NOTHING TO PRELUCE PEACE OF BRITAIN

Premier Asquith Declares Cordial Relations Exist With All Countries

Policy of Cultivating Friendships and Settling Difficulties Amicably Has Borne Good Fruit—Maintenance of Naval Supremacy is an Insurance Against War—Hopes to Arrive at Satisfactory Agreement With Premier Borden at Next Week's Conference.

(Through Reuters' Ottawa Agency.) London, July 25—Speaking in the House of Commons today on the estimate for the committee on imperial defence, The Right Hon. Mr. Asquith, prime minister, made an important statement...

Dealing with the work of the committee, he said, there were four permanent sub-committees which were practically in constant session. The first was the home port defence committee. It had sent out not less than twenty-five reports to the main committee...

Other temporary sub-committees were constantly sitting to deal with various matters, amongst them the maintenance of transportation, overseas transport and wireless telegraphy throughout the empire. Mr. Asquith affirmed that this committee had no influence on policy and although it did not determine policy it was necessary to be governed by reference to our international relations.

SIXTY LIVES LOST IN TERRIFIC FLOODS

Many Towns Inundated in Ohio and Pennsylvania

Hundreds Are Homeless—Great Destruction of Buildings and Railway Property—Communication Cut Off With Many Sections of the Devastated Area.

Pittsburg, July 25—Over sixty lives were claimed Wednesday by floods and cloud bursts in southwest Pennsylvania and West Virginia and hundreds of homes and business houses destroyed. Uniontown (Pa.) leads the list of known dead with fifteen. At Wheeling (W. Va.), three were drowned; at Lemont (Pa.) four drowned; at Ellerswood (Pa.), three drowned and thirty-six lives are reported to have been lost in other towns of the two states. Uniontown, Lemont, Mount Braddock, Conneville and Dunbar (Pa.) were inundated.

TWO KILLED AND TWO FATALLY HURT IN QUEBEC CAVE-IN

Quebec, July 25—As a result of a cave-in which occurred yesterday afternoon while a number of men were digging the banks of the canal at Kenogami (Que.), two men were killed and five Italians and two others were injured, two mortally. Five other men who were caught in the slip escaped without injury. Three more are reported to be still underground the soil which fell. One hundred men are now working to clear the channel, and remove the other victims.

CANADIAN MINISTERS TO BE FETED IN PARIS

Premier Borden and Colleagues Due There Saturday—Postmaster General to Discuss Cheaper Postage and Cable Rates—Hon. Mr. Hazen Has a Mission, Too.

Paris, July 25—The Canadian postmaster general, Hon. Louis Philip Pelletier, arrived here this evening. He was met by a representative of Premier Poincaré, the Canadian commissioner to France, Phillip Ray and the secretary of the Franco-American committee, Gabriel Louis Jarry.

The principal object of Mr. Pelletier's visit is to arrange, if possible, with M. Chaumet, under secretary of posts and telegraphs, for a reduction in cable rates and for the introduction of a two-cent postage between Canada and France.

The postmaster will be joined Saturday by Hon. C. J. Doherty, the minister of marine and fisheries, Hon. J. Douglas Hazen, and Hon. A. E. Kempf, minister without portfolio. Mr. Hazen will confer with M. Deleasse, the French minister of marine on the subject of reciprocal shipping regulations, notably with respect to an increased number of lifeboats on steamships plying between France and Canada and on the possibilities of improving trade between the two countries.

Great importance is attached to the visit to Paris of the Canadian ministers on account of the close race now between France and Canada and an impending programme of entertainments has been arranged in their honor. This includes a visit to Versailles and banquets by the British Chamber of Commerce and the Franco-American committee, the latter to be jointly presided over by Premier Poincaré and Gabriel Hanotaux, the president of the committee.

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# MURDER AS A FINE ART, OR HOW THEY "CROAKED" ROSENTHAL

(The New York American.)

I. Rosenthal, gambler and criminal, "squealed" He told how Police Lieutenant Becker, in charge of a police squad, became his partner, how he had shared his profits, how they finally quarrelled. Rosenthal had made trouble for Becker among other gamblers. Becker then tried to drive him out of New York. Lieutenant Becker kept a policeman within the doors of Rosenthal's dwelling, 24 hours a day, in eight-hour watches, for 30 consecutive days and nights. This was not execution of the law. It was lawless police oppression. Rosenthal was not ever under indictment.

II. On the 30th day of this oppression the newspapers. His charges were corroborated in part by public records. He said Lieutenant Becker loaned him \$1,500 and had taken 20 per cent of the gambling profits. Becker had assigned Jack Rose, he said, to deal in Rosenthal's house and to collect for Lieutenant Becker.

III. A chattel mortgage securing this \$1,500, loaned to Rosenthal, was drawn by Lawyer Robert H. Rosenthal's first wife. The money was taken to the lawyer's office by Rose, Becker's man. Lawyer Hibbard tells the grand jury he heard that Becker and not Rosenthal, owned the mortgage, but he did not know. Hibbard, the lawyer, had acted for Lieutenant Becker's wife and for Becker's brothers in other transactions.

IV. Rosenthal's charges led Commissioner Waldo to telegraph to District Attorney Whitman at Newport, asking him to investigate them. Mr. Whitman returns by the next train to New York and hears Rosenthal's story. Rosenthal promises to produce the next day six other gamblers to corroborate his charges. Even while Whitman is listening to Rosenthal's story the police are busy collecting evidence to drive Rosenthal out of town. The chief police agent in getting this evidence is Lieutenant Becker's friend, Jack Rose.

V. Two innocent bystanders had, however, caught the number of the assassins' auto. One of them went to the 47th street station, reported the number and was locked up for his trouble, and the number was put down erroneously on the police blot by the officer in charge. VI. But Rosenthal, though a gambler and a criminal, seems not to have been a bad man. He was not in the habit of District Attorney Whitman all he knew about the police the next morning and would produce six witnesses to corroborate him.

VII. What does Lieut. Becker's friend Rose do? He acts promptly. He engages a woman, No. 4124, owned by Libby & Shapiro, two confidants of gamblers. It.

VIII. Rosenthal has been called to the Metropolitan. He sits in the cell at 1230 a. m. waiting. He smokes, but does not drink. He sits waiting. Finally some one who knows him well enters and says: "Hello, Herman, some one at the door wants to speak to you." As he crosses the threshold in the glowing white light of Broadway—the street that knows no night—four men surround him and he is shot dead. Automobile 4123, with both side doors left open by the assassins, starts half a block away. The assassins return to it and speed away. Not even the number of the car is taken by policemen, five of whom were there within fifteen seconds. District Attorney Whitman says after investigation: "Not even a serious effort to pursue the murderers was made."

IX. But Dr. Weber, whose house, three blocks away, Rose had entered barely an hour earlier, is near the Metropolitan, and is one of the first to "hear" of the assassination, and he dips around the corner—possibly back to his own home—to report to Rose what the assassins did, and how they did it.

X. Two innocent bystanders had, however, caught the number of the assassins' auto. The arrest of the chauffeur and owner of the car then speedily followed.

XII.
