SCANDALS MUST BE CLEARED UP BEFORE ESTIMATES ARE PASSED

House of Assembly, Halifax, Apr. Never before in the history of Nova Scotia has the government had such a scoring or been subjected to such ordeals as is the experience of the Murray administration in these latter weeks of the present session of the local government.

UP AGAINST IT IN EARNEST The government are "up against it" on the estimates. It is now ten days or more since these were brought down and at the close of last week only one item had been passed.

ABSOLUTE SCRUTINY DEMANDED The Opposition, led by Mr. Tanner, will not permit of any compromise in the expenditure of the people's money.

THE GOVERNMENT FARM SCANDAL The government have been in effect told that the estimates can not pass till scandals that have been charged are cleared up.

NO GOVERNMENT "SIDE-STEPPING" The Opposition are determined that "side stepping" of this kind will not be permitted.

EXPLOITERS OF OUR WATER POWERS A new phase of the government's mal-administration of the natural resources of Nova Scotia came to light on Wednesday when it was admitted in the House that several favorites of the government had obtained control of lakes in the province and Premier Murray openly stated that he proposed that these people should have all the freedom

they wished to exploit these waters, whether for power generation or anything else no matter what, which their private interests might dictate - a nice example of the bartering away of the people's heritage irrespective of the public need.

WHAT HE DOES NOT KNOW Another thing only a little less evil than the shameless giving away of the rights of the people in her Crown lands and water powers was shown in an answer made by Attorney-General Daniels in the House.

THE CENTRAL CROWN LANDS SCANDAL The scandal regarding lands given to the H. & S. W. Ry., came up again in the House, Mr. Margeson introducing it.

Describing at the Royal Institution, (England), the results of horticultural investigations at the Woburn experimental fruit farms. Mr. Spencer M. Pickering controverted some old notions as to the transplanting of trees from the nursery to the fruit ground.

It made little or no difference; he said, to the future welfare of the tree whether the ends of the old roots were trimmed or left jagged and torn; nor did it matter whether they were carefully spread out instead of being huddled into the hole prepared for them. Experiments had shown that it was the new rootlets which were to be formed and not the old ones on which the future life of the tree depended.

Another Child Burned To Death

Kingston, N. S. April 23—A very sad and fatal accident occurred at North Kingston on Monday afternoon when Gladys, the seven-year-old daughter of Watson Smith was burned so fearfully that she succumbed to her injuries about three hours after. Mr. Smith had been burning brush along the road side, and had stayed to watch it till he thought all danger was passed. His little girl coming home from school went too near the burning embers, her clothes caught fire and she became enveloped in a sheet of flame. Mrs. Clark Warren who lives across the road rushed to her assistance and managed to put the fire out but the child had all her clothes burned off her, and she was dreadfully scorched. She was taken into the house, a nurse was summoned and everything possible was done for her, but to no avail, and she passed away. Mrs. Warren was very severely burned about the hands and arms and it will be several weeks before she will recover. Mr. and Mrs. Smith are of course crushed by the blow they have sustained, and much sympathy is expressed to them. The funeral was conducted by Rev. William Brown, of Aylesford, the service being conducted in the Kingston Methodist Church, the school children marched ahead of the hearse. The floral tributes were numerous and handsome.

Conservatives Win Both Alberta Seats

MacLeod, Alb., April 28 - According to the final official count in the provincial election in this constituency, Premier Sifton was defeated by Robert Patterson by 31 votes.

Edmonton, Alb., April 28 - Results received from Alexandria show the return of J. R. Lowery, Conservative, over M. C. Leyster, Liberal, by eight votes.

The totals are: Lowery, 478; Leyster, 470; Anderson, Socialist, 207.

The following seats go to the Conservatives, which were previously thought to be uncertain:

Rocky Mountain, majority, 31; Innisfail, majority, 9.

In the two latter there will be a recount, before a judge.

Municipal Council

The April Session of the Municipal Council of Kings County was held on Tuesday last, meeting in the Court House, Kentville, at 10 a. m.

The councillors were all present except Dr. Covert, Ward 1, A. Balsar, Ward 3, and W. C. Hamilton, Ward 9.

The minutes of January Term read and approved.

A petition from residents of Kingston and vicinity, in Ward 12, was read asking that a route be taken for new road from Kingston Station to Melvern Square differing from that selected by the Commissioner, H. J. Neily.

The Report of the Commissioner was read and on motion action was deferred to January Term, 1914.

Coun. Bishop moved, seconded by Coun. S. C. Parker, that the Experimental Station be authorized to take sand bank from highway opposite the station property and use same in grading, etc.

After some debate the motion carried.

The petition to close road through lands of Annie M. Stuart at Grand Pre, laid over from January Term, was read, and the law having been complied with, the prayer of petition was granted.

Read petition for new road from Kingston Station to Middle Road and on motion referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges to report at January Term, 1914.

Bad Rates were struck off as follows:

Ward 4 County, \$8.05 Poor, \$3.81 " 6 " 3.60 " 2.82 " 11 " .80 " .68

Arch Foster was appointed Commissioner to lay out change of Old Telegraph Road in Ward 9, Prof. A. E. Coldwell, appointed in January being unable to act.

A number of appointments of County Officers were made. W. Leander Wheaton was appointed Supervisor of Roads in Ward 3, in place of Jacob N. Wheaton, deceased.

Bill of John E. Coleman, Jailor, \$8.00, for painting and papering jail, was read and being approved by Chairman of Committee on Public Property, was ordered paid.

The Clerk stated that he had bill from Municipality of Annapolis County for costs in the trial of the Graves Brothers. The Solicitor had stated that the bill contained items which were not legally chargeable to this Municipality and had revised it, which revision was not satisfactory to the Annapolis County Officials.

In the absence of the Solicitor no action was taken.

Coun. Griffin reported verbally in the action of Committee on Public Property in the matter of appointment of an arbitrator by owners of lands taken for the right of way, etc., of the North Mountain Railway. The report was to the effect that a meeting was held at which the committee instructed the Warden not to certify the appointment of Mr. Berteaux as arbitrator. Since that time, however, an act had been introduced in the Legislature to legalize that appointment.

Markland Fruit Company, Kingston, petitioned Council for permission to lay rails on highway at Kingston Station to give train communication with warehouse. Prayer granted.

On motion Wm. Lockhart, Thomas Lockhart, Joseph Lockhart, and James Lockhart, Jr., were granted permission to do Statue Labor on the old road from the foot of Blue Mountain to William Lockhart's south line.

Coun. Balsar was, on motion, excused from attendance on account of illness.

By consent of Council Mr. G. R. Nichols spoke in reference to dog tax. He had paid such tax to the collector of Ward 13, in 1911. Others had done the same. The Collector had not made any return of the money so collected. Some action should be taken.

Mr. F. S. Fisher spoke on the same subject.

On motion the Council adjourned. -Register

Cabbage Culture

There is perhaps no vegetable grown in Canada that is more easily raised than the cabbage. It does well in almost any soil provided with a reasonable quantity of moisture and manure; it thrives from the most southerly part of the Province of Ontario to Dawson City in the north and from the Atlantic to the Pacific coasts. The cabbage does best in a moist cool soil and responds well to heavy fertilizing and good tillage. Market gardeners have learned not only this but also that there are great differences in the value of different varieties. It has been found by actual experiment that it is possible to have more than \$200 per acre difference in the value of the crop of a poor and good strain.

For twenty-four years the Horticultural Division of the Central Experimental Farm has carried on variety and cultural experiments with cabbage and has learned much of value on the subject. This work has been carried on for the benefit of the public who are fully entitled to the lessons gathered during this long period. Year after year, results of this work have been published in the Annual Report of the Experimental Farms, but such reference have necessarily been of a fragmentary nature. In order to treat the subject of cabbage growing fully in a single publication, the Dominion Horticulturist, Mr. W. T. Macoun, has brought our Pamphlet No. 11 of the Central Experimental Farm which takes the subject up under the heads of its soil and its preparation, varieties, sowing the seed and raising the plants, planting, cultivation, harvesting, and control of insects and fungus diseases. A section is also devoted to the culture of the cauliflower which is stated to be more difficult to grow than the cabbage.

Early cabbage is said to be usually more profitable to grow than late cabbage but requires more skill to get a satisfactory crop. Good early sorts are Early Jersey Wakefield, Paris Market Very Early and Copenhagen Market. Popular late varieties are Danish Ballhead and Late Flute Dutch, while Red Dutch is one of the best red kinds.

In cauliflowers Early Dwarf Erfurt and Early Snowball are favorites while Large Algiers and Walcheren are excellent late sorts.

The pamphlet points out that with all these varieties it is important to get the best strains that can be produced.

As only a limited edition of this work has been printed it will not be sent out to the regular mailing list but copies will be sent free to all who apply for them to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

A Great Aid To Farmers

Mr. W. W. Hubbard, Superintendent of the Dominion Government Experimental Farm near Fredericton, in a recent interview gave the following facts about the N. B. farm, which he may purchase for about 200 acres of the farm, which comprises 460 acres in all, have now been cleared, and 25 acres is in readiness for corn, potato and root crops this year. Another 100 acres will be cleared and the remainder left in forest for the present. The farm now employs about twenty men, and during the summer this number will be increased to fifty or sixty. The work of building barns to house 100 head of cattle, 25 horses, an extensive piggery and a poultry plant will be started at once. The raising of heavy horses and general live stock will be specialized in from the first and a general investigation of the best varieties of crops for the New Brunswick climatic and soil conditions will be conducted. It is possible that before long a quantity of seed may be available for distribution. Mr. Hubbard is of the opinion that the establishment of an experimental farm to serve the needs of New Brunswick alone will impart a great impetus to the agricultural industry in this province. 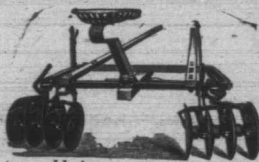

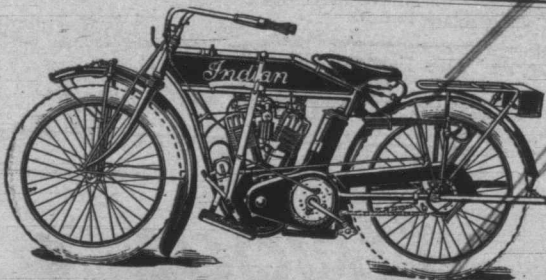
