The men reindicted were: Eddie Ci-cotte, pitcher; Claude Williams, pitcher; Joe Jackson, outfielder; Fred McMul-lin, utility infielder; 'Yred McMul-first baseman; 'Swede'' Risberg, shortstop; Oscal Felsch, outfielder; 'Buck'' Weaver, third baseman; Hai Chase, Bill Burns, Abe Attel, one-time champion featherweight puglis; Jos. J. Sullivan, alleged gambler, and Rachel Brown, alleged gambler, and Rachel Brown, alleged gambler. Mobert E. Crowe, state's altorney, announced today that after the indict-ments were returned that he already had started extradition proceedings against the men named, and that every effort would be made to apprehend them at once. "There will be no Jokes about this investigation, and no dropping of the charges brought in these indictments," said Mr. Crowe: "We have proceeded carefully, made sure of every legal de-tail, and we will not miss our mark-which is penitentiary sentences for the men who are found guilty." Mr. Crowe refused to say whes the men might be brought to trial, but in-dicated that the trial would not start immediately.

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

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
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

MONTREAL, March 21 .- Nearly ter million individual pieces of baggage were handled by the C. P. R. during 1920, according to a statement issued by J. O. Apps, general agent, mail, basgage and milk traffic department. Of these 27,940 were baby carriages compared to 26,640 for the previous year. Bicycles, however, are almost stationary, numbering 13,339 as compared to 13,303 for 1919. The dogs that traveled in the baggage cars numbered 21,53d as compared with 20,627 for the previous year. Total revenue received was \$1,056,387.61, and indicative of the care with which these ten million articles were handled is the fact that total payments in connection with claims for ordinary loss, damage, pilferage and delay, amounted to o \$14,075. In addition, the losses due wrecks and fires amounted to \$17,650. The milk traffic showed a considerable increase, the number of cans forwarded numbering 1,574,058 as compared to 1,417,968, or an increase of about ten per cent, while the parcels checked at stations increased from 1,049,352 to 1 188,946, an increase of thirteen per


