CTTAWA, Jan. 22—The trade of Canada for the month of December shows an increase of \$5,007,333 in domestic exports and a decrease of \$1,000,000 in imports. The betterment in exports exceeds the continued falling mestic exports and a decrease of \$1,5,417,36, in imports. The betterment in comparation of the comparative statement is on the whole the most satisfactory one issued since the general depression in the country's business which came in the fall of 1307. The total exports for last month were \$25,509.700 and the total imports \$22,130,672, leaving a balance of trade in favor of the Dominison of \$3,37,265.

Exports of domestic products have totalled \$194,583,189, an increase of \$669,543. Last year during the nine months Canada exported coin and bullion to the amount of \$13,114,345, this year the amount was only \$1,325,590. Volumes one and three of the auditor general's report for the last fiscal year are the first of the sessional blue books presented to the Commons this session. The remaining volume will be tabled shortly and Parliament will then have for scrutiny, details of the expenditure in every department of public service. Two big volumes brought down today give the correspondence of the auditor general with departmental deputy heads in respect to any tens which might suggest irregularities in some of the payments made. Explanations made were in every case in the departments concerned were accepted as satisfactory by the auditor general. There were no over rulings of his decisions by the reasury board during the year. The volume still to come will deal with expenditures in marines, militia, post office and interior departments.

The public accounts blue book giving receipts and expenditures for the last fiscal year was tabled in the commons yesterday. Statistics contained in it were for the most part published last July. Total receipts on consolidated fund account for the year were \$96,044,054, the largest in the history of the Dominion. The expenditures charged to capital account totalled \$30,429,93, of which \$18,540,253 went toward construction of the Yational Transcontinental Railway and \$3,439,734 to the Intercolonial. Railway subsidies took \$2,037,629; public works, \$2,969,049 and bounties, \$2,787,784, of which \$2,930,312 were for iron and steel bounties. The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year was \$277,960,859, an increase of \$14,288,899, as compared with March 1907

WEATHER CHANGES GAUSE

Floods Result in Washouts on Railways,

Delaying Transportation-Much

TROUBLE IN THE WEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—As a result of thaws and heavy rains which have been general in Washington and Oregon during the last week, the Northern Pacifis, Great Northern and the Northbank railroads are in considerable trouble, the last mentioned losing a bridge near the Cascades of the Columbia and is practically tied up. ### A. O. SKINNER BACK

Got Assurance That Exhibition Will Not Grant in 1910.

DIG EVENTS

A. O. Skinner returned today from Ottawa where he has been for the past few days in the interests of the Exhibition Association. The chief reason for the trip was to ascentain whether the erection of the new armory and the other changes on the Barrack green would make it necessary for the association to find new quarters. He was reassured on this by the Minister of Militia, and given to understand that the exhibition buildings will not be interfered with.

The proposed changes will include the expropriation of the south side of

The proposed changes will include the expropriation of the south side of Sheffield street between Sydney and

Sheffield street between Sydney and Wentworth streets, and the extension of the parade grounds to the face of the street. This will give ample room for the new armory without interfering with the exhibition buildings. While in Ottawa Mr. Skinner learned that the order for the expropriation of this section has already been forwarded from the Public Works Department to the Department of Militia.

Mir. Skinner also took up the question of when the Dominion exhibition grant of \$50,000 was to come to New Brunswick. The reason for cancelling the grant this year was the fact that owing to the decreased revenue economy is being practiced in all directions, and it was felt that as St. John was already on the list for half a million dollars for harbor expenditure, etc., the citizens

on the list for half a million dollars for harbor expenditure, etc., the citizens could hardly complain at not getting the grant as well.

The fact that the New Brunswick representatives have not yet been able to decide among themselves to which town the grant should be given also made the government more willing to defer the matter. The proposal was made that Saskatchewan should get the grant in 1910 and that it should come to New Brunswick in 1911. Mr. Skinner got a promise from the Minister of Public Works that he would use bis influence to have this arrangement reversed. It was felt that this might be done as the western Province might be willing to have the extra time for preparation.

Mr. Skinner said that the association would aftempt to get the regular grant from the Provincial government this year and if this was secured an exhibition would be held.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Strictures

sels were made in the house of representatives today during the consideration of the naval appropriation bill, with the result that an amendment was adopted requiring the secretary of the navy annually to report to congress the instances when more than \$200,000 is expended for repairs.

After futile effonts to obtain legislation looking to the restoration of marines aboard ships, an amendment was agreed to, prohibiting the purchase of powder "manufactured and sold in violation of" the Sherman anti-trust law. The debate disclosed that the amendment was directed at the Dupont Company. Amendments appropriating \$250,000 to double the government's output of powder, and fixing the price for powder, other than for small arms, at 64 cents per pound were adopted.
