by placing him in the Senate. IGNORING PARLIAMENT.

The question of mandates has raised an important constitutional point in the British Parliament that has also some interest for Canada. In a debate in the House of Lords on March 14 Lord Curzon said that it would be intensely derogatory to the Council of the League of Nations if Parliament discussed the mandates before they received the approval of Geneva. He imagined that when the League passed a mandate it would come before Parliament. which would be asked to give a general expression of opinion about it. but he did not think that it would be open to Parliament to pull it to

Writing in the Times, Lord Islington cites this as an example of the way in which the executive is seizing power that rightfully belongs to Parliament. He points out that the mandates threaten Great Britain with a liability of £28,500,000 in the coming year, and that, further, by these mandates, the risk of being drawn into complications with friendly nations is increased, as in the case of the United States' protest with regard to oil products. FOREST REVENUES.

[Quebec Chronicle.] Revenues from crown forests are play ng an increasingly important part in the several provinces. In Quebec, for the year ending June 30, 1920, the forest revenue amounts to \$2,604,456.26, or 28.6 per cent greater than during the previous year. It is estimated that during the current fiscal year the forest revenue to the provincial treasury will aggregate around \$3,000,000, which may be ncreased to \$3,500,000 during the fiscal year following.

In New Brunswick, for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1920, the forest revenues to the provincial treasury aggregated \$1,387,005, or more than double those of the previous year. This in crease was due partly to an increased cut, partly to increased stumpage dues, and partly to a closer scale.

In Ontario, for the fiscal year end-ing October 31, 1920, the forest revenue was \$2.684.843, an increase of nearly 50 During the calendar year 1919, the British Columbia Government received in forest revenue a total of \$2,755,739. The importance of perpetuating these evenues, to say nothing of increasing them, is obviously so great that all of the provinces would be amply justified ent upon the protection of the forests from fire, insects and disease, upon recalculated to insure cut-over areas being left in the best condition to produce continued crops of the more valuable tree species, so far as that may be
