

## City Engineer Rendell Files Report

It Contains Resume of Past and Good Suggestions Pertaining to the Future.

At the meeting of the council last night City Engine r Rendell filed hi-first annual report covering the work performed during the year by his de partment and containing a number of valua le suggestions regarding the luture. It is an in eresting documen and is reproduced herewith complete

Dawson, Dec. 31st, 1902. To his worship the mayor and city council of Dawson :-

Gen.lemen,-I herewith submit my first annual report for the year end Ee mber 31st, 1902, togethe. with such recommendations as think advisable for your honorabl body to consider, pertaining to the en\_i\_ering and public works depart-

You are aware that on taking ove the affairs of the city, I had no plans or date of any kind to work from, consequently great difficulties were met with in locating the main cul verts and drains, in order to carry off the drainage water from Dawson that threatened damage by flooding.

The greater part of the box drains were found to be utterly unfit for use many of them were broken and off In some places I found th water did not go through the boxes muck and made outlets in places fa from the main boxes, causing much damage to streets and property. This I attribute to the way in which the boxes were constructed and laid.

There are about fifteen miles o streets open to traffic, and in fairly good condition.

In my opinion drainage water from the hills around Dawson will give very little trouble, if any, as suffici ent drains have been constructed dur ing the past season to take care of said water. To put a large drain around the base of the hill, would not n my opinion be expedient owing to ground. It would be a very expen sive and unsatisfactory undertaking necessity of such a costly drain has been obviated by a small disch being put in the past summer, along the east side of the N. C. Company's trail, east of Dawson.
