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The *Winnipeg* special from Fort Pitt says:—General Middleton, who arrived here on the 10th inst., reports that the Indians are gathering at Poundmaker's reserve as usual. 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**GORDON'S TERRIBLE HISTORY.**

Boston, June 24.—The journals of Gen. Gordon at Khartoum, extracts from which follow, contain a sketched portrait of Gen. Gordon, two maps and thirty illustrations, reproduced in fac-simile from sketches by Gen. Gordon himself.

"I do not regret the question of abandoning garrisons or not. What I judge is the indecision of the government. They do not say 'abandon garrison.' So they prevented me leaving for the equator, with a determination not to relieve me that I will not say what that hope was."

"A heavy lumbering column, however strong, is now here. In this land parties of forty or fifty men, swiftly moving about, would do more than any column. Native allies above all things at whatever cost. It is the country of the irregular not of the regular."

"I altogether decline the imputation that the projected expedition has come to relieve me. It has come to save our national honor in extricating the garrisons, etc., from a position our action in Egypt has placed these garrisons in."

"As for myself, I could make good my retreat at any moment if I wished."

"Now, realize what would happen if this first relief expedition was to bolt and our steamers fall into the hands of the mahdi. This second relief expedition (for the honor of England engaged in extricating garrisons) would be somewhat hampered. We the first, and second expeditions are equally engaged for the honor of England."

"I am not the rescued lamb and I will not be so."

"As for her majesty's government keeping the Sudan, it is out of question."

"As for 'evacuation,' that is one thing, 'rattling out' that is another."

"I am quiet of advice as to No. 1 (as we have not the decision to keep the country) but I will be no party to No. 2. [This 'but business' is, because it is dishonorable, but, because it is not possible, which will have more weight.] Therefore if it is going to be No. 2, the troops had better not come beyond Berber till the question of what will be done is settled."

"I send down to-morrow a telegram to Cairo, which will settle business as far as I am concerned."

"If you remove me from being governor-general then all responsibility is off me. But if you keep me as governor-general, you are responsible for my commission in her majesty's service."

"I refuse out of this country. My idea is to induce her majesty's government to undertake the evacuation of all people or garrisons, now hemmed in or captive, and that if this is not their programme, then to resign my commission and do what I can to obtain my freedom."

"When one thinks of the enormous loss of life which has taken place in the Sudan since 1880 and the general aspect of all governments, it is not surprising that the British government, Sir Edward Mallet and Sir Charles Dilke; for it is on account of these three men, whose advice was taken, that her majesty's government, that all these shores are due. They went in for the bond holders."

"We are an honest nation, but our diplomats are cowards and not officials honest."

"I declare solemnly, that if it were not for the honor's sake of our nation, I would let these people die. They are of the very feeblest nature, and the Arabs are ten times better."

"There is nothing like a civil war to show what stinks men are. One of my greatest workers are the Shaggi-ah, who are continually feuding towards me or towards the Mahdi. I expect both sides despite their quality."

"We are wonderful people. It is never our government which made us a great nation. Our government has been ever a ding on our wheels."

"It is of course, on the one hand, that Kartoum is taken under the nose of the expeditionary force, which will be just too late. The expeditionary force will perhaps then be necessary to re-take it, but that will be of no use and will cause loss of life uselessly on both sides."

"I had far better quietly return with my tail between my ears."

"England was made by its adventurers, not by its government, and I believe it will only hold its place by adventures."

"I must say that I feel a great compliment when my counselors say to me, 'Do what you think right irrespective of our advice, when they know I am ignorant of the language except in my style, ignorant of Arab customs, etc., etc.' You will do better than we do, if you say—'I am a poor devil, do not know where to turn.'"

"On our government? What has it not answered for? Not to me but to these poor people."

"I declare if I thought the town which the Mahdi would give up, so much do I respect free will."

"I must say I hate our diplomatists—I dwell on the joy of never seeing Great Britain again, with its horrid wearisome dinner parties and miseries."

"I am afraid to say what numbers have been killed through this present policy. Certainly some 20,000, and it is not yet over. For my part I hope they will all run away."

"We have in a most effectual way restored the slave trade and 'rattling out' For Her Majesty's government cannot keep the Sudan and never will Egypt be able to hold it."

"The only thing to be done is to give it to the Sultan. What an end to the diplomacy of her Majesty's government—And it was so easy when I left in January, 1880, to have settled it quickly, give up Kordofan, Darta and Bahir, Gazelle and the Equator with decency and quiet. I declare I do not see how we are kept out of it (the Sudan) even now."
