Babies! Babies! There seemed is given another, which entitles him to no end of them at the Technical School this morning, when the clinics opened the first day of the big Baby Welfare Week. Over sixty babies had come in for examination by noon today. The huge waiting-room, where the babies are undressed, weighed and measured, previous to attending the clinic, was noisy with bables of every age, up to five years, and in every state of dis-habile. Their mothers were close by watching the various nurses who assisted in performing the wonderful rites of ed in performing the wonderful rites of undressing, weighing and measuring. Many of the babies were plump and rosy, but not a few showed signs of improper feeding and care.

The entrance of a baby to the Technical School is but the first step into a most wonderful system of steps devised and carried out by the Baby Welfare Association of the city. Baby no sooner enters the big front door than

Baby ne sooner enters the big front door than he and his mother are confronted by a kind lady at an "information Desk," and mother is told anything she wants to know about the exhibit and where she and baby are to go. Following the advice thus given, she ascends the stairs to the second floor. And here confronting her is another desk, with Miss Jennie Fidlar in charge. Baby's name, age, etc., are taken, and a card filled out with special number to be used in the clinkes, and under which the babies are judged for prizes. All around on every side, constantly reminding mother of what she should do, are posters reading something in this wise: "Would you raise chickens without knowing why? Then why babies?" "Best summer clothing for baby is unclothing," and "Your nose not your mouth was made to breathe through?" etc.

Clinic Rooms.

From here baby is hurried on to the big waiting-room, where he is undressed, weighed, and measured, preparatory to visiting the actual clinics, with medical men in charge, in the clinic rooms local doctors who have had special experience with children thoroughly examine the child, and fill out cards giving its medical history. Total For Family of Five Reaches \$2.059 Per Year.

Interesting figures on the cost of living in London for a family of five have been furnished to the city council by Harry Wray of the trades and labor council in connection with the L. and P. S. R. wage dispute.

According to this statement, a man getting \$20 a week in 1914 should be getting \$40 a week today. The schedule submitted consists of "bare necessites," with no allowance for amusements and total \$250. ments, and totals \$2,059, or about \$46

On the very vital motion to go into supply, the government escaped annihilation by the narrow and precarious majority of five, and that after the prime minister, and three of his foremost colleagues had spoken against the ost colleagues had spoken against the most colleagues had spoken against the Fielding amendment, and given reasons why it should, and must be voted down. For a time it appeared as if the fate of the government hung on a very slender thread, indeed. very slender thread, indeed.
While many members were absent the narrow majority cannot be explained away, because of that fact.
Out of a House of 234 members, 131 voted, and 48 were paired. Among the pairs, significantly enough were the chief and assistant chief whips of the government party. Messrs. 

CANADIAN CREDIT SYSTEM CRITICIZED

Advises Girl To Smash All the Dishes in Government Lags Behind Britain and U.S. in Fostering Export Trade.

> London, May 17.—Mr. F. H. Kapp, secretary of the Canadian Woolen Manufacturers' Association, has returned to Canada after securing orders for some \$8,000,000 from Rumania for Canadian woolen mills. It is understood, however, that though the order has been obtained, it has been found so far impossible to finance it. Your correspondent has been informed that the Canadian Government will not adcorrespondent has been informed that the Canadian Government will not advance any more money to Rumania, where a \$25,000,000 risk has already been taken, and consequently the order cannot be financed under the new scheme of specific government credits, which was inaugurated this year.
>
> It is said Mr. Kapp endeavored to have the credit arranged in London, but financiers would not entertain it unless the trade was divided with British manufacturers. Propositions are now being made to Belgian interests.
>
> The difficulty met with in this case is an object lesson of the need of some satisfactory system of Canadian credits for export trade. Two systems have now been tried by the Dominion, and neither has proved entirely satisfactory. The main objection is that they provide only for transactions between government and government, whereas what is required is accommodation for ordinary trading between private individuals. The former class of transaction is a relic of the war, and will soon become obsolete. Both the United States and Great Britain, with whom Canada is now competing for foreign trade, have credit systems. The new British plan is considered to incorporate many superior features, and a full outline of its modus operandi has been forwarded to Sir George Foster by the overseas branch of the department of trade and commerce. Instead of tiening up \$100,000,000 of public money, as Canada has done, Britain will vote a fixed over and over again as it is re-Canada has done, Britain will vote a fixed sum of £26,000,000, which is to be used over and over again as it is repaid, and will be employed to insure through banks, underwriters and insurance companies such transactions as

ance companies such transactions as are made under it.

Fanks backed by the Government finance advances to British exporters and underwriters, and insurance companies take the risk involved in possible refusal by the foreign consignee to meet-the bill of exchange for the cost of the goods. COUNCIL GRANTS USE PROTESTING ITS BILL

Civic Chamber Too Small For Purpose—Refuses To Make Proclamation.

RIDOUT STREET BRIDGE

Engineer Says It May Fail At Any Time—Council Is Responsible.

Use of East London town hall for a meeting to protest against the passing of the London bill was granted by the city council last night. A petition was received from citizens who have been objecting to the bill asking for the use of the city hall, and also requesting that the city issue a proclamation regarding the proposed meeting.

Building Inspector A. M. Piper reported that only a comparatively small number of people could occupy the council chambers in safety, and the council therefore suggested the east end hall. The aldermen refused to issue a proclamation, however.

Cunningham charged that efforts to have the bridge built were being purposely delayed. He added that the bridge might not go up this summer, but that traffic would be blocked whether the bridge was built or not. He claimed that plans which provided for the building of the bridge for \$125,000, instead of \$145,000, were based on last year's figure. The cost of cement was reckoned at \$3 less a barrel than the price at which the city could now buy carload lots.

MUCH-NEEDED LEGISLATION.

Under the name of fair rentals act, a measure has been brought down in the Ontario Legislature that will be of assistance to the renter in his struggle with the high cost of renting. The demand for a remedy for some of the prevailing conditions is widespread and clamorous. For instance, many a renter has in the course of a year been obliged to submit to a number of increases, sometimes as high as four. That a lot of this renting has been made at exorbitant prices there is no question. In order to meet this the fair rentals act calls for the following procedure:

In cities towns and villages the court of revision upon application of any person com-plaining that the owner of any tenement or building demands an unjust or excessive rental therefor shall have power upon a summary hearing of the parties and their witnesses upon oath or otherwise as the court may deem advisable to make an order fixing a fair, just and proper rental for such tene-ment or building and the owner thereof shall be entitled to collect or receive more than the amount fixed, Any order or judgment of the court shall

be final and binding upon the parties, but such order or judgment may be rescinded, altered or varied by the court at any time upon the application of any party interested. Any person violating any of the provisions of any order or judgment of the court shall liable upon conviction thereof before any magistrate to such a penalty as the convicting magistrate shall in his discretion impose, not eding \$100, exclusive of costs, and may, in addition to such penalty, impose a penalty of \$5 per day for each day while the said vio-







INTERSTATE BODY IN **EFFORT TO RELIEVE** FREIGHT BLOCKADE

Cars of Food and Perishables To Have Full Preference.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Members of the interstate commerce commission today met with representatives of the railroads to discuss means of breaking the freight blockade. Primary consideration will be given to the railroads' appeal for help, filed with the commission on Saturday.

The railroads suggested several details to the commission for inclusion in its traffic plan to break the congestion. One of these was a general scheme for the movement of grain cars westward and coal cars eastward to meet current requirements. Cars for food and perishables, however, would have full preference over all others under the railroadmen's plan.



OTTAWA, May 17.—(By Canadian Press.)—First reading was given in the Commons this afternoon to a bill which seeks to bring the control of electric roads under the jurisdiction of provincial governments rather than under the control of the railway commissioners. Last year a clause was put in the railway act placing the Quebec Central road under federal control, but it was found later that the clause took in all electric lines. This new bill, Hon, J. D. Reid explained, was to place electric lines back under the jurisdiction of provincial governments. Replying to W. F. McLean, Toronto, Mr. Reid said no provision had been made to extend the jurisdiction of the railway commissioners with regard to telephone companies.

Premier Borden's Refusal To Produce Correspondence Nearly Swamps Union R egime-Premier Stands For Secret Diplomacy About Washington Ambassadorship. -Narrow Majority Saves Government From Annihilation and Impossible Appeal To Country.

OTTAWA, May 17.-The House divided at midnight on Hon. W. S. Fielding's resolution calling on the Government to submit the matter to Parliament before proceeding with the appointment of a Canadian ambassador at Washington. The amendment was defeated by a majority of five. The vote was 63 for the amendment and 68 against.

Mr. Fielding received an ovation as he rose to record his vote. It was a straight party vote. The six members of the Progressives present voted with the Opposition. They were Mesars. MacNutt, Thompson, (Qu'Appelle), Reid (MacKenzie), Knox, Kennedy (Glengarry) and Johnston (Last Mountain.)

The Opposition greeted the reading of the vote with such enthusiasm that the Speaker with difficulty brought the House through the formal process of going into committee. Mr. Fielding asked if the Government could not adjourn the House.

'We shall all want to reflect on the situation," he remarked. Sir George Foster moved the adjournment and the Opposition im-mediately gathered in groups celebrating the narrow Government mafority with songs and cheering on the floor of the House as soon as the Speaker had left the chair.

BIG BOULDER SAVES QUARRYMAN'S LIFE

Elgin Whaley, of Centreville. Caught Under Ton of Limestone in Quarry.

INGERSOLL. May 17.—That Elgin Whaley of Centreville, employed at Downing's quarry, near Beachville, was not killed outright this afternoon was entirely due to a boulder which checked the descent of a huge bucket filled with more than a ton of limestone. The bucket was being hoisted by a derrick, directly under which Whaley was working. He watched the bucket begin its upward course, and then resumed a stooping position as he went on with his work. snined a stooping position as he went on with his work.

An instant later the bucket began to drop slowly, but Whaley did not get sufficient warning to get out of its way before he was caught and gradually crushed down. Finally the bucket came in contact with a projecting boulder, which prevented its entire weight from resting on Whaley, who was pinned to the ground under the bucket. It was found that his back was seriously injured, and that only the fortunate presence of the big stone had prevented him from being instantly; killed. He was rushed to the hospital. with his work.

BIRD NOTES (Contributed by McIlwraith nithological Club.)

The continued backward weather and particularly the cold nights have caused a lull in the movement of birds. Very few new species have been noted recently, and those which have arrived are not present in large numbers. The great army seem to be waiting for warmer weather and the accompanying increased growth in vegetation, for the state of development of buds, flowers and leaves is closely related to bird migration.

One of the new arrivals is Lincoln's One of the new arrivals is Lincoln's Sparrow, a bird somewhat resembling the Song Sparrow, but with more of an olive tinge to the back, and with finer streaks on the breast and sides. A buffy band across the breast also serves as a distinguishing mark. It is a quiet, unobtrusive and rather rare little fellow, and one that is not often heard in song. It is therefore easy to overlook and its recording always gives us a feeling of satisfaction.

The Wood Pewee arrived on the 17th exactly on time. This is a bird of the city and may be heard along our avenues and in the parks even during the summer days when bird voices are seldom noticed.
