TWENTY-NINE NAMES ADDED TO LONDON VOTING LIST BY COURT OF REVISION TODAY

Hordes of Anxious Voters Swoop Down On Officials, Anxious To Know If Their Names Are On List — Evening Sessions Not At All Probable.

Although the courts of revision appointed in the four different wards to revise the voters' list in preparation for the temperance referendum are open until 10 o'clock this morning, 29 names had been added to the list by the six-day session of the courts in the morning. COUNCIL WILL ENDEAVOR TO STRAIGHTEN OUT CITY GAS AND STREET RY. TANGLES

Special Meeting Called For Tuesday Noon At Request of Seven Aldermen—Draw Up Official Statement of Council's Attitude Toward Companies.

At the request of seven aldermen a special meeting of the city council has been called for noon Tuesday to discuss gas and street railway matters. This is the first time in many years that this rule of procedure has been invoked. Usually the mayor calls any special meetings which he considers necessary, but a majority of the aldermen may request him to call a meeting for any purpose which they may name.

Montreal Judge Dismisses Action Brought by Woman. TO ANNUL MARRIAGE

Montreal, March 28.—Without stating any reasons for judgment, Mr. Justice Coderre has dismissed an action by Dame E. R. Abern, seeking the annulment of her marriage to R. J. MacNamara, on the ground of religious impediment. The parties were married in 1916 before Rev. F. H. Sprulle, Methodist minister. Plaintiff stated that she is a Roman Catholic, whereas her husband is non-Catholic. The marriage was annulled by a decree of the Roman Catholic archbishop April 20 last, and plaintiff submitted that she was entitled to have the ecclesiastical decree declared good and valid by the civil court.

1,600,000 ELIGIBLE TO VOTE ON REFERENDUM

Revision of Lists Throughout Province Begins Today — 800,000 Women Are Entitled To Vote On Question of Importation of Liquor Into Province—Polling Day On April 18.

Toronto, March 28.—If every eligible voter in Ontario exercises his or her franchise at the coming referendum, voting on which takes place three weeks from today, April 18—approximately 1,600,000 votes will be cast.

Washington, March 28.—There is a noticeable feeling of optimism in Great Britain and a note of expectancy for better times. This is stated in a report submitted to the United States Secretary of Labor today by Rowland B. Mahany, who was sent to Europe by the Wilson administration to attend the sessions of the International Commission on Immigration and Emigration. Mr. Mahany expressed the belief that large numbers of the laboring classes of both Great Britain and France want to emigrate to the United States, but are finding it impossible to do so through lack of money.

THE MORAL VALUE OF CONTINITY.

It is not only a child's reason that is trained when proper play is given to his instinct for continuity; it is his moral sense as well. Moral life is bound up with the power to reason with the ability to trace a line back to cause. It is hard for a child to be interrupted constantly in his play.

RAISIN RECIPES.

For a steamed raisin corn bread, with sour milk, very wholesome, nutritious and delicious, mix a cupful of fine yellow cornmeal with half a cupful of whole wheat flour and a cupful of white flour. Add a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, a third of a cupful of molasses, a quarter of a teaspoonful of soda dissolved in two tablespoonfuls of warm water; stir until foamy, add enough sour milk to make a soft batter, and two-thirds of a cupful of washed, seeded raisins. Fill a mould half full, and steam for an hour and a half. It should rise to fill the mould.

For raisin soufflé, steam a cupful of washed, seeded raisins until plump and soft, chop them, add three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Mix very lightly with the beaten whites of four eggs, into which a quarter of a teaspoonful each of salt and cream of tartar have been whipped. Turn quickly into a buttered dish; large enough to permit it to rise to twice its height. Bake twenty minutes in a hot oven. Serve at once, with a soft omelette sauce made of the egg yolks.

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





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LITTLE GIRLS THOUGHT MOTHER ILL IN HOSPITAL

Pathetic Feature in Connection With Case At Dublin.

WAS WOMAN RESPONSIBLE Report of Analysis Is Being Awaited With Keen Interest.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

MITCHELL, March 27.—All through this district the results of the analysis of the stomach of Daniel Hastings is awaited with keen interest, as it will decide whether the confession signed by Mrs. Hastings is correct, or whether she made and signed statements while her mind may have been deranged from grief.

Many close friends refuse to believe that she would be guilty of the deed, to which she has signed a confession.

A pathetic feature in connection with the case was the breaking of the news of Mrs. Hastings being in jail to her two little daughters, Mary and Loretto, aged 15 and 11, and to her mother, Mrs. Lambert. The recent developments in the case had been kept from them, and they believed that Mrs. Hastings was in a hospital in Stratford.

Coming so closely after the death of their father, the last blow was a hard one for the two children.

The home in which the Hastings lived is owned by Mrs. Lambert, who is well over 70 years old.

Made Postmortem. The inquest opened yesterday morning at Dublin, with Coroner Armstrong of Mitchell presiding. No evidence was taken. The body, which had been examined by Undertaker Gormley, was viewed, and an adjournment made until April 1. A postmortem was conducted by Drs. Smith and Murray. It is expected that the report regarding the analysis of the stomach will be received in time for the inquest on April 1.

Joseph Nagle was chosen as foreman of the jury, which is composed of J. Klinkhammer, F. McConnell, Joseph Shea, George Diegel, M. O'Loughlin and Henry Nelmes.

May Call the Girls. Dr. Armstrong stated to The Advertiser tonight that when the inquest resumed the two little daughters, Mrs. Hastings will likely be called to give evidence.

Throughout the district only the kindest remarks are heard regarding the dead man, Daniel Hastings. He was 66 years old, and was known as a conscientious, hard-working farmer. During the years that he was in British Columbia it is stated that he sent money home regularly. He was a carpenter and was reputed to be an excellent workman.

Conflicting Stories. Conflicting stories are told regarding the home life of the Hastings. The accusation in the confession signed by Mrs. Hastings that her husband abused her came as a surprise to residents of Dublin, although it is alleged that Mrs. Hastings had made similar statements to friends. Hastings was 36 years old, and his wife eight years younger.

One reason given as to why Hastings resided in British Columbia for ten years is that he did not wish to live with his mother-in-law. His wife, it is stated, was reluctant to leave her mother an account of advancing years. Hastings returned two years ago, and at times had done work for farmers in the district. He had purchased a farm near Seaforth, and was to have moved there next week.

Doubt the Story. In her statement, Mrs. Hastings declared that two strychnine tablets were given to her husband. Doubt is expressed in many quarters that two ordinary strychnine tablets would be sufficient to cause death. On the day of his death, Mr. Hastings was in good spirits. He spent the evening at the home of John Kenny, returning about 9 o'clock.

Mrs. Hastings, while appearing outwardly calm and unconcerned in court, is said by neighbors to be of a nervous temperament. She never appeared weak-minded, however.

The home of the Hastings is a frame cottage, situated on the right side of the road and near the bank of a small creek. The house and the barn not far distant, are in a somewhat dilapidated condition.

William Hastings, brother of deceased, was present at the inquest. He resides in Hibbert Township, six miles from Dublin Village. He had not learned of the turn of affairs until Friday morning, when he reached Dublin. He had attended his brother's funeral Wednesday, but stated there was nothing to arouse his suspicion.

ADDING NAMES TO VOTERS' LISTS IS CAUSING CONFUSION

Each Person Must Apply Personally to Judge's Ruling.

TORONTO, March 27.—Apparently there is a good deal of confusion in this city over the question of adding names to the voters' lists, Judge Emerson Coatsworth, chief revising officer for Toronto and York County, gave out a statement late Saturday as follows: "Each person must apply personally to be placed on the voters' list. This was decided at a meeting of the registration revisers held today."

The referendum committee also took the same ground and asked the supporters of prohibition to make personal application to the revisers to have their names placed on the voters' lists.

However, it is regarded as probable that some attempt will be made to get a number of names placed on the voters' lists en bloc, following the personal opinion of Judge Coatsworth that such a plan is legal. The judge, though, has advised that this be done, but has intimated that the question of personal application is a matter which the revising officers will have to decide for themselves.

In view of the fact that the legal proceedings taken with the backing of the Liberty League to compel personal application will not be argued at Osgoode Hall until Wednesday, March 30, and the revision of the voters' lists begins tomorrow, the situation is causing considerable uneasiness among the temperance workers, who fear that many persons who would vote "yes" will not get their names on the list.

SAYS HIDDEN GOD STRIKES SCIENTISTS

Dr. Adolphe Dies in Effort To Find Protection From X-Rays.

PARIS, March 27.—"The hidden God who does not wish to give up his secrets, strikes down men who seek to take them," said Dr. Adolphe Leray, chief of the X-ray laboratory in the St. Antoine Hospital, shortly before he died yesterday, at Enghien.

Dr. Leray was a victim of what he believed to have been a successful effort to find protection from the X-rays, which have caused the slow death of many scientists.

Research in an effort to afford protection to others was begun by Dr. Leray after his hands had become affected through the making of 25,000 radiographs in war work. For this work he was decorated by the French Government with the Legion of Honor. Several of his fingers were amputated during his research work, but he still persisted in it, and told those who begged him to desist that it was the hidden God who was in his hands who sought to unravel them.

FIREMEN OVERCOME BY AMMONIA FUMES

Loss Will Be \$100,000 in a Blaze At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, March 26.—(By Canadian Press.)—Five firemen, including Leut. S. Blackie of No. 4 station, were overcome by ammonia fumes, and damage estimated at \$100,000 was caused by a fire which on Saturday night completely destroyed the building, stock and machinery of the Sinn Fein headquarters on Catherine street.

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Proposed amendments to the Ontario temperance act, which already have been warmly debated, are still to be finally disposed of by the Legislature, and more warm discussion is anticipated in connection therewith.

Several other matters are yet to be dealt with, including the fair rents bill and the estimates.

Leut.-Col. W. H. Price, conservative member for Parkdale, is expected to bring before the Legislature the suspension of Police Magistrate David Hastings of Dunville, and this is likely to prove provocative of a political attack upon Attorney-General Rawlinson.

The House will continue in session until April 1, when it will adjourn.

SIX MORE BURIALS IN MARTYR'S PLOT

CORK, March 27.—Six more burials were made today in the "Republican Martyr's plot," in Saint Finbarr's Cemetery, just outside Cork, where Terrence MacSwiney was buried a few months ago. The burials followed separate funerals this afternoon for the six Sinn Fein volunteers shot by the constabulary at Cloghead Wednesday.

The military had limited the number of persons to attend the funerals to 150. Armored cars and troops in lorries accompanied the procession, and six corteges converged into one despite the military arrangements and formed a procession from the cathedral to the cemetery. The six flag-draped coffins borne on the shoulders of volunteers presented an impressive spectacle.

The streets were lined with crowds which appeared almost as large as those that gathered for the occasion of the MacSwiney funeral last fall.

REBELS APPLYING THE TORCH. LONDON, March 27.—Incendiary fires on numerous farms broke out last evening near Newcastle-On-Tyne, Lloyd's News attributes the fires to Sinn Feiners. The damage is estimated at several thousand pounds sterling.

RURAL CREDITS AND HYDRO TAX COME UP SOON

Proposed Amendments To O. T. A. Must Also Be Considered.

EXPECT WARM DEBATES

Indications Point To Legislature Being Busy All Next Week.

TORONTO, March 27.—Following the "Easter" holidays the Ontario Legislature on Tuesday afternoon will enter upon its tenth week of the second session with a lengthy program still before it. It is possible that the business of the present session may run into the fourteenth week, though some predictions have been made that three weeks more will prove sufficient.

Among the unfinished business is the rural credits bill, which may be pushed forward when its sponsor, Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, who is now on the sea homeward bound from England, returns to the Legislature.

The report of the special committee on hydro matters, such as recommended a tax of 2 per cent on the hydro-electric power commission's system, is yet to be dealt with. Premier Drury has publicly stated that while he favors a tax or rental, he regards 2 per cent as too high. The question is expected to prove a contentious one when it comes before the House for debate.

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Predicts Big Change In Cattle Business

MONTREAL, March 27.—Patrick Burns, of P. Burns & Co., Calgary, interviewed today on the subject of the embargo against the exportation of Canadian cattle to England, predicted that the shipping of cattle on the hoof would be superseded in Canada within the next ten years by the shipping of dressed meats, the matter being dependent on the introduction of the right kind of refrigerator ships.

The coming of these conditions would, he said, mean the establishment of large abattoirs at eastern terminals, where the cattle would be slaughtered and prepared for shipment across the water.
