Large numbers of prisoners no longer fit to work behind the German lines were sent to Heilsburg, East Prussia, or Trelon, in Prussian Poland. A witness, describing the arrival of about 300 of these prisoners at Heilsburg early in October, says they were mostly stretcher cases and were taken to the hospital, but many of those sent to the camp were so weak they could hardly walk. He says that youths of twenty years looked like men forty years old.

Died of Starvation.

"Several prisoners died of starvation at Ramcourt."

"Later deaths of starvation became even more numerous."

"When I left Bazancourt about 150 men were suffering badly from dysentery and half of them were mere living skeletons."

"There was a lot of sickness at Cappey, caused from exposure and lack of food. No attempt was made to remedy these conditions."

Ottawa, Dec. 7.—Canadian claims for compensation for hurt or damage sustained by illegal methods of warfare practiced by Germany and her Allies are coming in fairly large numbers to the department of secretary of state. Already they have reached the thousands and are of a wide range and variety. Generally, however, they are divided into two main classes, claims for the loss of securities owing to the Boishevilk uprising organized by German agents, and claims for loss of life or property due to Germany's unlawful sea warfare.

There are, however, other claims, damages age ven being asked on account of Causalties suffered on the battlefield. Such claims do not, of course, come under the category of demands which are supposed to be addressed to the secretary of state. It is fully expected that in the course of time lawful claims will be paid. 



X. Y. Z.-My son was drafted May 8, 1918, and Is now discharged from the army on account of demobilization. Is he entitled to three months post discharge pay, never having served overseas? 2. Can he retain his uniform?

A .- 1. No. He has not served overseas, and therefore is not entitled to post discharge pay. 2. Yes. All soldiers reporting for ser-

vice before July 1, 1918, are allowed to retain their uniform on honorable discharge, according to information given out at military headquarters here.

F. M. Q.—My son enlisted last summer and turned half of his army pay over to me. To date I have only received one payment. To whom should I write regarding same?

A.—You should write to the S. A. and A. P. Branch, Military Headquarters, Ottawa, Ont., giving your son's full name, rank, regimental number, unit and date and place of enlistment. Also write to your son and ask him to parade before his regimental paymaster regarding the delayed payments, and inquiries will also be made through the man's regiment.

2. I read in a Toronto paper where an order-in-council had been passed not to recall soldiers on leave of absence without pay, and that they may be discharged. To whom should I apply for my discharge from the service?

A.—1. It is quite possible for you to obtain your discharge from the service now under the general routine of demobilization. You have likely already received extended leave, and if so, you should continue on same until you are ordered by the military authorities to report for discharge.

2.—To your commanding officer. If your leave has been extended it would not be advisable for you to apply for your discharge as the military authorities will recall you just as soon as facilities for carrying out your discharge present themselves. Demobilization is a tremendous task, and you will be discharged as soon as your case can be satisfactorily handled by the authorities.



Branch, Military Headquarters, Ottawa, Ont., giving his full name, regimental number, rank, date and place of enlistment, and date of death, full information regarding the state of his account would be forwarded to you, and any moneys due paid.

2. If insured, the policy would be in favor of your brother's next of kin. If you represent the next of kin then you can claim, the \$500, provided of course that your brother was insured by the city of Windsor.

3. The city clerk of Windsor has a record of all soldiers insured by that municipality. If your son was included, upon interviewing him (writing will do if an interview is impossible), he will turn the policy over to you, he will turn the policy over to you, and arrange to have same paid by the company involved with the least possible delay.
