QUESTION.—What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

WILLIAM H. FIFE.

The subject of this obituary was born in the State of Michigan, on the 2nd of February, 1849. When he was three weeks old his mother died with consumption.

When he was about one year old the family came to Canada and settled at Thornton, county of Simcee, Ontario. Here he was brought up. He received a liberal education and became a public school teacher, which profession he followed for a short time. From a child he was kind and affectionate. She, who became his mother, says, "When I look over his life I cannot think of anything but kindness."

He was converted to God, at the age of sixteen, in a protracted meeting held in the village of Thornton, by Rev. Matthew Swann and colleague, pastors of what was known as the Cookstown Circuit. Even before his conversion no one could have pointed out a flaw in his outward life; and after his conversion he developed into something like a model Christian character. Throughout his Christian life, it might be said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed in whom is no guile."

Soon after his conversion he felt he was called of God to preach the Gospel. There was at this time a serious defect in his speech. He stammered terribly. When he mentioned to his father that he believed he was called to preach, his father regarded this impediment as standing in the way, and intimated this to him. To which he replied, "If God has called me to preach, He will remove this impediment." It is said the stammering ceased at once. He went out to preach in 1869, under the Chairman of the District. One of the superintendents he had, during the four years of his probation, speaks of him thus: "No better colleague could a man have than he—true to his superintendent, true to his work, faithful in all the relations of life, going in and out among the people as without fault before God and man. If ever there was a pure life, his was one." He was received into full connexion with the Conference and ordained in 1873. He travelled the following Circuits: Rosemont, Bondhead, Drayton, Blenheim, Kingsville, Sandwich, Cayuga, Fenwick, Courtwright, Fairfield and Crediton.

During the year 1873, he was married to Miss Cecilia Wigle, of Kingsville, who was to him a true helpmeet in the work of the ministry. She and her two sons now mourn the loss of an affectionate husband, a kind and considerate parent Physically Bro. Fife was not strong. Consumption had marked him for its prey. For years he manfully battled against weakness and disease, doing efficiently the arduous work of a Methodist minister. Finally, on the Crediton Circuit, under a severe cold his health gave way, and he was compelled to supply his work during the remainder of the year. At the ensuing District Meeting he was forced to seek a superannuated relation, which he did with great reluctancy, being moved to tears as he spoke of retiring even for one year from a work that he loved so much. He always hoped to return to the active work; but this was not realized. Sixteen months wore away, and he was taken to his reward

He had an intense love for the work of the ministry. His sentiment was: "I would rather preach the Gospel on the poorest mission than have the most lucrative position among the business men of the world." At last death came somewhat suddenly, but the servant was ready. Just before he died, realizing that his speech was failing him, and that he was soon to depart, he said to his devoted wife: "Turn to 2 Cor. v. 1 'For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens;" and to Psalm xxiii. 4 'Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me; Thy rod and Thy staff, they comfort me;" also, to the last clause of the 6th verse, 'And I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever." And he said: "Tell the brethren this is my experience." Thus, on the 22nd of October, 1890, he passed through the valley, borne by the Saviour to the house above.

The funeral took place from his late residence in London West, first to the church where a service was conducted by Rev. Wm. McDonagh, assisted by Revs. J. E. Ford, G. W. Andrews, B. Clement, D. M. Kennedy and Walter Rigsby, the Secretary of Conference; thence to Mount Pleasant cemetery, where the body was interred, the burial service being read by Rev. Geo. Boyd, of Queen's Avenue Church, London. Six of his ministerial brethren bore his mortal remains to the tomb, while a number of others attended the funeral, which evinced the fact that he was a brother beloved. A memorial service was held afterwards in the church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Wm. McDonagh, Chairman of London District. May the blessing of God richly rest on the widow and children, and bring them at last to form an unbroken family in heaven.

REPORTS OF FUNDS AND COMMITTEES.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The General Treasurer's Annual Report and Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1890, as passed by the Board.

The estimates for the year just closed were made on the most economical scale, and were barely sufficient to meet the current expenses of the year. The various Circuits in the Connexion raised \$49,461.92, or \$1,254.48 more than last year; and the ministerial subscriptions were also a little in advance. There were, however, small deficiencies in the amounts expected from both these sources of income.

There was a falling off in the Interest Account, arising from our inability to get several comparatively large sums of interest which, though due and considered perfectly reliable, we could not realize before the close of the year; and also, because in one of our large investments a reduction of one per cent. had to be made.

I am happy to say that the Book Room has increased the annual grant to the Fund up to \$6,300, an advance of \$300.

Notwithstanding the increased expenditure incurred by the removal to our new premises, the expenses of the Fund have been reduced some \$68.

The additional amount required to pay claimants was \$2,398.69, and all have been paid in full and all expenses met; but the circumstances above referred to have left the Annual Account deficient \$1,010.56. Of this amount, however, more than \$800 are in the hands of reliable parties, who are expected to pay up in a very short time.

After writing off the amounts recommended by the Board, and without embracing the munificent legacy of William Gooderham, Esq., not yet received, the investments of the Fund now amount to \$176,503.76.

In accordance with the instructions of the Board, a competent committee of laymen have examined all the securities held on behalf of the Fund, and reported to the Board that they found the securities in a very satisfactory condition.

THE CONFERENCE TREASURER'S REPORT.

In presenting our first annual report, we are happy to say that the ministerial subscriptions are all paid in full. The following Districts have paid their assessments in full, viz.—London, Chatham, Windsor, Ridgetown and Strathroy. There is a small deficiency reported by the St. Thomas District. It is so small that we wonder that it was reported at all. There is a considerable deficiency reported by the Aylmer District, and larger ones by the Exeter and Sarnia Districts.

We find that some of the Financial Secretaries have retained all moneys till the meeting of the Conference, not forwarding amounts paid by Circuits, or the ministerial subscriptions paid at the Financial District Meetings. This is contrary to the 395th paragraph of the Discipline. It is an injury to the Fund, and we trust that it will not be repeated.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL REPORT.

In presenting our report on this very important department of our work, it is pleasing to note the signs of progress on almost all the points of inquiry covered by the schedules. There is an increase of 8,946 scholars in the schools, and a large proportion of the literature taken by the schools are our own publications. The new paper, called *Onward*, has had a good beginning, and will no doubt serve a most important end among our young people.

The decrease in the amount raised for missions, we hope, is only apparent, probably arising from an error in the heading of the column in the Circuit schedules. Only a very small proportion of the schools have meetings of teachers for study of the lesson. This creates necessity for the minister giving greater attention to maintain a proper condition of zeal among the teachers. There is still need of calling attention to the study of our catechisms. In many schools this work appears to be totally neglected. Improvement in this respect can best be reached by instructing the teachers as to the importance of this work, until they are in full sympathy with it.

It is also apparent that many schools have not attempted anything in the matter of signing the total abstinence pledge. We must strongly urge that this and all other proper methods be employed to train our young people in the principles and practice of abstinence from all strong drinks and tobacco.

As this is the most successful of all lines of our Church work, we would urge that more persistent efforts be made to secure the best talent of the Church in our Sunday-schools, and that constantly the aim shall be to lead all thus put under our care to a personal enjoyment of salvation.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF

In presenting the report of work done since the last General Conference, the Treasurer begs to say that the Committee appointed met soon after the rising of the General Conference, and after careful consideration of each case, decided to carry out the recommendations of the General Conference, and made the appropriations accordingly.

Many members of the Committee expressed great regret that no effort was to be made to raise any sum to reduce the obligations of the Fund, through the meetings to be held in March to celebrate the one-hundredth year of Methodism in Canada.

Your Treasurer also regrets to report that remittances have come in unusually slow, not so much from lack of loyalty to the Fund, as from neglect to take up and forward the collections on time. This necessitates the borrowing of money at high rates, in order to keep faith with claimants.

It is of the greatest importance that the ministers look after the interests of this Fund, promptly take up the collections as required by the Discipline, in October, and forward at once to the Treasurer. There are not probably one hundred Circuits in the whole Dominion where this cannot be done.

The amount paid in to the Treasurer and to the Rev. James Gray (who has acted in his absence) was \$604.54 to the 15th May, 1891.

The foregoing is respectfully and loyally submitted, with the hope that the future may be brighter, and the collections larger.

10. That permission be granted the trustees of the Petrolea parsonage to sell the old parsonage property, proceeds to be applied to the purchase of a new parsonage.

COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

It is with profound gratitude to God that your Committee report progress in almost every department of our Church work.

An increase in our membership, Connexional Funds and Sabbath-school attendance makes the difference between the report of this year and that of the last, while the Epworth League promises to be rich in blessing, serving and conserving the best interests of our young people.

Recognizing that the prosperity of our Church in the future depends, more than ever in the past, on the proper teaching and training of the children connected with our congregations, your Committee would suggest the advisability of preaching special sermons to the children, or, at least, devoting one section of the regular discourse to their special benefit.

We wish further to emphasize the opinion expressed by the last annual Conference, viz., the importance of the fact that every Methodist minister is expected to be, not only a preacher and pastor, but also an evangelist; and would urge the people of our Church to regard them as such, and consequently rally around them in revival efforts with all the enthusiasm usually given to the special evangelists. This is especially necessary in the rural sections of our work, where so few evangelists can be secured to labor.

Encouraged by the achievements of the past and hopeful as to the future, we rejoice that the words of the one hundred years ago are still-appropriate, "The best of all is, 'God is with us.'"

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Recognizing our obligation to obey God's law, and the close connection between the proper observance of the Sabbath and the moral growth, both of the individual and the community, we urge our people to labor to the full extent of their ability to preserve the sanctity of the Sabbath as a day of rest to man and beast.

While we would not make it a day of sadness, we nevertheless think its hours should not be devoted to pleasure seeking, social visiting and conversation on worldly topics.

As the sanctity of the Sabbath is openly disregarded, in spite of the protests of the Churches, by some of our railways, thus depriving many of their employees of their divinely appointed day of rest, we recommend this Conference to memorialize both the Provincial and the Dominion Legislatures to enact more stringent laws for its protection.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE Re SUSTENTATION FUND.

Your Committee on Sustentation Fund, having observed that, for the years 1889 and 1890, sixty-seven, or more than half the married ministers stationed within the bounds of the London Conference, received salaries of \$600 and less, forty-seven of them receiving \$550 and less, and thirty-two of these receiving \$500 and under—knowing this to be a fair representation of the case, as it occurs from year to year—would recommend:—

(1) That a Sustentation Fund be immediately created.

(2) That collections and subscriptions be taken annually in behalf of this Fund on all our Circuits and appointments, in the place of the March Contingent Fund collection, which shall be discontinued.

Contingent Fund collection, which shall be discontinued.

(3) That the Financial District Meetings shall arrange for the appointment of deputations, so as to present the claims of this Fund most

effectively to the people on our Circuits.

(4) That wherever the Financial District Meetings deem it in the interest of the Fund, a deputation be appointed to endeavor to get the subscriptions to ministerial support placed upon a more liberal and permanent basis on these weaker Circuits.

(5) That a Standing Committee be appointed by the Conference, on the nomination of the Nominating Committee, to distribute the Fund for

the present year according to the necessities of the Circuit.

(6) And that this Standing Committee recommend to the next Annual Conference a basis of distribution of the Fund, together with any modifications of this scheme that, with their extended knowledge and experience on this subject, they may deem wise, toward placing the Fund upon a more satisfactory and permanent basis.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee hail with delight the intelligence that the movement to petition the Parliament of Canada in behalf of Prohibition has been so successful, it being reported that more than nine hundred thousand persons have signed the petitions which have already been presented to the Parliament.

1. Your Committee beg to submit to this Conference for its adoption the following resolutions: Whereas the various denominations of the Church of Christ in our land are engaged in a united effort petitioning Parliament for the passage of a prohibitory law, therefore be it

Resolved,—That this London Conference of the Methodist Church assembled and in session at Windsor, composed equally of laymen and ministers, and representing one hundred thousand members and adherents in the counties of Essex, Kent, Elgin, Lambton and Middlesex, would respectfully urge the members of Parliament representing the ridings in the above-named counties, that they give their faithful and hearty support, both by speech and vote, to the prohibition resolution introduced in the House this session by Mr. Jamieson; and we direct that a copy of this resolution be sent to each of them and one to the Temperance Committee in Parliament.

2. Your Committee urge the ministers of our Church to keep the Temperance and Prohibition movement constantly before our people, and that the officiary of our Sunday schools be requested to teach regularly the quarterly temperance lesson, and that the children's pledge, as found in the Discipline, be introduced, and the children urged to sign it.

Your Committee further recommend the Conference to advise the holding of Temperance Conventions in each District at such time as may be deemed most convenient by the Chairman of the District; and we urge our people and ministers to observe the disciplinary regulation page 17, paragraph 40; "In the public administration of the Lord's Supper, non-alcoholic wines shall be used wherever possible."

3. Your Committee request the ministers of our Church to hold Gospel Temperance Meetings in their several charges, seeking the reformation of the drunkard and the persuasion of the moderate drinker to total abstinence; and to follow these meetings up by all possible effort to secure a reduction of the licensed places in their localities, either through the Municipal Councils or the License Commissioners.

4. We recommend that this Conference contribute the sum of \$50, as its share of the expenses incurred in printing, furnishing and circulating the forms of the petition, the total of which amounted to over \$500; and that this amount be raised by an assessment of at least fifty cents for each Circuit, and that the surplus, if any, be placed to the credit of the General Temperance Fund; and that the Rev. Geo. Boyd be the Treasurer of the same, to whom all contributions may be sent.

5. In conclusion, we recommend that a Standing Committee on Temperance be appointed, composed of Revs. W. H. Shaw, William Godwin, and W. H. Cooper, also the following laymen: J. W. Smith and E. R. Scratch, who shall report to the Temperance Committee of 1892.

Twenty-nine persons wrote on the Conference Preliminary Examination held at the College in April last, a majority of whom will remain at the College to prepare for Matriculation. These candidates represent almost every Conference in the Methodist Church, from Montreal in the east to British Columbia in the west.

The College still continues to have more than ordinary success in the Departmental Examinations for Teachers' Certificates. Six candidates wrote at the Junior Leaving Examination in July last, and of this number, five were successful.

The College has a well equipped Laboratory and a splendid Museum, and is in every way able to compete successfully with the very best High Schools and Collegiate Institutes.

The Commercial Department was never more prosperous than it is at present. That the work is thorough and practical in its character, may be seen from the fact that many of the graduates of this department are filling responsible and lucrative positions as accountants. It is hoped that the Methodist people will see the advisability of sending their children where they can secure a thorough and practical business education,

and at the same time be surrounded with moral and religious safeguards.

The College affords facilities for thorough instruction in Elocution at a very moderate cost. This department has been for several years in charge of Prof. Shephard, of the Frobisher School of Oratory, New York.

It is a source of great satisfaction to the Professor that the prize in Elocution, awarded by the Literary Society of Victoria, has been won for three successive years by ex-pupils of Albert.

The departments of Music and Fine Arts are thoroughly efficient, and have shared in the increase in attendance. The number of lady boarders is considerably in advance of last year, in fact, every room in the College has been occupied. This is owing in some degree to the presence of a Lady Principal of rare culture and of marked ability.

So far as attendance and the general success of the work are concerned, the past year leaves little to be desired. The great need is money. The canvass for subscriptions towards payment of the debt on the College has been prosecuted with some good degree of success. About half of the amount has been realized in subscriptions. The Board of Management would gratefully acknowledge the liberality shown by both ministers and laymen in their subscriptions towards payment of this debt. There is now an imperative need for enlarged accommodation. During this year fully thirty young men have been compelled to secure board in private homes, because of lack of room in the College building. It is feared that unless this want is met, the progress of the College will be retarded, and possibly its future success imperilled. However,

by the liberality of the people, this want will be supplied.

The College building was never so comfortable as at present. Many of the rooms have been refurnished, and the steam-heating apparatus makes it possible to keep them at a uniform temperature of 65° to 70° on

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

To the Members of the London Conference of the Methodist Church :-

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—Through the continued favor of a kind Providence we are permitted to report to you another year of success-

ful work in Alma College.

The enrolment of students for the year has reached 181, of whom 141 have been resident pupils, and the remaining forty, day students. These have been enrolled as to departments as follows:—Preparatory, 28; Academic, 33; Collegiate, 47. The Music School has enrolled for Piano Course, 120; for special Voice Training, 31; for Harmony, 25. The Fine Art school has had a total enrolment of 50 pupils; the School of Elocution, 31; and the Commercial School, 25.

The religious denominations were represented as follows:—Methodists, 94; Presbyterian, 38; Episcopal, 28; Baptist, 16; Evangelical, 2;

Disciples, 2; Roman Catholic, 1.

Thirty of the pupils came from the United States.

Alma College has lately been affiliated to Victoria University, and the revised Course of Study and requirements for graduation will hereafter be such that all graduates of Alma College in regular course will have University standing. The effect of which arrangement, we hope, will be that a good percentage of our graduates will enter Victoria University to complete the full Arts Course.

The Music School was never larger or more efficient, having a staff of six teachers and a total attendance of 130 students. The efficiency of this school is attested by the successful work of its graduates in other schools and colleges, and by the endorsation of its course of study and the methods of instruction by leading teachers in Europe and America.

In the Fine Art school, which is affiliated with the Education Department of Ontario, all our graduates are legally qualified teachers in the Collegiate Institutes, Mechanics' Institutes, and Art Schools of the Province.

Our students have received over 500 Departmental Certificates, including several medals and gold medal certificates during the past seven years. This year our pupils wrote upon 125 papers, the returns from which are not yet to hand. Prof. J. R. Seavey, gold medallist in Art, an artist of continental reputation who has enjoyed thorough training in the best European Art centres, has been added to our staff, and will give courses of instruction in a number of branches of Decorative Art.

The Elocution School is rapidly growing and the course of instruction, under an honor graduate of the Boston School of Oratory is thoroughly

practical.

In financial receipts, in scholastic work, and in religious interests, this

year will rank among the best in our history.

The Board of Management had in contemplation this year an appeal to the entire Church for a sufficient sum to wipe off the debt upon the old building and the balance due on McLachlan Hall, but on consultation with the General Superintendent and the Secretary of Education it was decided in the interests of the Federation movement, to defer the appeal for at least a year, so that no action of theirs might impede the work of securing the needed endowment for Victoria. This decision under the circumstances, will, we feel assured, meet the approval of the Conferences, and the Board of Management hopes to have the hearty Ocoperation of all the brethren when it becomes advisable and necessary to undertake the work.

We have to thank this Conference for the excellent appointments made in past years as Associate Members of the Board of Management, and to ask for a similar appointment for the next Conference year.

The representatives of our Board of Management, with your permission, will more fully explain the claims and work of the College to the Conference. All of which is most respectfully submitted.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

Report of Board of Directors to the Conference :-

Sirs,—The Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, take pleasure in presenting their Seventeenth Annual Report. The past year's record has in some respects superseded that of any preceding year in the history of the College. The number of boarders in attendance has been 109, with about thirty day pupils in Music and Fine Art. Day pupils are not admitted to the literary classes. We believe that a liberal education is none the less ornamental for being practical and of commercial utility, and, therefore, have based our Collegiate Course upon the work required for the teachers' certificates. Pupils entering our regular classes can prepare for third-class, second-class, or even first-class certificates. Up to the present year, we have had no pupils in attendance holding secondclass certificates that were desirous of taking a higher teacher's certificate. During this year we have formed a class of four such pupils that expect to be examined next month for a first-class non-professional certificate, the highest attainable in any Collegiate Institute. One of these candidates came to us direct from a Public School, never having attended a High School, and in our regular College classes has prepared to pass successfully the third-class, second-class, and we trust shortly the first-class examination. What one has done, others may readily do. Our present Collegiate Course embraces the entire curriculum of a Collegiate Institute, and in addition, the Sophomore year of the University, and some special studies in Philosophy, Elocution and Commercial branches. We expect to continue enlarging and extending our Literary work until it reaches as near as possible the standard of a full University course.

In the departments of Music, Fine Art, Elecution and Commercial branches, we have distinguished specialists who are prepared to give a thorough and an advanced education.

Our facilities for pleasant, healthful exercise in all weather are not equalled, so far as we are aware, in any similar College in this country. We are profoundly grateful for the success that has heretofore attended the College, for the honest and thorough work done in all departments, for the good health of the pupils, and for the religious spirit characterizing them as a whole.

During the year a flourishing Christian Endeavor Society has been added to the numerous list of College societies. We believe that the prime reason for our existence as a College is to provide a Christian home, of culture in which may be laid the foundations of a broad and liberal education, and it shall be our endeavor to fulfil our mission, and meet the reasonable expectations of our patrons.

We sincerely thank the members of the Conference for friendly cooperation and support.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE SOCIETIES UNDER ITS CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethern,—In previous pastoral addresses we find frequent brief references to a very important theme, to which we invite your sole attention at this time, viz., the theme of family religion. Instead of writing a long epistle, we prefer to indicate a few very

important truths for your reflection and practice.

First, what the home is, that, to a very important degree, the Church and State will become. Deut. vi. 4-9: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord: and thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up. And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes. And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates." It was with the plainest purpose that the law was ordered to be written on the posts of the house, and we are not beyond the need of that to day. Mr. Gladstone has said, "That the greatest and deepest of all human controversies is the marriage controversy." There is no doubt that poverty, vice, intemperance and crime on the one hand, and sobriety, purity, industry and piety on the other hand, as they are developed in society, have a very intimate relation to the home life of the community. The family presents to us, in its very nature, the original germ, and therefore determines the permanent issues of society. In all the social readjustments which are sought and demanded at the present time the family must be a prime factor.

Secondly, be careful of your example in the home. Ephesians vi. 4: "And ye, fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." The training of the home through careful and prayerful example must be a constant corrective to the education of the street, where a full supply of reckless and godless example will be before the rising generation. We would remind you that the street, especially in towns and cities, is a fruitful source of juvenile corruption. In two important particulars our Church especially requests that your example should be pure, viz., in abstention from tobacco and

strong drink. (Journal, pp. 334 and 343.)

Thirdly, maintain family government. 1 Tim. iii. 4, 5: "One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; (for if a man know not how to rule his house, how shall he take care of the Church of God?)" This will require much wisdom and

patience, firmness and affection. Remember in this connection that it is the office of the parent to train the child to independence. Ruskin reminds us that in a great and strong state the children try to remain children, and the parents try to lead them to independence; while in a corrupt and weak state the children are trying to be men and women, and the parents are striving to keep them children. In the one case there is harmony of control and obedience; in the other a war of precocity and authority. One of the greatest blessings you can confer upon your children is to train them to self-restraint and self-reliance, humbly remembering that authority of command cannot continue long, while

authority of wisdom and love last forever.

Fourthly, make the spiritual welfare of your children an object of unceasing care and prayer. Among the ministries that aid in this direction remember the family altar and Christian literature. In promoting this object, seek above all to win your children to Christ; that is, seek to have Christ so set before your children that He will join them to Himself as intelligent, decided and enthusiastic disciples. Mark x. 13-16: "And they brought young children to Him, that He should touch them: and His disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, He was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not : for of such is the kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. And He took them up in His arms, put His hands upon them and blessed them." Then lead them to take up the unfinished work of the Church, and to consecrate to its extension, consolidation and evangelical power, their resources of wealth, influence and talent in sanctified personal services.


