The board of education boasts of more diplomatists than probably any other civic body in London. The members have a natural aptitude for holding their peace when they feel it is policy to do so, and when they get things where they want them they come down with a splash.

This week saw a little bit of by-play hetween the board and the council, or rather between the board and an alderman, which shows the shrewdness of the trustees. Some time ago No. 2 committee of the board called for tenders for the addition to be built to St. George's school.

When the tenders were opened it was found that Ald. Garratt's figure of \$5,300 for the brickwork was the lowest, and it was accepted.

Some days later the alderman discovered that he had made a mistake, and he told the board that his error amounted to about \$400, which would bring his tender up to about \$5,700, or a little more than the next lowest tender. This tender was unsigned, however, the contractors in their haste to put in a figure forgetting to attach their names to it.

I was at first proposed to give the contract to this firm, which turned out to be among the contractors, it was decided to call for new tenders.

But the matter of issuing debentures to the amount of \$15,000 had yet to come before the council, and the trustees lay in the dark and played wise.

began his onslaught by bringing out Orchard's domestic crimes. There were the same precautions and the same armed guards today to protect Orchard, and the same courtroom scenes, except that among the spectators the women predominated. There was another rush for admittance, and the doors of the court had to be closed at both sessions. Orchard finished his direct examination at 2:35 o'clock, and the cross-examination has reached only the Coeur d'Alene days of 1899 when the court rose. The examination will

be continued tomorrow.

Orchard said Adams told him he had not gone to Caldwell, because the money Haywood and Pettibone sent him had miscarried. However, Adams said he and Jack Simpkins had got rid of some claim jumpers they had been after in Idaho.
