1. ALEXANDER CAMPRELL

Was born in the County Fermanagh, Ireland, December 5th. 1820, and died at Newcastle, C.W., Dec 31st, 1865. His first religious impressions were received through the example and instructio of a pious mother. In the 15th year of his age, he was converted to God, and united with the Church. When 18 years of age, he was appointed leader of

a class, by the Rev. John Saul. In the Spring of 1845, he emigrated to Canada, and settled in the Township of Brock, where his father then resided; and in the fa l of 1846, was employed as Assistant Missionary on the Brock Mission, under the superintendence of the Rev. Wm Young At the following Conference he was received on trial as a candidate for the ministry. From that time until his last illness, he showed himself a faithful labourer in the vineyard of his Lord On every Circuit where he laboured, God gave him fruit of his ministry in the conversion of souls and the edification of the Church. From the last London Conference he returned to his Circuit with earnest determination to work more heartily than ever, and cherishing the highest hope of success in his loved employ. But God's ways are not as our ways. Early in July, 1865, while pursuing his pastoral work, he caught cold, disease of the lungs ensued, and he was laid aside; hoping, however, soon again to be able to resume his work. This hope was not broken until December, when a consultation of physicians informed him that his disease must very soon prove fatal. Thenceforward he sank rapidly, until he slept in Jesus. During all his affliction, the presence of God, and the precious Gospel he delighted in preaching to others, abundantly sustained and cheered him He was entirely resigned to the will of his Heavenly Father. His strong, well-balanced mind, remained vigorous to the last; and many expressions of gratitude, resignation, and christian hope, were given by him in p esence of those friends who stood around him in his last hours. As a Christian, Bro Campbell's walk comported well with his profession. His preaching was sound in doctrine, and clear and forcible in exposition. As a Methodist, he was an ardent and intelligent lover of Wesleyan discipline and usages. Faithful as a pastor, he "took heed to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost had made him an overseer, to feed the Church of God;" "and when the chief Shepherd shall appear, he shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

2. REV. RUFUS ARLINGTON FLANDERS.

The Rev Rufus Arlington Flanders was born on the 1st of June, 1817. He was blessed with a pious and devoted mother, whose christian fidelity was the means of his conversion to God in 1838, the fruits of which were evinced in his subsequent life and conduct. He at once united with the Church of his choice, and during the remainder of his

life, deemed it a duty, a privilege, and an honour, to be connected with the great Wesleyan Missionary enterprise.

He entered the Ministry in 1841, and, during his ministorial life, travelled extensively, and laboured successfully.

At the Conference of 1864, he was elected Chairman of the Stanstead District He keenly felt the responsibility of his twofold office. After a few days illness, he finished his earthly work on the 12th of October, 1865.

He was a man of sterling worth. He laboured hard and perseveringly to promote the glory of God. Amongst his last words were —"The grace that has sustained me through life is sufficient now." He died at his post, emphatically falling asleep in Jesus. The esteem in which he was held was manifested by a large circle of surviving friends.

REV. WILLIAM HENRY WINAMS

Departed this life on the 30th May, 1866, in the 25th year of his age, and the third of his ministry In early life he was the subject of gracious influences, thrown around him by the prayers and . xample of pious parents. These influences resulted in his conversion to God, in the 11th year of his age. In youth, his piety was genuine and conspicuous. and in maturer life he "adorned the gospel of God our Saviour in al things. Three years ag he entered our itinerant work as a candidate for the christian mi istry. His first year in the work was spent in the Exeter Circuit, where his labours were crowned with great success. His next appointment was the Strathroy Circuit. Here, too, the blessing of God succeeded his efforts, and many were added to the Church. At the Conference of 1865, he was appointed to the Ingersoll Circuit, where even greater success attended his ministrations than that which marked the previous, years.

In the Autuma of last year, it became apparent to his Superintendent and friends that his health was giving way. He was urged to take rest, but refused, till his physical weakness absolutely compelled him to do so. He went to the home of his parents, where he gradually wasted away under the blighting influence of consumption. During his illness his faith in Christ, as a present and all-sufficient Saviour, was strong and unwavering He frequently expressed a desire to live that he might preach thrist to perishing sinners. His last hours were crowned with the gracious presence of the Saviour.

A brother Minister who witnessed his death, describes it as "the most peaceful and triumphant" he ever saw." His course was a short but most successful one. He "rests from his labours and his works do follow him."

Resolved,—That the Conference be recommended to allow the Trustees of the Rawdon Wesleyan Church to sell the said church, on condition that they secure to the Conference a church offered for sale in that village.

Resolved,—That the Conference be recommended to authorize the Trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Mille Isle to move the church in that place from its present site to Strong's Mills, as it is believed that such removal would tend very greatly to promote the prosperity of the cause in that mission.

Resolved,—That the Conference be recommended to re-appoint the Rev. Thos. Cosford as Treasurer of the Church Relief Fund for the coming year.

Resolved,—That we respectfully recommend to the Conference the appointment of a committee to obtain an act legalizing all conveyances of church property since 1859, and either excepting the Wesleyan Methodist Church from the Consolidated Act, and making only the sanction of the Conference necessary as formerly, or so to amend that Act as to render its working as simple and inexpensive as possible.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

The Committee beg to report that the Treasurer has met the claims of 732 children for the past year, at the rate of \$26 per child. There is a balance in hand of \$106 82.

The discrepancy between the number estimated at last Conference, and that actually paid, is satisfactorily accounted for by some changes which took place after the estimate of last year was completed.

For this reason there is the above named balance in hand, instead of the expected deficiency. The claims of twenty-four children have expired this year; but there have been 75 added to the list, making a net increase of 56 in the number now to be provided for, which is 787.

On the one hand, it is thought that the rate per member, requisite to meet the full claims of this number, viz., 42 cents, is too high, and, on the other hand, the ministers will not cheerfully submit to receive so small a sum as \$24 per child, which is all that 35 cents, the usual rate, will pay.

Looking at the prevailing dissatisfaction with the present arrangements, the Committee have given their careful consideration to the various resolutions submitted to them by the Conference. They find that there are 36 children whose parents are stationed on

French, German, and Indian Missions, and 91 children of superannuated Ministers. The remaining number is 660, whose parents are employed on the regular Circuits and Domestic Missions. claims of these, at \$30 a child, can be paid by a rate of 35 cents from all the members and members on trial in the regular work. The Committee therefore recommend that the children on the Missions referred to be supported by the Missionary Fund—the members on such Missions being of course excused from contribution to the Children's Fund. They also recommend that the claims of the children of Superannuated Ministers be paid by the Superannuated Ministers' Fund. This arrangement they believe to be more equitable than the present one, and more likely to give satisfaction to the Ministers and members of our

The Committee also recommend the re-appointment of the General Treasurer and Secretary.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COM-MITTEE FOR 1866.

Your Committee have pleasure in being able to report a measure of success in Sunday School matters during the past year, which, although not all that could be desired, is, nevertheless, sufficient to encourage us to increased earnestness in this important department of our work.

But while rejoicing in the partial success of the year, your Committee are deeply convinced that if our Sunday School interest received that amount of attention from the members of this Conference to which it is fairly entitled, its efficiency would be vastly increased. One great hindrance to the permanent prosperity of our schools, is the difficulty of retaining the older scholars-a difficulty arising chiefly from the lack of teachers properly qualified to take charge of the advanced classes. It is earnestly recommended, there-

fore, that our Ministers and Preachers establish and conduct, wherever practicable, Bible Classes, designed as training classes for Sunday School Teachers. In connection with this point your Committee would respectfully urge upon all our Sunday School Teachers, the importance of a systematic course of Biblical study, as a necessary qualification for their work; and especially would we urge them to seek, as the great end of all their teaching, the conversion of the children to

Your Committee have learned with regret, that, in some parts of our work, there is a danger of our schools becoming a power, not only outside the Church, but antagonistic to it. They would, therefore, urge upon Superintendents of Circuits the duty of endeavouring to render the government of our schools thoroughly Methodistic and connexional in its character; and to this end they would recommend that hereafter all nominations to office in any of our Sabbath Schools, shall be subject to the approval of the Leaders' Meeting, or the Quarterly Official Board of the Circuit.

Your Committee find that, in several localities, the efficiency of our schools is greatly impaired in consequence of the financial inability of our people to procure suitable books; and they mention this fact as one indication among many of the necessity which exists for the establishment of a fund to aid schools

in poor and destitute localities.

Your Committee would again call the attention of the Conference to the important question of our Sunday School literature. In not a few of our schools, a large proportion of the library books are such as inculcate doctrines at variance with the distinctive teachings of Methodism; while in others there is a large predominance of works of religious fiction. Your Committee cannot regard, but with the gravest apprehension, the results which must inevitably flow from the circulation of such literature among the youth of our Church.

They have learned, however, with much satisfaction, that the catechisms of our Church have been introduced into many of our schools during the past year, and would urge continued effort in the same direction.

They would also recommend, wherever practicable, the formation of juvenile Missionary organizations in connexion with our Sabbath Schools, and the holding of Missionary Meetings among the children.

Your Committee have had before them, and have endeavoured carefully to consider, the important question of Sunday School conventions. It is well known, that, during the past few years, a number of county conventions have been held, in which Protestants of all denominations have united, and that, during the past year, a Provincial Convention was held in the City of Hamilton, at which a Sunday School Association was organized on the same doctrinal basis as the Evangelical Alliance. Judging from the information brought before the Committee, there can be but one opinion as to the utility of these conventions, for it was distinctly stated by those conversant with the facts, that those schools and congregations who had entered most heartily into the movement, had reaped most decided benefit, and were exerting the strongest influence in Sunday School matters, in their respective localities.

At the same time, while approving the principle of Sunday School conventions, your Committee are aware that there are certain peculiarities in connection with our work, which indicate a necessity for denominational, rather than non-denominational effort; and they would, therefore, recommend that encouragement be given to the holding of District Conventions among our own people, at which, questions affecting our Sunday School work may be discussed, a stronger connexional principle developed, and steps taken for the practical establishment and working, according to the provisions of the Discipline, of a Methodist Sunday

Your Committee, as in former years, have experienced great difficulty in obtaining full and reliable information concerning the state of our Sunday Schools. To remedy this defect, they have prepared three schedules, the first designed for Superintendents of Sunday Schools, the second for Superintendents of Circuits, and the third for District Secretaries. Your Committee recommend that these Schedules be printed by the Book-Steward, and forwarded in sufficient numbers to Superintendents of Circuits, and that the expense be met out of the Annual Sunday School collections on each Circuit.

Finally, your Committee trust that this Report will not be adopted as a mere matter of form, but that what is affirmed by the Conference in principle, will be

carried out into vigorous practice.

The Reports with which the Conference has been favoured, and the statements made by the deputation, encourage the hope that the large population of Canada, for whose spiritual advantage the French Canadian Missionary Society is established, will receive increased benefit by the labours of the Society; and this Conference avails itself of the opportunity to express an unabated interest in the religious welfare of the French Canadian population, and in the spread of Protestantism throughout Canada East.

ON THE DIVISION OF THE CONFERENCE.

Resolved,—That in order to the mature consideration of the question of dividing the Conference, and also of the scheme of division presented by the Special Committee, the whole subject be referred to the Special Committee of this year, and that the ministers attending the financial district meeting be requested to take some time for considering the measure. The Secretary to forward their deliberations to the Special Committee to aid that Committee in preparing their Report for the next Conference.

Resolved,—That it is also the judgment of this Conference, in harmony with the connexional spirit of Methodism, and with the movements toward union among other Protestant Churches, and with the important political changes which are in progress, it is desirable to initiate measures for the consolidation of Wesleyan Methodism throughout the whole of the British Provinces, from Newfoundland to Vancouver's Island and British Columbia. THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

VERY DEAR BRETHREN.

With renewed and undiminished pleasure, as the United Pastorate of the Church, we again address you on the occasion of our assembling together in Annual Conference. The relations between you, the members of the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ, and ourselves, are of the most spiritual, endearing, and important description. Upon the mutual confidence. sympathy, and co-operation of the ministry and membership of the Church depends much of its prosperity; and, we assure you, dear brethren, that, next to the smile and blessing of the great Head of the Church, we derive confidence and strength from the many evidences you have given that we have a place in your affections, an interest in your prayers, and that your hearts are fully enlisted in the awfully important and blessed work in which we are engaged. We again salute you as partakers with us of the precious faith which saves. and of the things which accompany salvation; and ever pray that you and your families may abound more and more in all the blessings of the Gospel, and that your influence and services may continually help forward the cause of true religion. May we all rejoice together in the day of the Lord Jesus !

During the past year the removal, by death, of three of our number has admonished us to be in constant readiness to render up our account, and to be diligent in improving our opportunities, and in prosecuting our work. At the same time we are greatly comforted by a review of the exemplary faithfulness of our departed brethren, and by learning that the religion they professed and preached was found to be gloriiously sufficient in their last hours. And, it is not out of place to remark, the obituary notices of the departed members of the Church, which appear from week to week, furnish demonstration that the power of true religion is still experienced among us; for they present instances of the saving efficacy of the blood of Christ, as satisfactory as those exhibited in any age of the Church, since the days of the Apostles. While this shall continue to be the case, the glory will not depart from among us, nor our labour be in vain.

Though deeply humbled at our deficiency of zeal and success, in the work to which we have devoted our lives, we yet thank God for evident tokens of His presence and blessing, and for the growth and prosperity of his cause. The increase of the membership, for the past year, is over three hundred, which, though far less than it might have been, had we all been more faithful, is nevertheless a cause of humble gratitude, and an encouragement to look for more abundant answers to prayer, and for more abundant fruits of the various truly scriptural agencies employed by our Church. One most cheering indication of improvement and progress, is every year becoming more and more apparent. We refer to the delightful fact, that between two and three thousand of the children in our Sabbath Schools are men bers of the Church, and we trust truly partakers of the blessing of saving faith, being an increase of between two and three hundred during the year. We cannot have a greater cause of joy than the increasing conviction prevailing among us, that childhood and youth are the most proper seasons for the commencement of a religious

Let this aim of the Sabbath School be also the constant aim of family life, and discipline, and instruction, and we shall soon see new and surprising prospects opening up before us. If the training of the children for God goes on universally among the members of the church, in addition to increasingly aggressive endeavors to spread religion in the world, the accumulating energy of gospel progress will gloriously hasten the universal regeneration of the world by the victorious virtue of the cross.

The numerous commodious and beautiful edifices which are every year dedicated to the worship of God, are not an insignificant cause of congratulation. Your seal and liberality, in this respect, are continually rendering the interests and institutions of the church more permanent, and are providing for the future religious welfare of your families and neighborhoods. These temples of God are the outward signs of a christian country, and show to all the community that the christianity of Canada is not a barren sentiment, but is founded in such deep practical convictions of the people as to engage their resources and energies in its behalf.

We are happy to inform you that there has been an increase in the amount raised for the numerous and various missions, of the extended field entrusted to our care. Our missionary work is the chief glory of our youthful church. God has especially honoured us by leading us on to the occupancy of a large missionary territory, now extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and He has signally owned the word preached by His servants. The missions among the aborigines, among the German and French speaking portions of our population, and in the destitute settlements of the province, are unspeakably important, especially as they relate to the future. Thousands of souls have already been gathered from them into the fold above; tens of thousands upon them are now rejoloing in hope of the glory of God; and hundreds of theusands will

Let there never, never, be any diminution of our missionary zeal; rather let us be more and more devoted, in work, liberality, and prayer, to the department, this most honorable of all departments, of self-denying and evangelizing usefulness. We have confidence in you, dear brethren, that you will always count it your honor and happiness to share in the work of spreading scriptural holiness over all parts of British America, and thus contribute a very important share to the universal spread of the gospel. Your missionaries are laboring with unwearying zeal, though often with very inadequate support, let them have a high place in your esteem, and always remember them in your addresses to the throne of the Heavenly Grace.

We think it right to refer also to our cherished institutions for the education of our youth, both male and female. The University of Victoria College, with yearly increasing efficiency, is prosecuting its noble and important work. Hundreds of young men have received in her an education, on Christian principles, which has qualified them for a worthy Christian career; and she has had no reason to be ashamed of those whom she has sent forth. This college has recently been almost entirely freed from a burdensome debt, chiefly by the energetic agency of the Rev. I. B. Aylesworth, M. D., ably assisted by the zealous co-operation of the Rev. Charles Fish; and to these brethren, and to your prompt and hearty liberality, the institution is deeply indebted for its improving prospects. The Wesleyan Female College, at Hamilton, has during the past year nearly doubled the number of its resident students, and has begun to give indications of the success which we have always felt assured must result, from an enterprise designed to supply a great and widely felt want in the educational provision of Canada. We recommend it to you, without any misgiving, as offering unsurpassed facilities

for the education of your daughters, and such an education as will not only fit them for this life, but help them to prepare for the life to come. We take this occasion to remark, that it was a vital principle with our venerable founder, and is becoming increasingly so with the Methodist connexions of England, Ireland, and the United States, as it is also with the Wesleyau Methodist Church of Canada, that academic and collegiate institutions ought always to be accompanied by religious and moral influences and be made subservient to religious and moral aims. It has become the settled conviction of Methodists throughout the world, that these institutions ought to be under the influence and control of Christian communities, which shall be responsible for the tone and character of their teaching and discipline. This is our principle, and woe to us if we ever abandon it! Not only the future Christian character of your sons and daughters, but the future Christhanity of your country itself, is, in a very important degree, dependent upon the institutions that are to form the minds of the coming age.

The extensive ravages of pestilence, in different nations in Europe and Acia, has produced a general expectation that the present season would witness its ravages in America, with its usual fatality in the destruction of many thousands of lives. Hitherto we have been mercifully spared, for which we are bound to offer devout thankegiving to Almighty God. Let us carnestly implore him still to spare the people; and let us by carnest humiliation, and by a full trust in His condescending care, place ourselves entirely in His merciful hands. Above all, let us, by seeking His pardoning mercy, and by living daily in the light of His countenance, secure an annial tering confidence for the hour of trial, should the threatened visitation come; and let us more zealeusly seek to lead others to the only refuge from danger, and the only antidote to the fear of death.

The British Provinces have lately been threatened with an invasion of a strange and unparalleled description. A conspiracy of wicked and most unreasonable men, for the accomplishment of a wild political enterprise, which had no rational relation to Canada, has made extensive preparations to invade and spoil our fine Province. But the courage and patriotism of the people of Canada has been more than equal to the emergency. The annoyance and expense thus caused have been considerable; but it is exceedingly gratifying that we have had such a manifestation of the sentiments and character of the people of this province, of their British feeling, their Christian patriotism, and their manly energy and courage. In the prompt resistance and speedy suppression of this infamous enterprise, which might have become formidable, Divine Providence has evidently favoured us, and encouraged us still to trust in His care and protection. We are confident that the members and adherents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church will never be found wanting in zeal, whenever their country and their Bible need their services; in the present instance some of them have been distinguished in the defence of our frontier, and one of them was the first to give his life in the public cause. Doubtless the chief object of the invaders was to create some cause of difficulty between the two nations : but it is to be hoped that all Christian people in both nations will avoid all cause of mutual irritation, and make all reasonable allowance for each other, and that they will unite, under a strong sense of duty, in endeavoring to restore and perfect a good understanding between the two great nations to whom God has chiefly entrusted the peace, progress and evangelization of the world.

We return to you, beloved brethren, not doubting that you will join with us in a renewed conseeration to the work of God; and we know that God will do great things for us, if we are faithful to our vows. Let us trust that the Lord will speedily arise and have mercy upon Zion; and that the time to favour her, yea, the set time, has now fully come.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Hely Ghost, he with you all. Amen.

We have received with much interest and satisfaction your affectionate address. We have no greater joy in our annual assemblings than to feel that the "God of love and peace" is still with us, preserving a brotherly union, not only among ourselves, but between us and our affiliated Conferences. Yet our song of praise is mingled with the sigh of sorrow and the murmur of confession, and the longing of prayer. It moreover recalls to our minds a thousand interesting recollections,—and, leading to a review of the departed year, it reminds us that we are all one year nearer the termination of our conflicts and the consummation of our hopes; and thus rouses us to prepare for our final account. 


