Frontier Defences. A correspondence between Isaac H. Bronson, member of Congress from this State, and the Hon. J. R. Poinsett, Secretary of War, has been published by the Albany Argus. Mr. Bronson had urged the Secretary of War to display on the frontier a regular force, sufficient to repel and prevent further disturbances and apprehend retaliation, as well as to preserve neutrality. The Secretary replied on the 5th instant, that he had sent to the southern frontier all the troops that could be spared from the points where their presence was still needed; but that he could not spare from our little army now engaged in Florida and the Cherokee country any more men, as the forces of 60,000 were diminished in those quarters without danger to the peace of the country.

Disputed Boundary Business. The following extract from a letter from Dr. Holmes, just received, shows that all the surveys have arrived on the Aroostook and are now busily engaged in their laborious duties.

Dear Sir:—After much toil and tribulation to say nothing of a day's drizzling, we arrived here last night and found that Dr. Whipple had arrived the day before. This Aroostook river is certainly the handsomest stream of water in all Maine, and the land, for the most part, is excellent, though if a man wants a poor farm, he can find it here. I find the growth of the intervals thus far, very different from that on the Sandy river, Kennebec, and Saco. Pine, cedars, &c. which in those places indicate wet cold soil, are found thriving on low intervals and even upland swells. It is no uncommon thing to see a cedar retaining himself up with a trunk from a foot to a foot and a half in diameter and thirty or forty feet high before he puts out a limb, on high dry soil. I assure you that we came up the East bay and not the Sabote. While our boats were carrying across into Aroostook we saw over a high swell nearly a mile

long. I took a reconnaissance of the region round about, and discovered a bog in which the waters of the Aroostook and those of the Penobscot or rather the tributary, up which we came, both rise. At any rate this is my present belief.

I understand that there are two or three companies below, all ready coming up along this summer, but learning that there are so many "Yankees" above, dare not come on.
