INJUNCTION IS HUGE BLUFF

Liquor Dealers Looking For Loop-hole To Prevent Votes of People.

KEEP ON WORKING

In order that the public may understand the latest development in regard to the local option campaign, a few words of explanation might be given.

At the Council meeting on Tuesday evening Mayor Murray announced that Supreme Court writs had been served upon him calling upon the Town to show cause why the whole proceedings leading up to the vote on local option should not be quashed. The matter has been set down for hearing before the full bench at Fredericton on Tuesday next.

The grounds on which the writs were made, failed to initial the petitions, or in other words the genuineness of the signatures of the signatories of the declaration was not proven; second that the declaration was not attached to the petitions.

The following is the clause of the writ in regard to the declaration: "The petition shall be accompanied by a solemn declaration proving the genuineness of the signatures, and also that the said petition is signed by at least one quarter of the ratepayers in each ward."

Now, as a matter of fact the petitions were accompanied by a solemn declaration, and the petitions from each ward were initialed by the commissioner A. B. and C. respectively; but whether the fact that the commissioner failed to put his own initials upon the petitions will nullify them or not is the question that will be thrashed out in court. While the liquor men are claiming that it does it by no means follows that such is the case; that is part of their campaign. In fact it is simply an attempt to prevent the free expression of public opinion on the question of local option, and will not help their cause when it goes before the people.

There is ample justification for the belief that the court will not interfere in the matter, and that the vote will be taken as ordered, and in the meantime it would be unwise for the friends of local option to lay down their arms. These tactics, which are similar to those taken in St. John last year and are naturally expected, ought rather to stimulate all to greater efforts and a greater victory.

The Town Solicitors were instructed to appear and defend and given power to engage counsel if necessary.

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

ANNUAL REPORT OF WATER AND SEWERAGE COMMITTEE

To His Worship the Mayor and Town Council:—
Gentlemen: With your permission I beg to submit this report, being a general review of the departmental work during the past nine months.

As a preface a brief description of the completed works on 16 inch water main and new screening house is necessary to be better understood and improvements appreciated. This main is now completed between Duncan's Hill, Tobique Road, and reservoir. A new screening tank having concrete walls and bottom, measuring 14 feet long, 8 feet wide and 16 feet deep, having wooden house erected over the tank and containing gate valves, double sets of filtering screens and measuring gauge. A new 20 inch diameter cast iron pipe connection between screening house and reservoir.

The water in its course from reservoir to town passes first through a rough wooden fish excluding screen at inlet of 20 inch pipe, and through 20 inch pipe to screening house, where it is commanded by 20 inch gate valve having in junction therewith a 20 inch "T" shaped pipe, which divides the flow and directs the water against the side walls, thereby greatly reducing the pressure on the filtering screens; continuing it passes through the first copper screen made of .065 inches wire gauges having 16 spaces per square inch, then through second copper screen made of .035 wire gauge in ribbon mesh having 18 spaces per lineal inch, thence through 16 inch gate valve or 10 inch gate valve to 16 inch or 10 inch water main respectively. The 16 inch water main has air valves at high levels; emptying or scouring valves at low levels and was connected to old 10 inch main at Duncan's Hill last October. The increase in pressure by use of this connection is 23 lbs. per square inch.

The section of work yet to be completed consists of a continuation of main in an easterly direction on a new proposed street south of the town until it makes connection with 6 inch main on Ramsay street, having branch connections between the new and old mains at George St., Gerrard Lane, O'Leary St., Minto St., Adams St., Andrew St., Central St., Athol St., and Prince William St. Under such an arrangement the town benefits in a two-fold improvement, first by a double water main system, and secondly by a continuous circuit of flow, thereby removing all chances of pollution by the numerous dead ends existing at present, and further making it more adaptable to strengthen the pressure at any desired section for fighting fires.

The continual growth of the town annually calls for the addition of many new streets which necessitates heavy expenditures in new water mains and sewers. This year three such extensions were made and sewers were also laid on three of the existing streets, making a total for the year of 2807 lineal feet of water mains and 3339 feet of sewers. The total length of mains from reservoir to the town now is 4.5 miles; distributing mains in town 7.8 miles or a total of 12.3 miles. The total length of sewers now is 6.5 miles.

Immediately on entering upon duties after my return to Council it was apparent that some other arrangements must be made regarding the installation of water and sewer services to prevent the numerous complaints received of overcharges which has been the rule for some years past, and I am pleased to state the resolution adopted by Council on April 6th "That no water or sewer services be made by town employees, etc., or furnish any materials therefor except such as is provided for by law," has remedied this grievance. Tenders have been called for work required to be done by the town as the law provides for.

The question of contracting for supplying shipping at wharves with water was also carefully considered and although Mr. Lowden tendered \$150.00 for the season yet the Council thought better could be done with town employees. This matter has also proved satisfactory, yielding a net profit of \$155.88 after paying all expenses, including purchase of two new meters and 150 feet of hose, likewise reducing the rate from 1c to .5c per gallon. It may be mentioned that had the contract of \$150.00 been accepted, expenses annually occurring for laying temporary supply would have cost over \$60.00, leaving less than \$90.00 profit.

During the civic year two 2 inch fire services were granted, one to Opera House, and one to Duncan & McLennan Foundry, also one 1 inch to Arlington Hotel, Victoria Street.



With a record beating all records and with a total of 2,254 homestead entries in the midwinter month of February, Canada is doing very well these days.

draught. I then opened one gate in the 3-way hydrant 400 feet to the east on the same main. This would be equal to a draught of about five fire streams and the reduction of pressure was 23 lbs. It is the intention to extend the new 16 inch main through the town to Ramsay street and connect it directly with all the cross-town pipes, in which case the falling off in pressure for fire purposes will be considerably decreased and on this being done in the early summer of next year the town will have a very fine water system.

In March, 1908, before the new 16 inch main was brought into town I took the pressure at about the same level as the present test and found it to be only 48 lbs. with a much greater falling off for each additional stream for fire purposes.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton—Gentlemen: Your Committee to whom are referred all matters relating to the Town, beg to submit the following brief report for the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909.

The Town is to be congratulated on the fact that on closing the books on Dec. 31st, there was a cash balance on hand to the credit of the Town of over \$6000.00. This is an exception to the rule. For a number of years past at the close of the fiscal period there has been an overdraft running in the bank, and it is to be hoped that without any further increase in the taxation the fine showing of the past year will be maintained or even surpassed in the coming year.

All departments of the town service are in a much better and more satisfactory financial condition than ever before, owing largely to the application of better business methods in administration, which has been insisted upon in all cases.

During the year a number of heavy extensions

were made in the water system, necessitated by the large number of new houses erected on new streets opened up, as well as the completion of the new 16 inch water main to the point of connection with the 10 inch main on Duncan Hill. Notwithstanding this heavy expenditure it was unnecessary to issue more debentures, all this work being paid for well within the balance on hand from a previous issue.

Considerable attention has been given to the systematizing of the work of the different departments, particularly in the Treasurer's and Clerk's offices, and we feel that the small outlay necessitated will certainly bring about satisfactory results.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC PROPERTY AND STREETS COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton: Gentlemen: Your Public Property and Street Committee beg to submit a brief report of the work done under our direction during the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909.

Owing to the unfavorable weather conditions the building of concrete sidewalks was impossible until the summer was well advanced, when it was found that the greater part of the appropriation for this department would have to be used in opening up new streets and laying new deal sidewalks on several streets where the old sidewalks had become a menace to the safety of the public. For these reasons no concrete sidewalk was built last year. A load of cement was however, procured, the greater part of which is still on hand for the commencement of the work this summer.

The following new streets were opened up and made: New street from Aberdeen to Lansdowne. Extension to Prince William St. from East Stanley to the Convent. Cromwell Avenue, from Gerard to Duncan. Duncan St. from Sugar Loaf to J. B. Christopher's.

The following streets were made over and gravelled: East Stanley, with a water course at each end. Gerard St. to Harvey Calder's. Cedar St. to the railway crossing. King St. from Queen to Ramsay. Aberdeen St. Union Terrace from Mrs. Patterson's to Mrs. Mowat's; also ditch cleaned. Prince William St. gravelled from King to railway crossing.

A larger amount of deal sidewalk was built last year than usual, in all 2575 feet, as follows: Water Street, 915 feet. Andrew Street, 852 feet. Union Street, 185 feet. Prince William Street, 295 feet. King Street 328 feet. Total, 2575 feet.

Six deal crossings were laid, the material for one of them being supplied by private individuals. Considerable blasting was done at the rock near Chas. Maisey's, with the result that the road is now in a better condition.



To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton, Gentlemen—In reviewing the work of the Fire Department for the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909, it is with pleasure and gratitude we report that the Town has not had one serious conflagration. During the entire nine months there were only two or three slight chimney fires, which were promptly extinguished without much assistance from the department; although the alarms were quickly responded to in each case.

The fire company for a number of years past was paid annually by the Town, the Chief of the Brigade receiving \$25.00 and each member \$10.00. Last year this system was discontinued and the brigade re-organized on a strictly volunteer basis, with W. J. Christie as Chief, the company consisting of 15 members. Thus the money heretofore used for salaries has been available for improved equipment of

Ropes, Straps, etc. 2300 feet hose. 6 Play Pipes. 4 Hydrant Wrenches. 18 Hose Wrenches. 3 Siamese Connections. 1 Hose Mender. 7 Grip Straps for Hose. 2 Fire Axes. 7 Tips for Play Pipes. 1 Roof Ladder. 3 Ground Ladders. 1 Extension Ladder. 3 Hose Sleighs. 3 Hose Reels. 1 Hose Wagon. 1 Ladder Truck. 1 Horse. 1 Steam Fire Engine.

In addition to the above we have also ordered 500 feet of hose, 1 Play Pipe with Callahan Nozzle and 6 Hydrant Gate Valves.

This matter has been gone into by this Committee and a report prepared before the Council, which was laid over for future consideration.
