S. C. T. O'Hara Is Deputy Minister

The head of the consular service of Canada is Francis Charles Trench O'Hara. That is not what he is us-

word these representatives of Canadin foreign lands do not stand on the same footing as the consuls of Grea Britain or of any other independen state. But in a very large sense tha state. But in a very large sense that is what they really are. There are some twenty-six of these officers, and they represent the merchants and farmers and manufacturers of canada in widely sundered parts of the earth. They are officers of the Department of Trade and Commerce; and the Deputy Minister of that Department is Mr. O'Hara.

Though the most outstanding, this headship of the consular service is after all only one of the functions of Mr. O'Hara. He also controls the branch of the Government service which numbered the people. Under the Liberal regime the census was made by the Department of Agriculture; but when Hon. George E. Foster came in, he relieved the Hon. Martin Burrell of this part of his work. There was a good deal of justification for so doing, too, because _riculture was a heavy department and trade and commerce a rather light one. At the same time it is to be remembered that Mr. Foster also lightened his labors by transferring the Government Annuities to the Postoffice. That, however, is just by the way. What concerns us here is that Mr. O'Hara is now responsible for the smooth working of the tabulation of the people. He also supervises the payment of all bounties and steamship subsidies; administers the Grain Act, which is the backbone of western life; and as a side-line runs a general statistical bureau which keeps "tab" on the progress of Canada in trade and commerce, currency and banking, insurance and loan companies, railand commerce, currency and banking, insurance and loan companies, rail-

ways and shipping.

It was the Western Onterio peni sula which gave F. C. T. O'Hara t Canada. He is the second son of Robert O'Hara, who was Master in Chancery at Chatham. His grand-father was a distinguished officer in the British army. Military training and legal knowledge are not bad inheritances to have in one's loof.
"F. C. T."—he is usually referred to
by his initials—came into this inhertance at Chatham on Nov. 7, 1870.
His experience of life, in which he
learned how to deal with men, was

varied.

We hear of the strain of driving a tram or locomotive, yet no engine-driver has such a frightful strain on his mind as the man at the winding-levers of a coal-pit.

The engine-winder passes his life out of the lime-light, and is seldom thought about, although each day the life of every man who goes down the pit, or comes up, is in his hands. He does not see the men, nor do they see him, but if he turns round even for a few seconds, many lives may be lost. From the engine-house pass two great steel cables to the big wheels, or pulleys, erected over the pit-shaft. They come from an enormous drum. As this revolves, a cage descends Queensport, Guysbore, and Country Harbor and Boylston, fortnightly.

Freight will not be received after noon on Wednesday. As this revolves, a cage descends while another is drawn to the sur-face. While one rope is winding on at the bottom of the drum, the other is winding off at the top, so that when one cage is on the landing-stage at the top of the pit, the other is at the stage at the bottom.

The engine-winder, or "puller," us-

man must pay attention to his work. Opposite each hand is a level, similar to those in rallway signal-boxes. The object of one is to admit steam to the engines, and so start the winding; the other reverses the motion. He has a brake-lever at his foot.

Facing the man is a huge dial, standing on a massive pedestal, commonly known as the "clock-face." The large white figures on this black dial start from zero at the top, increasing until they reach the "6 o'clock" position, and then decreasing until they reach sero again. The "clock-face" bears a single hand, which points to the figures showing the position of the cage in the shaft.

As the ponderous engine z turn the enormous drum, the man keeps his whole attention fixed on the clock-face. When the hand shows that the journey is nearly over, the "puller" slowly puts on the brake. Then comes a warning bell to denote hat the cage is nearly at the top.
