given notice of this meeting of Committee to the Rev. Mr. Ure, Convener of a Committee on Union, appointed by the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. The aforesaid Deed of that Synod was read, viz:—

At Toronto, on Saturday, the 17th day of June, 1854, the which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada met and was constituted,

Inter alia, The Synod resumed consideration of the papers on the subject of Union with the United Presbyterian Church. After lengthened reasoning, it was, without a vote, Resolved, That the Synod having considered the Memorial from the congregation of Knox's Church, Hamilton, and the Resolution of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, anent Union between that Body and this Synod, express their earnest desire to see that object attained, provided that it can be artained on Scriptural principles, declare their willingness to consider opiniors on the lawfulness of State Endowments, without Erastian submission to the State, as a matter of forbearance, but continue to consider the views which they have always held, and formerly expressed by their Committee, on the duty of the civil magistrate, and the responsibility of nations to God, to be of such vital importance as to demand that they be made a term of ecclesiastical incorporation, and believe the practical effects resulting from the principles referred to, to be of such a character as to render the maintaining of these principles in all their integrity, necessary to the best interests of the Church of Christ.

And further, that this Synod, while convinced that no Union which ignores these principles can be effected, or if effected, can prove beneficial, nevertheless appoint & Committee to confer with the Committee of the United Presbyterian Church, and to devise, in accordance with the terms of this deliverance, measures which may conduce to harmony of opinion and action on this and all other points of doctrine and practice which this Church holds vital, and, when practicable, to effecting a proper and lasting Union: the Committee to consist of Dr. Bayne, Dr. Wilhe, Dr. Burns, Professor Young, Messrs. D. McKenzie, Mark Y. Stark, R. Ure, W. Gregg, Robt. Boyd, J. M. Roger, J. B. Duncan, D. Fraser, J.

Scott, W. McLaren, Ministers; and Messrs, J. Shaw, W. Begg, J. Hall, J. Court, A. Smith, W. Heron, W. McMillan, and D. Kennedy, Elders. Mr. Ure to be Convener.

After some reasoning, the following motion was adopted: That the Committee having read the Deed of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, relative to Union with the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, dated Toronto, 17th June last, and having conversed sometime thereon

Resolve, I. That the Committee express their continued cordial approval of the Resolutions of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, under date 8th June last, and, in particular, their approval of the second of these Resolutions, in which it is set forth "that there are in the judgment of the Synod no sufficient reasons for this Church and the Presbyterian Church of Canada continuing in a state of separation, and that many great and obvious advantages might be expected, under the Divine blessing, to result from their heartily uniting on sound and scriptural principles."

II. That the Committee deeply regret to find themselves precluded, by the terms and purport of the above-cited Deed of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, from taking any steps at present towards the accomplishment of the Union in question.

III. That the Committee adjourn sine die; and that a copy of these Resolutions, together with a respectful letter from the Chairman, be transmitted to the Convener of the Committee named in the aforesaid Deed of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

Dr. Taylor stated to the Synod that he had endeavoured to fulfil the appointment of Committee, by addressing the following letter to the Rev. Mr. Ure:—

TORONTO, August 31, 1854.

REV. DEAR SIR: I beg to acquaint you that, agreeably to an intimation, I had the pleasure of forwarding to you, some weeks ago, the United Presbyterian Synod in Canada's Committee on Union met here yesterday, and adopted the following motion: "That the Committee having read the Deed," &c., &c., [as given above.]

Now, dear Sir, permit me to assure you that it would have given me the most unfergned satisfaction had matters presented a more favourable aspect. Nevertheless, I have in no degree ceased to wish and to hope for a Union; and in this, I am sure, I express the mind of many of the best of the ministers, elders, and members of our Church. It seems to me, however, that nothing can be more injudicious than to push the matter prematurely. I trust that, in the meantime, the great King and Head of the Church will overrule every thing for the furtherance of h s own glory, and the promotion of pure and undefied religion.

Dr. Taylor said that he was soon favoured with a courteous note from Mr. Ure, acknowledging receipt of the above; and afterwards received the following communication:—

Streetsville, November 22, 1854.

REV. DEAR SIR: I beg to inform you that the Committee on Union of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, met on the 31st ultimo, and adopted the following motion:-

"That the Committee having read the Resolutions of the Committee of the United Presbyterian Synod in Canada, agree to express their deep regret at the decision come to by the last named Committee, which seems to preclude, for the present, the hope of a joint meeting of the Committees; and declare that, while not disposed to modify in any degree their estimate of the importance of the principles referred to in the Deed of their Synod, they are nevertheless of opinion that such a joint meeting might be productive of beneficial results in the way of removing any possible misunderstandings that may exist, and of facilitating the progress of a Union on a basis mutually satisfactory."

Permit me, my dear Sir, in conveying to you the above decision, to express the pain which I feel in common with yourself at the somewhat unfavourable aspect which matters have for the present assumed in reference to Union. I deeply regret that any thing in our Deed of Synod should have been considered by your Committee as a barrier in the way of mutual conference; for I must say, I counted much upon the good which might result from a frank and friendly interchange of views and sentiments. As it is, I hope the time is not distant when negociations may be resumed, with some reasonable prospect of their leading to a suc-

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION.

The Committee on Theological Education beg respectfully to report as

The Session of the Divinity Hall was opened on Tuesday, 1st August. The Rev. Mr. Thornton, the only member of Committee present, besides Dr. Taylor, conducted devotional exercises and delivered an Address; after which the Introductory Lecture was read.

With regard to the Students who came forward, in addition to Messrs. John Lees and John Fotheringham, both of whom had completed their curriculum the preceding year, but attended this year spontaneously, there were: of the Fonrth year, none, that being the year corresponding to the one during which the Professorship was vacant, and in which there never were ny students;—of the Third year, two, Messrs. Robert C. Moffat and Francis Tisdell, the former of whom, becoming seriously unwell, after a few weeks, found it necessary to leave ;-of the Second year, one, Mr. Alex. McFaul, who entered in 1852, but was prevented by severe illness from attending in 1853;—and of the First year, four, Messrs. John N. Agnew, James M. Campbell, Thomas Chesnut, and Robert Hume, the last of whom, however, in compliance with the wishes of his friends, immediately withdrew, in consequence of the prevalence of cholera in the city. Mr. John McNaughton also entered as a hearer, but left before the close, owing to bad health.

During the Session, the students were examined on Dr. Dick's Lectures, from the 82nd, inclusive, to the end, and on Mosheim's Church History, from the 11th to the 15th century, both inclusive. They read critically

in Greek the Epistle to the Galatians, and the 15th chapter of 1st Corinthians; and in Hebrew, selected passages in Genesis, beginning with the interview between the Angel and Hagar at the well of Lahai-roi, and ending with the burial of Sarah, together with the corresponding portions of the Septuagint. Besides the usual discourses, also, several passages in the New Testament were prescribed as themes for written exercises; and a few meetings, at the close of the Session, were devoted to the subject of Homiletics. The students conducted themselves with propriety, and performed the exercises satisfactorily. But the attendance was less regular than usual, in consequence of the unhealthiness of the season. The Session was closed on Friday, 6th October, an Address having been delivered by the Rev. Mr. Dick, Moderator of Synod, the only member of Committee who attended.

The Committee have expended the sum of five pounds on Theological books, which have been added to the Library.

With regard to the matter remitted to the Committee by the Synod at its ninth sederunt last year, an Address has been prepared, which the Committee now place at the disposal of the Synod; and nothing further has been done.

The Committee beg now to solicit the most serious attention of the Synod to a proposal which they deem of great importance to the future welfare of the Hall, viz., that the time of the annual Session be changed, so that it shall commence in the beginning of November, and terminate in the end of April, or at such other periods near to these, as the Synod shall see meet to appoint. The Committee refrain from introducing into this Report any other of the considerations which seem to recommend this proposal, than that the season at which the Session has hitherto been held, is generally regarded as the most unhealthy in the year, the season, too, at which it seems least of all desirable that persons should make a change in their mode of living, as students coming to town must almost inevitably do; and that, even when the season is not specially unhealthy, it is, by reason of the heat which usually prevails during the greater part of it, exceedingly unfavorable for continuous mental application; while, by changing the Session to the time when University College, Toronto, and almost all other academical institutions in the Province hold their sittings, an opportunity would be afforded to the students of prosecuting their literary and philosophical studies along with their Theological.

Reflecting on the paramount importance of the Divinity Hall for the maintenance and prosperity of the Church, and on the very unsatisfactory state of matters during last Session, owing chiefly to the bad health in the Students, the Committee entreat the Synod to give to the subject, of all its aspects, their most careful and solemn consideration.

[No. III.]

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 4, 1855.

Your Committee would begin this Report by stating that, for the purpose of saving the funds of the Church, they have deemed it prudent to hold as few general meetings as they could in the course of the past year, and that they appointed a small sub-committee, composed of persons so situated locally, that they could easily meet for the transaction of any business that might call for attention in the intervals of Committee. They see no reason to regret this arrangement. All the matters that came up at different periods have been duly attended to by the sub-committee, and decided upon to the satisfaction of the Committee.

Your Committee are sorry to report that but few missionaries have come over from the Church at home, during the past year, to labour in the wide and extending field for missionary enterprise which Canada preears. Of those who have come, one has been installed in a congregaa of the Pre-bytery of Canada East; others have also obtained pastocharges, and thus their labours have become, in a great measure, local all confined, so that only a few remain on the list of probationers, to give t', ir much needed help in the cultivation of those spots which have none to minister statedly among them in word and doctrine. Committee fear that supplies from Scotland are to decrease eather man increase. With the exception of the Rev. David Todd, late of Stone-haven, there is no ward of any ministers of preachers coming out from home, and young as a in this country appear to be very backward in devoting themselve. . . work of to ministry. Should not the Synod taken into special e ration the .. go and increasing spheres of spiritual usefulness waich are opening, and endeavor to devise some efficient measures for procuring men to enter upon and occupy them ?

Four congregations have received sums of greater or smaller amount out of the Mission Fund during the year that has closed. One of these applications your Committee had great difficulty in granting, on the grounds that the congregation applying has been receiving help for a considerable period-been increasing in membership, and sharing in the material prosperity with which God has been blessing our Province, and yet been making no progress towards being self-sustaining. Another congregation had a claim through the terms on which their minister had been ordained among them, and the sum applied for was granted, that they might be clear with him to the date of his demission. One of the remaining two weak congregations, appears to be in a district which is anything but favourable to the prosperity of its inhabitants; it affords but little prospect of increase, and hence is likely, if allowed, to be long dependent upon the fund. The last application, which came to hand since the Syod convened, has been referred to your court for advice. The other supplement congregation has been making good progress; and your Committee have just learned from the Clerk of the Presbytery, within whose bounds it is situated, that it has become self-supporting. The sum total drawn by these congregations is £64 3s. 4d.

Eleven probationers have drawn more or less out of the funds that are in the hands of your Treasurer. Altogether there have been paid in the vacancies in which they have been labouring about £470. been paid by your Treasurer to the amount of £327 10s. 2d. Five of these have come out, under arrangements with the Mission Board in Scotland, and are consequently entitled to the rate of £100 sterling? the others had no claim of that kind, and thus their income was at the rate of only £100 currency. All these parties were required to send reports of their labours, in the different Presbyteries, to the Presbytery Clerks, drawn up according to a given form, which was prepared by the sanction of Synod, and these were transmitted by the Cierks to your Committee; and in addition they were required to fill up a general statement, which they sent direct to the Convener. Your Committee would remark that these forms have been of the greatest service to them, lessening their labour most materially, and enabling them to perceive at a glance whether probationers have been diligent and faithful in the stations among which they have been labouring.

Mr. James Fraser, Catechist, has been spared to labour, which he has done with his usual earnestness and fidelity, during another year. His reports have been forwarded with the same regularity as formerly, and breath the same spirit of zeal and piety. He has been paid in the places where he itinerates, £18 1s. 1d., and has drawn from the fund £11 18s. 11d.

Your Committee have granted to the Presbytery of Durham, on their petition, the sum of £15, to be expended in paying a missionary to labour \mathbf{n} the destitute localities which the Presbytery includes. We have no doubt this act will meet with your approbation. Your Committee have

also manimously granted £25 to a minister, who has been in the ministry in the Province for several years, who, during that time, has been receiving less than the minima nof stprad, but who, in the spirit of self-denial, retraded from applying to the Fond till necessity was laid upon him, and even then drew only a very small part of the sum he was entitled to. In this also we are certain off meeting your approval.

At this stage of their Report your Committee would pause, and present

The Treasurer of the Home Grant has drawn $\pounds548$ 14s. 5d., and paid $\pounds515$ 9s. 10d., leaving a balance in his hand of $\pounds33$ 4s. 7d.

Your Committee would further report that, at a meeting held on the 11th I dy last, Mr. Robert Christie, laid on the table a letter from the Rev. Mr. Dick, of the 1st inst., enclosing the sum of twelve pounds, from the Congregation of Rich nond Hill, and station of King, and placing it at the disposal of the Mission Committee, to be applied in aiding one of the weak but promising congregations, in the Presbytery of Wellington.—Notification was given to the Presbytery named, to whose order the money has since been paid, and who have appropriated it to the congregations of Euphrasia and St. Vincent, over which Mr. Fayette was installed in January last. Your Committee rejoice in this act of liberality, and hope it will have a good effect upon the Congregations of the United Presbyterian Church in the country, stirring them up to similar acts of chessian generosity.

Your Committee have end-avoured through Presbyteries, to bring the vacancies to give more liberally towards the payment of probationers, but their efforts have been comparatively, if not wholly, in vain. This matter we would also commend to your special attention. Under all the disadvantages which bear on our vacancies, they might, and ought, to do more in renumeration for the services they receive. Would it not be desirable to recommend that Presbyteries, or deputations from them, hold public meetings, in the vacancies within their bounds, and instruct the people in their duty to give as the Lord had prospered them, or bring the matter under the special attention of the Elders and Managers?

It was the wish of your Committee to have the Statistical Tables of the different Presbyteries forwarded to them at an early season, in the current year, and with that view givey instructed the Convener to write to Clerks of Presbyteries, and request them to send the returns in, as soon as practicable, that they might be published in one sheet. All the Presbyteries have shown a readiness to comply with this request, except one, and as it was far on in May before that report came to hand, the publication of the general sheet has been delayed. Your Committee must express their regret at this circumstance. They consider it important that these returns be faithfully and punctually made, and to have them in time to send to Scotland, that the Secretary of the Mission Board there, may avail himself of them, in drawing up his annual report for the Synod.—
This might be done with ease, if Presbyteries were duly attentive, but owing to their neglect, your Committee have never yet been able to have the statistics forward, in time, to Mr. Somerville.
