



Gilbert in "The Yeoman of the Guard" are not without point; for the First Lord of the Admiralty, the man who has practically supreme control of naval affairs, is always a Cabinet Minister, who has achieved his position with pen and speech, and probably doesn't know the difference between cruiser and a battleship.

Of course, he is assisted in his work by experts. 



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

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### Weights and Measures

The fellowing sections of the Act Respecting Weights and Measures are published for general information:-

'Any person who shall use a beam scale. weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, or who shall alter the same after being so assayed and the same after being so assayed and the model of the same after being so assayed and the same after being so as a same after being stamped, or who shall use steelyards, except for the purpo e of weighing hay or straw, or who shall use a beam made of wood, shall ferfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.'

Salt may be sold by measure, or by weight; if sold by measure, there shall be eighteen gallons to a tub (liquid measurement) and three tubs to a hogshead. Any person who shall sell or dispose of salt by measure, otherwise than according to the standard hereby established shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.

The Chief Inspector, and Inspectors shall, when required, inspect and adjust all beams, weights and measures brought to the office of either of them, The Fairbanks-M. J. O'MARA,
