QUEBEC, Oct. 24.—The jury, after five minutes' consultation in the conspiracy case of Connolly vs. Robert MaGdreevy and O. E. Murphy, rendered a verdict of "guilty" at 4:30 this afternoon.

Early yesterday morning it was whispered about the city that both Murphy and McGreevy had preverred to place their confidence in the railway trains than in the vindication of their innocence before the jury. THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL. The discussion on the conduct of the Governor-General continues.

Two well-defined views of his Excellency's functions find favor in the country, and both are worthy of consideration in the present crisis. One is that as a constituhim, for salary and expenses, something Mke \$100,000 a year. It may be, however, that the Ministers decreived the Governor-General as well as the people in their desperate effort to get the elections over before the impending exposures of the last few months. 

Save The Species.

It took millione of years to develop some of these species; and to let then dia in a few generations is to give death a chance out of all proportion to life. As no more are coming into existence, there is no compensation for the loss. The species-producing period of the earth is countries, which is so shocking to us, is far less serious than the distruction of individuals, which is so shocked at the death of a man or dog, when the number slain may be easily replaced, and is indifferent to the death of the whole races of animals. We should be sensative about the salvation of species as well as of individuals, and see that no kinds of life are killed. Our conscience should take no geologic proportio

Our conscience should take no geologic proportions. The last deer, the last buffalo, the last elephant, is a sadder spectacle than the death of any man; and when any kind of life approaches extinction the conscience of the whole world should be awakened to its recue and preservation to the world. It is true that many of these species are of little apparent value. But they may be of vast value hereafter. We are only beginning to learn the values of many things; and when they are gone they may be much desired. The terrapin became almost exterminated before they became recognized as the most delicious food known. Every year discovers new uses to which nearly recrything may be put; and we should keep the various animals and plants on the globe till we are sure that we do not want them. Some now useless may be valuable as food or medicine; all may have a scientific value. The life of the globe is not yet known. Thousands of species have not been named, and the place of many of them may serve as links in solving great problems of science. In a science which is just begun we cannot afford to destroy our materials. ord to destroy our materials.



Which Breed of Sheep?

Which Breed of Sheep? "Let us raise more sheep," writes Joseph Harris in the American Agriculturist. He believes that choice mutton will continue to shell higher than beef and says that if butchers do not want early lambs at a fair price the farmer can keep them till a year for two old, selling them for mutton—sometimes for more profit than as lambs. In growing lambs for the butcher it is important to breed those that mature early and grow rapidly rather than those which produce a great fleece of wool. In conclusion he says:

"There is a popular notion that blackfaced lambs are better than white-faced, and the butchers often leave the black skin on the heads to show their customers that they are of the fashionable breed. Rapld Pork Making.




