Great Britain and France do not stand more nearly related to each other than Canada and the United States. They are for the most part peopled by distinct races which were for centuries the antipodes of each other, having little intercourse with each other of any kind, and ready upon any provocation to fly at one another's throats. In this respect there is no parallelism between those two nations and the peoples of Canada and the United States, for in our case there have been no serious jealousies or rivalries; only once did come into collision with armed hosts, and then the quarrel was not their own; and at the present day the per/onal rela-tionships between Ontario and Michigan, or Quebec and Massachusetts, are as in-timate as those between New York and Ohio. The two peoples are practically one, and were it not for tariff laws they would trade with each other with as much freedom as that which marks the every-day Intercourse between the farmers of Middleyex and the citizens of London.
