culation Peposits Rising \$40,000,000.

No Diminution of the Business Prosnperity of Canada-Interesting Statements of President Clouston.

Montreal, Nov. 14. - The annua meeting of the Canadian Bankers' was convened at the Windsor Hotel this morning, E. S. Clouston, the president, in the chair. Mr. Clouston, in the course of his annual address, referred to the banking legislation, which went into operation not long ago, but stated that it has not yet been long enough in force to get into proper working order. The bank returns since the last annual meeting, he said, showed steady increase in circulation, having expanded \$5,600,000, while deposits have risen \$40,000,000, and there is \$14,000,000 more on loan available for the business requirements of the

country. Referring to the general conditions of the country, Mr. Clous-ton said that the business prosperity, which commenced in 1897, was as yet undimensibled. It was a striking sign that in five years the money value of imports and experts had been enhanced 63 per cent.

## A TERRIBLE

Show a Steady Incr ase in Cir- Over 160 Persons Drowned During the Sterm on the British Coast,

> Further Reports of Shipping Disaster -A Lifeboat Grew Perishes Going to Hescue Distressed Vessel.

London, Nov. 14.-The loss of a life. poat and eleven lives, near Yarmouth heads the list of to-day's wrecks by the continued gale, The lifeboat was on its way to the rescue of a distressed vessel when it was struck by a great wave and capsized. The crew were imprisoned, and only three of them sucedeed in making their escape.

Innumerable minor casualties continue to be reported on all the coasts of the United Kingdom, marking the storm as the most disastrous that has occurred in many years. Snow is falling in many parts of the country. An incomplete list of the persons

who have lost their lives by drowning during the storm, already aggregate over 160. The Norwegian bark Erratic, of Christiansand, has been wrecked in the vicinity of Saltburn, and eight membres of her crew have been

drowned.

A Belfast despatch says: — From wreckage seen in Belfast Lough to-day, it is supposed that the collier White Abbey has been lost and the

London, Nov. 15.—It is still impossible to estimate the loss of life and silbe to estimate the loss of life and property resulting from the protracted gale, and probably the full extent of the damage will never be known. Tons of wreckage of unidentified vessels are still being thrown up. Altogether it is known that some 50 vessels have been wrecked along the British coasts. The applicants are not alone confined to the officers now in the service, but to a small army of political workers from both North and South Essex. Each man has had his case stated, both to R. F. Sutherland, the member for North Essex, and to the Government at Ottawa.

Some time ago the executive committee of the North Essex Liberals held a meeting in Windsor and, although there was but one Windsor man present, it was decided to recommend Marion for the position. Acting on the advice of the committee, R. F. Sutherland immediately sent Mr. Marion's name to the Government, but so far no action has been taken by the powers at Ottawa.

Some of the other candidates for he position, learning of the action of the executive committee, have made a rigorous kick, both to the Government and to Sutherland, and this is given as one of the reasons why the appointment is still in the air. It is understood that the heads of the department at Ottawa object to placng a man in such a position without any previous training for the office. Just recently we have had an illustration of the same imcompetence with regard to a measure introduced by Ross, which was to check the scrap iron iniquity, but which the judges have found was not worth the paper it was written on and now it is announced that these befuddled legislators will go to the courts to ascertain just what they did when they passed trading stamp legislation. In connection with this matter the Lonson News, Independent, says-

Sir Wilfrid does not like newspapers because of his fore it is too late, habit of changing his opinions. He does not want to be held very closely to his public utterances. If charged with expressing a principle or policy one may that is radically different from the principle or policy laid down by him on a former occasion, he gets over it by saying that he is not responsible for newspaper reports. London, Nov. 14. - Lord Rosebery, speaking to-night in Edinburgh, said he did not intend again to try to secure a reform of the House of Lords, as this was not a task for an individual, but one needing a national impulse. "I would like to see," he continued, "an experiment for a year of a Government formed entirely of business men, such for example as Mr. Carnegie and Sir Thomas Lipton, instead gie and Sir Thomas Lipton, instead of politicians. I would ask you, are we getting our money's worth for the money spent? We are beginning to learn the lesson that great measures must in future be carried more by the harmony of contending parties or, by the agreement of belligerent politicians than by the overpowering ascendancy of any one faction in the country."

Continuing, the speaker said he blamed no party and blamed no government, but saw around him questions demanding solution and a general apathy and impotence to deal with them. Political parties, he said, must on occasions be willing to sink their differences and forget who was in power and who would get credit for the carrying out of measures if they wish those measures to be carried out.

#### A WATERLOGGED STEAMER.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 14 .- A special from Port Hope, Mich., says: - The steamer Emerald, from Alpena to Detroit, loaded with lumber and cedar, sprung a leak and became waterlogged in the heavy gale last night, off Point Aux Barques. The life-saving crew rescued the crew of nine this morning in a freezing condition. The men could not have held out much longer. No effort was made to save the steamer, which is now drifting down Lake Huron in a waterlogged condition. The Emerald was of 348 gross tons, 140 feet over all, with 30 feet beam.
